## TWO NEW FOREST FIRES REPORTED; ONE CONTROLLED

Two new forest fires were reported  
this morning to the office of the Cas-  
cade national forest here. One, about  
two and a half miles south of Sardine  
butte at the headwaters of Christie  
creek, 20 miles north of Oakridge,  
was reported to be under control after  
burning over about an acre.

The other, three miles south of  
Nimrod, is in the Booth Kelly patrol  
area, and is reported as a good-sized  
blaze. It is believed that it is not  
yet under control. So far it has been  
held two miles away from the forest  
boundary.

Eight fires have been reported to  
the forest headquarters within the  
past ten-day period. Four of the fires  
were from lightning and four were  
caused by campfires. Six acres were  
burned over.

So far during the year 1924, there  
have been 27 fires reported. Eight  
were caused by lightning, while the  
other 19 were caused by man. Four  
were from brush burnings, and 15  
from campfires. A total of 148 acres  
have been burned over, though a small  
amount of the acreage has been green  
timber.

Eight persons have been convicted  
in court of leaving camp fires burn-  
ing, and there are more cases coming  
up, it is said.

## DEMURRER BARRED IN KERCHER CASE

Demurrer of Williams and Bean,  
attorneys for the defendant in the  
case of the city of Eugene vs. Wil-  
liam Kercher, was overruled  
Thursday afternoon in municipal  
court by George A. Gilmore, police  
magistrate. The case will be  
heard at time yet to be agreed  
upon by attorneys for both sides.

The attorneys in their demur-  
rer, sought dismissal of the com-  
plaint on the grounds that it did  
not comply with certain terms of  
the law, that it contained more  
than one charge, and that the facts  
stated did not constitute cause for  
action.

Charles M. Stevens, city attor-  
ney, is acting for the prosecution.

## DEFENSE DAY IS EXPLAINED TO BRYAN

(Continued from page one)

The National test day plans be con-  
fined to the demonstration on the part  
of the military forces of the country,  
state and nation, and the patriotic so-  
cieties as originally understood in  
which the state of Nebraska is of-  
ficially co-operating.

The President's Reply.  
President Coolidge replied as fol-  
lows:

"Replying to your telegram of July  
30, I am informed the war depart-  
ment plans contemplate a practice ex-  
ercise by all military forces and of-  
ficers, national, state and local, asso-  
ciated, with state necessary to dem-  
onstrate the defense policy enacted by  
congress.

"In this connection, a patriotic  
demonstration has been suggested to  
be participated in as desired by state  
and local communities. While the  
plans of General Duncan for the  
practice exercise would guide all  
components of the army of the Unit-  
ed States, the plans for the patriotic  
demonstration are dependent on state  
and local desires and are intended to  
be purely voluntary. The letter of  
General Duncan of May 30 to you,  
from which you quote in part, under-  
stood to make this clear by this  
state: 'No fixed form for these cere-  
monies is suggested. They should be  
planned to fit conditions in each par-  
ticular locality. Their plans do not  
contemplate a disruption of business  
in any way.'

"Up To Individuals.  
"General Duncan attempted to  
make it clear in his instructions of  
July 16, in which he stated: 'The  
hour of holding the defense test and  
patriotic demonstration will be left  
to the unit commander and the local  
committee in order that such assem-  
blies may be held at such time as will  
best suit local conditions and least in-  
terfere with the form of duties of  
those participating.' The people of  
the several states are expected to  
participate in addition to such sup-  
port they may have from patriotic  
organizations. You are, of course, at  
liberty to publish your telegram to  
me and my reply.

for land, or leave it as it is, with a  
bend at the crossing.

## AMERICAN LEAGUE RACE IS HOTTER; DETROIT LEADING

New York.—In the sunset belt the  
fight has begun for the lead in the  
American league pennant race.

Back in their own ballpark, hold-  
ing the lead by a slender thread after  
a trip through the East that netted  
them thirteen victories in sixteen  
games, the Tigers fought the East-  
ern invasion in the hope of spread-  
ing the field before the next forth-  
night passes.

In the rear the Yankees and Sena-  
tors, the Vanguard of the Eastern in-  
vasion, are staging a bitter fight to  
cut down the Tigers' lead of half a  
game.

The Yankees open their second  
Western invasion at Chicago, the  
Sensors are booked at Cleveland.  
While Detroit meets the Athletics.

