

KID M'COY IN DEATH CASE

Added Delay Is Forced Upon U. S. Fliers

ANGMAGSALIK ICE BARRIERS HELD REASON

Hurried Council Called to Determine New Route and Altered Schedule for U. S. Globe Airmen.

REYKJAVIK, Iceland, Aug. 13.—(AP)—The American army world fliers will continue to count upon utilizing the port of Angmagssalik as their base for the east coast of Greenland, in which the presence of considerable ice was reported today. It was announced by Lieutenant Lowell H. Smith, the flight commander, after a conference with Rear-Admiral Thomas P. Magruder on the cruiser Richmond today. Meanwhile the fliers will wait here for more favorable weather and ice conditions at the Greenland base.

SAD REPORT RECEIVED

REYKJAVIK, Iceland, Aug. 13.—(AP)—After plans had been completed here for the American army world fliers to hop off for Greenland tomorrow, weather permitting, a disappointing report today from Naval Flight Commander Bruce G. Leighton, on board the cruiser Raleigh, off the Greenland coast, caused a sudden change in the schedule.

Conference Called
Rear-Admiral Thomas P. Magruder at once called a conference with Lieutenant Lowell H. Smith, the flight commander, and Major Clarence E. Crumrine of the army air service, on board the cruiser Richmond.

Reports received from Angmagssalik after a reconnaissance from the Raleigh stated that the harbor was too small and too nearly filled with floating ice to make it a suitable or safe landing place for the fliers and it would be impracticable for them to hop off from it with a load. It is probable that a new landing place will be selected.

The trawler Kari, sent out Monday with coal supplies for the Gertrud Rask, is reported returning to this port without negotiating the transfer of fuel. Coal supplies are available at Angmagssalik for the Gertrud Rask.

CONSOLIDATED RAIL AGENT DISAPPEARS

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 13.—A search was being conducted today for Charles E. Warren, who has been in charge of the Consolidated ticket office here, following charges by company officials that he has embezzled several thousand dollars. The shortage will probably not exceed \$5,000, according to A. D. Charlton, of the Northern Pacific, chairman of the committee in charge of the ticket office. Warren was fully bonded, it was announced. He is said to have left Portland July 29.

Howard is serving three years for burglary, from Multnomah county. Dave Penwell, who escaped at the same time, is still at large.

U. S. FREIGHTER NOT DAMAGED AS FIRST REPORTED, IS WORD

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 13.—(AP)—The shipping board freighter West Katon has resumed her trip to San Pedro, Cal., it was stated in a dispatch received here this morning by the San Francisco chamber of commerce marine department.

The message said that the vessel had dragged over Providence Reef and lost two anchors, but that there was no hole in her hull as first reported.

TOKIO, Aug. 13.—(AP)—The United States shipping board freighter West Katon is aground on the rocks near Fude Island, 60 miles northeast of Keelung, Formosa, according to a Keelung dispatch to the Nichi Nichi. The vessel went ashore in a storm and has a large hole in her hull. Japanese destroyers are proceeding to the scene of the wreck.

JAPAN IS VISITED BY ANOTHER QUAKE

TOKIO, Aug. 13.—(AP)—An earthquake which shook western Honshu and Shikoku this morning forced residents to flee from their homes in several towns. In dispatches received here no casualties of material damage were reported.

Earthquakes, described as "fairly severe" were reported in the Kobe, Osaka and Nagoya districts today. Reports from Nagoya say the water mains in that city were broken by the temblors, cutting off the water supply and flooding the streets. No casualties have been reported. The temblors are alarming the citizenry.

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REPTILES KEEP SHIPLOAD WIDE EYED ON TRIP

NEW YORK, Aug. 13.—Seven 10-foot Boa Constrictors, which escaped from their cages, kept 32 members of the crew, eight passengers, and monkeys, macaws and "screamers" on the steamship Bolivar awake for four days today. The escape of the snakes became known when the caged "screamers" tropical birds, objected to the reptiles' efforts to devour them. Their shrill warnings brought quick assistance.

Five of the snakes were captured easily, but two rolled themselves up in an awning. A sailor discovered their hiding place when one fell at his feet.

Ann Luther's Suit Thrown Out of Court

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 13.—Ann Luther's \$100,000 breach of contract suit against Jack F. White, wealthy mining man, was thrown out of court here today.

