**FORMAL NOTICE TO CALVIN COOLIDGE DRAWING LEADERS**

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13.—Republican leaders from all parts of the country assembled here today for the exercises tomorrow night at which President Coolidge will be formally notified of his nomination by the Cleveland convention.

The address of the president accepting the nomination is expected by the party leaders to set forth merely the principles on which the republican campaign will be based since it was written before John W. Davis, the democratic nominee, delivered his corresponding address at Clarksburg, W. Va., and could not therefore, be regarded as a direct reply to the latter's statements.

The president had a light program today to permit him to spend some time in preparation for delivery of his address.

**U. S. TURNS DOWN LATIN AGREEMENT**

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13.—The United States has refused to adhere to the convention signed by most of the Central and South American states at the inter-American electrical communications conference at Mexico City.

The convention, however, does not become effective until July 1, 1923 and the state department, in announcing the decision of the American delegation against signing the pact, expressed hope that in the meantime, a world conference may be held to establish regulations governing radio communication in the light of developments made since the London agreement was reached in 1912.

A number of objections to the Mexico City convention, which was negotiated last month under a resolution of the Fifth Pan-American conference, are held by the American government. It was drafted, says the department, "to apply to government owned systems of communication and adequately safeguard the legitimate interests of private concerns engaged in the operation of communication facilities."

Compliance also "would involve a serious change," in administration of the telegraph and radio systems conducted by various government agencies, since all would have to be placed under unified control, and the signatories agreed to construct additional land lines and wireless stations, in conflict with the policy of the United States to encourage private enterprise in this field.

**TOO MANY DEER IN ONE FOREST**

OGDEN, Utah, Aug. 13.—The Kaibab National forest in southern Utah and northern Arizona the latter part of this month will be the scene of a conference to solve the problem of the 25,000 or more deer on that reservation.

The forest is only 50 miles square and it is estimated the deer are increasing at the rate of 3000 annually. The deer are protected at present and the territory has been practically cleared of predatory animals which formerly preyed upon the deer.

Some experts are urging the capture and removal to their forests of the deer while others favor limited shooting of bucks.

Each winter the feeding of the Kaibab deer is becoming more of a difficulty.

**SALEM JOCKEY IS REPORTED WORSE**

SARATOGA SPRINGS, N. Y., Aug. 13.—At the Saratoga hospital last night the condition of Earle Sande, Salem, Ore., jockey, was reported as less encouraging.

It was stated that he has again developed a temperature.

It was learned last night for the first time that Sande suffered a fractured left collar bone among his multiple injuries.

**Two Tacomans Are Killed in Mishap Near Astoria, Ore.**

ASTORIA, Ore., Aug. 13.—Mrs. Stella Smythe and Mrs. F. E. Mergel, both of Tacoma, Wash., were killed late yesterday when the automobile in which they were riding on the lower Columbia highway left the highway and rolled down a 200 foot embankment. The accident occurred about 32 miles east of Astoria.

Marjory Smythe, 12, and Donald Mergel, 14, were also in the car, but they escaped with minor injuries.

It is presumed that Mrs. Smythe, who was driving, lost control of the car when she turned toward the rear seat to search for a knife to use in peeling an orange, according to the account of the accident told by Donald Mergel.

**Gibbons-Bloomfield Bout Lost Money; American Not Paid**

LONDON, Aug. 13.—Lawyers representing Tom Gibbons, American boxer, have written Major Arnold Wilson, promoter of the Gibbons-Bloomfield fight last Saturday, claiming that 8001 pounds (about \$38,000) is due their client, this being the difference in sterling between \$50,000 and the 8000 pounds which Gibbons received.

Major Wilson has gone to the country under physician's orders, suffering a nervous breakdown, brought on by the strain of managing the fight.

The Daily Sketch says the fight resulted roundly in a loss of 12,000 pounds to its backers, the receipts amounting to 15,000 pounds against expenditures of 27,000.

**WHITMAN MASSACRE SURVIVOR PASSES**

PENDLETON, Ore., Aug. 13.—Little Hawk, Cayuse Indian, and aged 95 years, said to have been a participant in the famed Whitman massacre, died Sunday, according to Major Lee Moorhouse, authority on Indian customs, who knows all the family Indians of the Umatilla, Walla Walla and Cayuse tribes. Little Hawk's Indian name was Tom-A-Pie Kouchi Kouch.

**American Boy Scouts Hit in Copenhagen**

COPENHAGEN, Aug. 13.—The American Boy Scouts, here for the international Scout jamboree, continue to touch the public fancy. They increased their popularity last evening by staging Indian dances under the leadership of William Hubert, descendant of a Mohawk chief, in an open air theatre in the king's deer park. All the newspapers agree that the presentation afforded one of the most impressive sights of the whole jamboree.

Tonight the American Scouts are entertaining Prof. John D. Prince, American minister to Denmark at a camp dinner after which the minister will broadcast an address to the Boy Scouts of the world, repeating the message in 13 languages.

**ILLINOIS LABOR O. K.'s Stand on LaFollette**

CHICAGO, Aug. 13.—The executive board of the Illinois State Federation of Labor today adopted a resolution concurring in the endorsement by the executive council of the American Federation of Labor of the LaFollette and Wheeler candidacies for president and vice-president.

**28TH ANNIVERSARY OF FILIPINO RULE IS OBSERVED TODAY**

MANILA, Aug. 13.—(AP)—The American occupation of the Philippine Islands was observed as a holiday here, all government offices remaining closed today. The Spanish-American war veterans held a reunion which was attended by Governor General Wood and visiting officers from the Japanese cruiser Ota.

The governor-general entertained the Japanese officers later at a dinner.

About 100 Filipino veterans were present, including General Emilio Aguinaldo, one time leader in the struggle against American rule. The former insurrectionist leader also made a brief address, saying that while the forces under his command fought against the Americans and were at one time their enemies, they all met as friends today. He said he was sure the motives of the United States as evidenced in the policies of Governor-General Wood, were designed to promote the best interests of the Filipino people.

**BLUE ROCK EVENTS HERE NEXT MONTH TO BE REGISTERED**

Eugene's big trapshoot September 29-27 will be a registered event, according to a telegram sent to the Lane County Sportsmen's association from the headquarters of the Amateur Trap Shooters' association today. The telegram stated that the dates had been recognized, and that the events would be placed on the registered list.

Blue rock artists from all parts of the country are expected at the shoot, as inquiries have been coming from far and near. The two-day events are expected to draw one of the best crowds of trap shots of the year.

All records of the shoot will be official, as a result of the registering of the event.