The schedule for the next few days  
favors the Tigers. The Athletics  
should not give them the opposition  
the Yankees and Sensors will face,  
and every sign points to Detroit in-  
creasing its lead before next Wednes-  
day, when the Tigers begin a four-  
game series with the Sensors, fol-  
lowed by another quartet of games  
with the Yankees. After the Chicago  
games the Yankees meet the Browns,  
Tigers and Indians, while Washing-  
ton, following the Cleveland games,  
will play Detroit, St. Louis and Chi-  
cago.

If the Tigers can do as well on  
their home grounds as they did in  
their trip through the East, they  
will start on their last Eastern trip  
on August 13 with a lead that will  
be hard for the other clubs to over-  
come.

In the next four weeks the Yan-  
kees and Sensors will have to face  
a harder schedule of games—meeting  
the Western opposition—than the  
Tigers will have in playing the East-  
ern clubs.

Ty Cobb has his club hitting on  
all six cylinders and is not going  
to be an easy task to shut down  
the Tigers' speed.

In the meantime the Giants, lead-  
ing the National league race by more  
than six games, face a much easier  
task in holding their lead. They have  
just completed a successful trip, win-  
ning two-thirds of their games and  
any team can smite the enemy at a  
667 gals will be hard to beat out of  
the pennant.

The Giants are back home facing  
the Western clubs and then journey  
West again to meet their rivals.  
After that they will have the next  
pickings in the Eastern field. If they  
continue their .667 gals against the  
Western clubs in the coming four  
weeks the McGrawites feel they are  
"in" and will have won their fourth  
straight pennant.

But nothing is certain in baseball.

are expected to be on hand. Salem  
and Eugene are in a contest to see  
which group can have the largest dele-  
gation on hand. The losing side is to  
furnish a feed for the winners.

### Portland Boy Is Drowned in River

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 1.—Nor-  
ris W. Collins, 16, was drowned  
late yesterday in the Willamette  
river near Eugene when he attempted  
to swim to the shore from Swan  
Island and became exhausted be-  
fore he reached his goal. Several  
companions made futile attempts to  
rescue him. A search for his body  
was begun today.

### Foreign Jews Are Expelled By Turks

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 1.—  
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)—The  
Turkish government has passed an  
ordinance whereby Jews who are for-  
eign subjects and are temporary res-  
idents in Turkey must leave the coun-  
try. One year's time is given to those  
Jews who desire to appeal from this  
order. All Russian Jews and those  
from white Russia are prohibited  
from using Constantinople as a trans-  
it center.

## SHORT TERMERS IN BREAK FROM SALEM

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 1.—Davis Pen-  
well and Fred Howard, trustees of the  
Oregon state penitentiary here, made  
good their escape this morning when  
they broke from a truck that was  
hauling flax from Bicknell, a small  
town ten miles southwest of here,  
to the prison. The escape was made  
while the truck was undergoing re-  
pairs at a garage in the Salem down-  
town district and while Charles Mc-  
Kinley, the guard in charge of the  
crew, was inside the garage after a  
hammer to complete the repair work  
on the truck.

The two men remained on the truck  
while the guard entered the garage.  
Both were gone when he returned.  
Prison officials have no intimation  
of what direction the pair have taken  
in their escape.

Both men were serving short terms.  
Penwell was received on October 13,  
1923, from Marion county to serve a  
five-year term for forgery. Howard  
was received August 6, 1923, from  
Multnomah county where he was sen-  
tenced to serve not over three years  
for larceny not in a dwelling.

## FIRE, MILE WIDE, IN CRATER FOREST

PORTLAND, Aug. 1.—A forest  
fire in Crater national forest on the  
east slope of the Aspen mountain,  
west of Klamath Falls, is now burn-  
ing over a mile front and is spread-  
ing rapidly, despite fire fighting by  
18 United States forest service men,  
reports received here today.

Another fire, also in Crater national  
forest, but lying on Forest creek  
watershed, has covered about 500  
acres, and is being fought by 30 men,  
the local district forest service was  
told. The Aspen mountain blaze is

said to be threatening private hold-  
ings. An abundance of brush and small  
fire trees has aided its spread.

ESCAPED CONVICTS RETURNED  
SALEM, Ore., Aug. 1.—Deputy  
Warden J. W. Lilly of the state pris-  
on here returned late last night from  
Ogden, Utah, from where he returned

with two escaped convicts, Bobby Burns  
and Dale Arthur, inmates of the prison here, who escaped  
from the brickyard on July 3.