Judge Scores Indecency

Superior Judge L. H. Valentine, who yesterday described the testimony regarding the White-Luther relations on a trans-continental trip as the "most dissolute violation of decency that has ever come to my attention," today, dismissed the action on the ground that the verbal contract between the two, under which Ann Luther was to have been starred in four films, "falls within the statute of fraud." He declared that under the terms of the agreement, it would have required more than one year to execute.

Further in his decision, Judge Valentine said:

"Wrong Done By Both"

"This court will not become a party to the wrongs done by both principals in this case. This is a place for the administration of law and justice, and not a place for the flagrant violation of law."

When the decision was announced the actress broke into tears, while at another table White wore a broad smile.

Search Ocean For Bodies of Aviator And His Passenger

SAN LUIS OBISPO, Cal., Aug. 13.—Search was being made today for the bodies of Ray Stiles, aviator, and Murray Lanini, passenger, who were drowned when a big Curtiss plane fell 1000 feet into the Pacific ocean, 200 feet from shore near San Simeon, 50 miles north of here.

Two wings of the plane floated ashore, but the fuselage and bodies of Stiles and Lanini sank and apparently were carried out to sea by the heavy undertow.

Ashland Watershed Closed to Travel

ASHLAND, Ore., Aug. 13.—As an emergency measure on account of the forest fire hazard, the Ashland creek watershed, source of the city's water supply, has been closed to all forms of travel. The road to the canyon has been barricaded to prevent the entrance of automobiles, wagons and other vehicles.

Entrance to the restricted area will be allowed only by permit, and permits will be granted only in case of urgent business. Smoking is absolutely taboo, and the restriction applies to city officials as well as employees.

MARSHFIELD MAN SHOT; IS BELIEVED MISTAKEN IDENTITY

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Aug. 13.—A Titus, 28, is in a hospital suffering from a bullet wound, a victim of the mistaken identity, according to police, who charge Harry McNeil, aged 45, shot Titus believing that he was another man. The trouble occurred on a North Bend street Tuesday night.

McNeil, it is alleged, started out to find a man named Tracy, against whom he is said to have harbored jealousy because of a woman.

McNeil, whom police say was under the influence of liquor, met Titus on the street and insisted he was Tracy. The two men had never met before.

BILL HAYWARD DUE BACK HERE TONIGHT

William (Bill) Hayward, veteran trainer of the University of Oregon, who has just served his fourth year as trainer for the American runners who competed in the Olympic games in Paris, France, is to return to Eugene this evening.

30 TONS OF HAY BURN AT MEDFORD

MEDFORD, Ore., Aug. 13.—Sparks from a forest fire believed to have caused the destruction of the barn and warehouse on the C. J. McKay ranch near Bybee Bridge last night, which resulted in the loss of 30 tons of hay, two horses, several calves and hogs and 250 chickens. A tractor and two automobiles were badly scorched. The forest fire burned over 40 acres of woodland near the McKay ranch, the previous day, but was practically extinguished on Monday night.

Green Prune Crop Pooled

AT ROSEBURG FOR SHIPPING
ROSEBURG, Ore., Aug. 13.—A pool of green prunes is being arranged by Foster Butler which will be shipped in the next few days. Approximately 60 cents a box, 1 1/2 bushels, has been offered by eastern buyers for 18-pound boxes, according to Butler, who ships on a commission basis. One hundred cars of prunes will probably be shipped from this section the present season.

PAPERS CHARGE SUDAN MOVE TO OUST BRITISH

Communication Says Party of Soldiers from Rail Battalion Are Guilty of Sabotage in Egypt Riots.

CAIRO, Egypt, Aug. 13.—A demonstration took place this afternoon in the Ezbek gardens in sympathy with the recent disturbance at Atbara. Complete calm now prevails throughout the Sudan.

CLAIM LONG AGITATION

LONDON, Aug. 13.—(AP)—London newspapers this morning make a big display of the disturbances in the Sudan, which they attribute to a conspiracy by interested persons in Egypt aiming to oust the British from the Sudan and establish Egyptian rule over it. Agitation has been in progress for some months, the main organizers being, it is said, the White Flag society of Cairo.

REPORT IS MADE

ALEXANDRIA, Egypt, Aug. 13.—An official communique issued today regarding the Atbara affair, says the soldiers of the Egyptian railway battalion committed considerable sabotage within the railway works, destroying automobiles and machinery with long iron bars and setting fire to the railway offices.

