

BENNY LEONARD IS HURT IN WINNING FROM PAL MORAN

CEVELAND, O., Aug. 12.—(AP)—Benny Leonard, world's lightweight champion, returned to the ring after nearly a year's absence, scored a decisive but costly victory over Pal Moran of New Orleans here last night when he defeated the challenger in a round contest, winning all but one of the rounds by a wide margin. The champion suffered a lacerated thumb in the inter-phalangeal joint of the right thumb with a possible fracture of the distal phalanx when he sent a crashing swing to Moran's head in the fourth round. The injury, physicians said, will prevent Leonard from engaging Mickey Walker in the world's welterweight championship fight scheduled for New York a week or two later. Leonard, physicians say, probably will be forced to rest at least a month before he would be in condition to resume training. Leonard left for New York today to submit the injury to specialists for x-ray examination. If the injury is as serious as the physician's expression indicated, Leonard will request that his match with Walker be postponed until probably September 15.

CLOUDBURST TIES UP MANY TRAINS

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., Aug. 12.—A transcontinental train service on the Santa Fe railroad is tied up today following a cloudburst late last night near Glorieta, which washed out or damaged several miles of track. Traffic is being detoured over the Belen road. A wall of water swept down a canyon through Apache pass, carrying telegraph poles and horses and cattle with it. So far as is known there was no loss of life, though it is feared some automobile tourists may have been caught in the canyon. A tour of the national Old Trail highway passes through the canyon, and highway now being under construction.

CHICAGO, Aug. 12.—(AP)—The defense in the Franks hearing rested at 2:48 p.m. The state immediately began presenting its rebuttal evidence with a list of 50 witnesses, including five alienists, to select from.

RELATIVES CALLED—CHICAGO, Aug. 12.—(AP)—Relatives of the young defendants who kidnapped and killed Bobby Franks were called to the witness stand this afternoon in the hearing to fix their punishment. Jacob M. Loeb, former president of the Chicago public school board, and uncle of Richard Loeb, was called first. Allan Loeb, brother of Richard, followed.

It was the first official appearance of any members of the family of Richard and Nathan F. Leopold, Jr., his co-conspirator in the murder of the Franks boy, and was the signal for a great craning of necks of spectators and fast work by the huge array of photographers.

Jacob Loeb merely identified some Liberty bonds and a bank book found in Richard's room at home. He was cross-examined and left the witness stand within three minutes.

British Steamship Reported Aground; On Maiden Voyage

BALBOA, Panama, Aug. 12.—The steamship Lamara on her maiden trip from a British shipyard, has gone aground off the Nicaraguan coast, says a wireless received here today. The cargo has been jettisoned and the vessel is lying quietly and not taking any water. A tug has been sent from here.

Lakeview Sawmill Is Threatened By Fire

LAKEVIEW, Ore., Aug. 12.—The sawmill of the Underwood Lumber company, six miles north of Lakeview, is threatened with destruction by a fire which broke out late last night in logged-off land near the mill. A crew of over 100 men was fighting the fire today to save the mill, which is one of the largest in the county.

The fire, which has burned since last Friday in the hay and meadow land of South Warner valley, is under control today after having burned over 7000 acres of hay land and destroyed more than 4000 tons of hay. A patrol is being maintained to prevent the flames from breaking over the trench lines. Over 300 men were used in quelling the fire.
