Brazilian Federals In City of Mundury
BUENOS AIRES, Aug. 13.—Official advices concerning the campaign against the Brazilian rebels in the state of Sao Paulo, as forwarded by the Santos correspondent of La Nación, report that a column of Brazilian federal troops entered the city of Mundury, an important military point west of Sao Paulo, and are proceeding to Chavantes near the Parana-Panama river.

50,000 IN CHINA VICTIMS OF FLOOD
SHANGHAI, Aug. 13.—(AP)—Millions have been rendered homeless and at least 50,000 persons have been drowned in devastating floods which are sweeping widespread areas of China, submerging tens of thousands of villages. Thousands of refugees are pouring into Peking. It is impossible to get even an approximate estimate of the fatalities, but 50,000 is said to be a conservative estimate.

Unusually devastating floods with accompanying widespread destruction of property have been reported from various sections of China during the last few weeks. Late in July there were serious inundations in the provinces of Chihli and Hunan. On Saturday further floods were reported from Wensui and Sinkiang, but it was reported that the loss of life had been up until that time, comparatively small.

Salt Lake Man Is Killed By Motorcar
HOOD RIVER, Ore., Aug. 13.—Grant Wilcox of Salt Lake City, was struck and fatally injured by a motor car today on the Columbia river highway, just east of Wyeth where he and his brother, who were on a motor trip, had stopped to take a photograph. Grant Wilcox died shortly after the accident.

Boy Shot Through Stomach By Chum
MARSHFIELD, Ore., Aug. 13.—Mrs. Wilson, 14, son of James Wilson, an employee of the Stout Lumber company, was shot through the stomach accidentally today while he and another boy were playing with a 22 calibre pistol. The boy was removed to a hospital.