They refused to respond to the moderating counsels of their commanding officers and the senior officials of the Sudan railways, it is declared. A court of inquiry has been established by order of the Sierdar.

It appears, according to the communique, that the order to fire was given by a lieutenant of the Sudanese Arab mounted rifles, who instructed a sergeant to make the men fire over the heads of Egyptian soldiers attacking them.

LONDON, Aug. 13.—(AP)—In connection with the trouble in the Sudan the admiralty has ordered the battleship Marlborough to leave Zanzibar, for Alexandria. The light cruiser Weymouth, en route for Colombo, Ceylon, was ordered to Port Sudan, where she arrived yesterday, and the sloop Cleopatra is on her way for the same port.

LONDON, Aug. 13.—An agency dispatch from Cairo today says that according to the local press, the Egyptian government has decided to recall to Egypt the railway battalion, which caused the disturbance at Atbara.

Corn Up 2 Cents; Wheat Gain Slight

CHICAGO, Aug. 13.—Opening corn quotations, which varied from unchanged figures to 7-8c higher, December \$1.07 1/4 to \$1.07 7-8 were followed by a rise of as much as 2c above yesterday's finish.

After opening at 3-8c lower to 5-8c advance, September 1.25 1/4 to \$1.29 and December 1.32 1/4 to \$1.35 wheat sagged a little more and then scored fractional gains.

Starting 1-3 to 3-4c higher, December 52 1/2 to 52 5-8, oats continued firm.

Provisions were responsive to the bidge in corn. Corn closed nervous, 3-4 to 13-4c net lower, September \$1.28 1-8 to \$1.28 1-4 and December \$1.31 3-4 to \$1.31 7-8.

French, Spanish Morocco Revolt Reported Worse

MADRID, Aug. 13.—(AP)—The military dictatorship today issued a communique saying that the news from Morocco was not satisfactory, that the enemy natives had surrounded another position in the line, and that the Spanish troops needed re-inforcements.

AGREEMENT IS NOT REACHED ON RUHR MOVE

Marx, German Chancellor, Describes Day as Most Critical of Conference; Much Discussion Prevails

LONDON, Aug. 13.—(AP)—The conference by French, Belgian and German representatives in Downing street this forenoon in an effort to reach a settlement of the Ruhr evacuation problem ended at 1:30 o'clock without arriving at a solution adjourning till later in the afternoon.

Council Meet Delayed

In consequence the meeting of the council of fourteen, set for four p. m., at which it was hoped the announcement of a settlement would be received, was called off to enable the outside conversations to be continued.

It was announced that the next meeting of the "big fourteen" would be held tomorrow morning.

"Today is the most critical day in the conference," Dr. Marx, the German chancellor declared to the newspaper correspondents this afternoon, just before going into the five o'clock conference with Premier Herriot of France and Premier Theunis of Belgium and their French and Belgian associates to resume their discussions of the Ruhr evacuation.

Hope Is Expressed

"I go to this afternoon's conference with a feeling of great responsibility as the questions to be considered are so vital to Germany and other countries concerned," he continued. "But I go filled with hope and if we reach an agreement I think the most important part of the conference will have passed."

Chancellor Pleased

Chancellor Marx expressed his satisfaction with the equality of treatment the Germans had received from all members of the conference, especially with the manner in which Premier MacDonald had placed his time at the disposal of the Germans outside the formal meetings. He said the Germans had done everything possible to promote speed in the conference and were anxious to be helpful in creating a better understanding among all peoples in promoting peace.

Premiers Herriot and Theunis and Chancellor Marx left Downing street at 7:30 p. m. without having reached an agreement on the Ruhr evacuation but Premier Herriot said that everything was going well.

M. Herriot said the premiers would meet again tomorrow.

Confers on Ruhr



Indistinct that Germany was anxious to carry out the terms of the Dawes reparations report, Chancellor Wilhelm Marx, who was warmly welcomed in London by Premier Ramsay MacDonald, nevertheless insisted that France must agree to evacuate the Ruhr and to return to Germany control of railways now being operated by the French. He is conferring with the French and Belgian representatives in Downing street.

State Doctors Say Slayers Not Insane

CHICAGO, Aug. 13.—(AP)—The prosecution placed its first two medical pathologists on the witness stand at the Franks hearing today and both testified that Richard Loeb and Nathan F. Leopold Jr., were sane when they kidnaped and killed Robert Franks.

