'House of David' Damage Suit Stay Is Granted in Ohio

CINCINNATI, O., Aug. 1.—An order was entered on the records of the United States circuit court of appeals today staying the mandate in the case of John W. Hansel and Margaret Hansel of Grand Rapids, Mich., against Benjamin F. Fyrell, former "king" of the House of David, Benton Harbor, Mich. The couple had received a verdict for about \$42,000 on their suit in which they alleged they had been forced to give up all their property to the House of David when they joined that body and had not received any recompense for their services while members.

The circuit court upheld the verdict but granted a stay of mandate from the bench to permit attorneys for Fyrell to take the case to the supreme court.

Davis Again Works On Acceptance Talk

NEW YORK, Aug. 1.—His calendar clear of engagements, John W. Davis was able to devote much of his time today to perfection of his address accepting the democratic presidential nomination and to plans for the campaign.

The program called for further discussion with his manager, Clem L. Shaver, who is to have complete charge in carrying out campaign details while Mr. Davis is presenting himself and his cause to the country.

One of the principal problems of the selection of a national treasurer and a finance committee—remains to be disposed of, but the nominee and his field general hope to have this and other important items of organization out of the way before the official notification ceremonies at Clarksburg, ten days hence.

J., Aug. 1.—Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, declared today after the initial session of the executive council of that organization, that he has not led, is not leading and will not lead any opposition to the LaFollette candidacy that may arise before the council.

FIGHT A MONTH OFF

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.—The national campaign in support of the independence progressive ticket headed by Senator LaFollette as presidential nominee and Senator Wheeler as vice-presidential candidate, organization leaders asserted today, will be in full swing by September 1. The setting up of a campaign and electoral machinery for the entirely new enterprise which has absorbed attention to date, will have progressed by that time, leader said, to the point an appeal may be made effectively to the voters, led by the candidates themselves.

Members of the national executive committee plan to select a director of publicity shortly.

Roosevelt Highway In Good Shape, Is Report of Doctor

The Roosevelt highway from Crescent City, Cal., up the coast to Bandon is in fine condition, according to Dr. C. E. Hunt of the Eugene hospital, staff of physicians, who has returned from a vacation trip to the Oregon Caves, Crater Lake, and Crescent City, Cal. Accompanying Dr. Hunt on his trip were his family and his brother-in-law, C. E. Robertson and family, of Whitefish, Mont.

Tourists are being routed from Crescent City over the mountains to Grants Pass, according to Dr. Hunt. That road is in very bad shape at the present time, as a new highway is being constructed and the old one neglected. The Roosevelt highway is much better, he said. The roads from Eugene to the California coast city, however, are fine if the route to Roseburg, Bandon and down the Roosevelt way is taken.

Roads to the caves and to Crater lake are in good condition, he said.

Van Winkle Ruling Given on Placing Names on Ballots

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 1.—Names of candidates for president and vice-president on independent tickets, may be placed on the ballot after the names of electors, according to an opinion handed down today by I. H. Van Winkle, attorney general. The opinion was asked by Sam A. Kozer, secretary of state.
