HOP PICKING NEAR HARRISBURG ENDED

HARRISBURG, Aug. 12.—Hop picking in the Johnson and Hochdanner yards was completed Monday. The gathering of the early hops in the large Cartwright and Lowell yards a mile south of town will probably be completed Wednesday. This means that only a week and a half will be consumed in finishing a job that has heretofore required between three and four weeks.

The great speed of the harvest is due to the fact that there are great bodies of pickers. Tourists who pass through upon learn of the hop yards and many of them tarry at the yards a while to experience something new to them. Scores of tourists as well as non-transients, have been turned away from the larger yards. During the week-end over 75 tourists left one of the biggest yards.

Springfield Fines Four Visitors Who Break Traffic Laws

SPRINGFIELD, Aug. 13.—Work on remodeling the Springfield post office began Tuesday morning. Geo. Perkins has the general contract, and Long and Cross are doing the plumbing.

The south wall of the office is to be set back and approximately one-half of the present furnace room fixed over. All the walls in both of the two rooms on the southeast corner of the office will also be added to the main office.

Another job-light is to be put in, and the entire lighting system is to be fixed over. All the walls in both of the rooms on the lobby are to be cleaned and re-plastered, as well as the ceilings.

The sand-blown windows in the partition containing the mail boxes is to be taken out and replaced with clear glass.

Among new pieces of furniture to be installed will be a fire-proof, burglar-proof safe, desks, chairs, tables and racks. The building belongs to the Commercial State bank of Springfield.

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A. F. OF L. READY TO OPEN CAMPAIGN FOR LAFOLLETTE