Dr. Hugh T. Patrick and Dr. Archibald Church of Chicago, testified that their examinations of the defendants led them to believe neither youth was suffering from a "mental illness," set up by the defense as its plea for imprisonment rather than death for the kidnapers-murderers.

WILL CALL FOUR

CHICAGO, Aug. 13.—(AP)—Four alienists will be the only witnesses used by the state to rebut the theory of "mental disease" which the defense has offered in mitigation of the penalty Nathan Leopold Jr. and Richard Loeb must pay for kidnaping and killing Robert Franks.

The original plan of State Attorney Robert E. Crowe to call friends and associates of the youths to testify as to their sanity, in refuting statements of lay witnesses, has been abandoned. The prosecution believes it is unnecessary.

GAME WARDEN PAYS \$250 LIQUOR FINE

NEWPORT, Ore., Aug. 13.—Deputy Game Warden Charles A. Russell was convicted in the recorder's court today on charge of being intoxicated and disorderly and was fined \$250 and costs. He promptly appealed the case to the circuit court and was released under \$500 bonds.

Fire Situation in California Better

BAKER, Ore., Aug. 13.—The forest fire situation in this section was apparently much improved today, although no direct report has been received from the blaze in the Burnt River district west of Unity. The lookout stationed in that region reported there was less smoke than yesterday. Additional men were sent in last night, bringing the total crew to about 100 men.

Two fires in the north end of the Whitman reservation are both thought to be under control today.

STAR OF PRIZE RING IS HELD ON SUSPICION

Fighter Mixed in Alleged Triangle in Los Angeles in Which Woman is Shot Dead; Robbery Charge Up

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 13.—One woman is dead, her husband, a wealthy antique dealer, is missing, with squads of police on his trail, one man is seriously wounded, one man and woman are slightly hurt, and Norman Selly, known in the prize ring as "Kid McCoy," is being held by the police on suspicion of murder.

Mrs. Theresa W. Moers, divorced wife of Albert Moers, was found shot to death in her apartment here this morning. Moers, who was out on bail on charges laid by her that he had robbed her, while a property settlement was being had, disappeared, and is sought by the police.

McCoy is in the police toils in a dazed condition, refusing to say anything relative to the affair, except, "He killed the only woman I ever loved."

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Aug. 13.—Norman Selly, known in the prize ring as "Kid McCoy," was arrested today charged with suspicion of murder, following the finding of Mrs. Theresa Moers, with whom he is said to have been living, shot to death.

The woman was killed about midnight, according to police surgeons, who examined her body.

Robbery Is Foiled

McCoy later this morning, say police records, attempted to rob a grocery store owned by Mr. and Mrs. Sam Shapp, but was foiled by a bystander, who was shot in the scuffle.

W. G. Ross, the wounded man, told police he was in the Shapp store when McCoy entered with a revolver and ordered the proprietor to hand over his money and disrobe. Ross says he knocked the revolver from the ex-prizefighter's hand after being shot and then called the police. McCoy's arrest followed.

Squads of police are scouring the city and surrounding territory for Albert Moers, wealthy antique dealer and divorced husband of the dead woman, who was at first reported killed by McCoy and said later to have been wounded.

Woman's Husband Gone

Moers had been charged with robbing her place of business while a property settlement, subsequent to the divorce, was under way, while the landlady of the apartment house declared that McCoy and the woman have been living there as "Mr. and Mrs. N. Shields."

Last Monday when Moers appeared in court his preliminary hearing was set for August 15 and his bail fixed at \$25,000 which he furnished. McCoy and Mrs. Moers were absent from this hearing, but both had attended previous ones together.

Pioneer Citizen Is Summoned By Death

PORTLAND, Aug. 13.—Hy Terwilliger, 75, of the pioneer Terwilliger family of Portland, died Friday at his home in Los Angeles, it was learned here Monday. Mr. Terwilliger, who was born and raised in Portland, moved to California 30 years ago. He was a nephew of the late James Terwilliger, whose name is perpetuated in the Terwilliger boulevard of Portland. Mr. Terwilliger is survived by his widow, a son and a daughter.

\$5 Fine Is Paid For Right-of-Way

Edward Bjork was fined \$5 in justice court today by Harold J. Wells when he was found guilty of failing to give the right-of-way to an ambulance.

8 BABIES IN 48 HOURS, EUGENE HOSPITAL SCORE
