Le Roy Lawrence, suffering from nervous disorders resulting from his wartime experiences, was taken to the veterans' hospital in Portland by J. F. Lammer, traveling attendant for the veterans' bureau, who was in Eugene Tuesday.

Calvin B. Marlow, another local ex-service man, was expected to leave this morning for Prescott, Ariz., to enter the government tuberculosis hospital.

Miss Grace Norton, secretary of the local Red Cross chapter, explained, said, contrary to the general belief, the after effects of the war are not about over. In fact, some authorities have estimated that the peak will not be reached until 1926. Many of the veterans, who returned from France in good health apparently, are now beginning to feel the effects of their experiences.

False Bridge Work Rushed at Harrisburg

HARRISBURG, Ore., Aug. 12.—Work on the false bridge which the Portland Bridge company is constructing here preparatory to building the two central piers for the Pacific highway bridge across the Willamette is going forward by leaps and bounds. The false work extends well over a third of the way across the river now, and by Monday night was only a few feet from the spot where work on the first pier will be begun. The company does not propose to halt the false work upon reaching this spot, but will continue driving piling well over the site where the second middle pier will be erected.

As soon as this false piling is driven to the desired length, work will begin on the excavation of both the middle piers which the concern proposes to have completed before high water.

Fire Precaution Is Needed Up McKenzie During Round Work

Conditions in the up-McKenzie district are excellent so far, but only great care will prevent a fire, according to S. L. Taylor, from the station, who was down Tuesday afternoon for supplies. He reports some 40 men are working on trails, roads, and watching his territory.

EUGENEANS VISIT YELLOWSTONE PARK

The Yellowstone river is so low that the fish are not fit to eat, and fishing there is hardly worth while, according to J. A. McKevitt, manager of the Eugene office of the Western Union Telegraph company, who returned Tuesday from a three-week tour to the Yellowstone national park. He was accompanied on the trip by Mrs. McKevitt.

The McKevitts drove to Pocatello, Idaho, where their son, William McKevitt, underwent a major operation. Mr. McKevitt said today.

The ordinary scenery at the Yellowstone has nothing on the Upper McKenzie highway and the Cascade, Mr. McKevitt believed. The geysers, the grand canyon, and the Yellowstone lake are wonderful, however, he declared. Roads to the national park are practically all dirt after leaving Oregon, but they are about 75 per cent perfect, he said.

Between the Dalles and Arlington is the worst stretch of road in Oregon, he said. There the winds have taken the surface from the way until there is a regular washboard.

Old Faithful geyser, where the McKevitts camped for one night, there were 1900 cars. Bears came up to the cars to beg for food. Near Mammoth, Idaho, on the way over, jackrabbits were so thick in the fields that they looked like stubble, Mr. McKevitt declared. One rabbit drive, put on by the Idahoans, resulted in the capture of 17,000 rabbits in a single day.

Mr. McKevitt, whose vacation is to extend for a few weeks more, is planning a fishing trip up the McKenzie river now.

"I'm going after the best fishing in the world now," he said.

LEGION POST HERE HAS 505 MEMBERS. RESULT OF DRIVE

Lane County Post No. 3 of the American Legion now boasts a membership list of 505, according to George E. Love, commander. A little over a week ago there were 452 members, the remainder being added since that time, while the state-wide campaign for members was being conducted.

There are approximately 712 members in the county, as there were 162 before the campaign was launched, and 100 reported added since that time. A few more are expected to be reported today or Thursday, according to Mr. Love.

The campaign was conducted throughout the state in an effort to bring the Hanford MacNider trophy to Oregon this year. The trophy is awarded each year to the state making the largest percentage of gain in membership.

The Eugene post is the largest in the state of Oregon, with the exception of the Portland post.

Cottage Grove post now has a membership list of 85, according to word from Ivan Warner, commander. Springfield has 81 members, Howard Freeland, commander, has telephoned.

Junction City has about 30, and Creswell more than 20. Neither of the two posts had made their definite reports today.

The membership list of 505 in the Eugene post is considered remarkable among the legion posts of the nation, because of the fact that there are only 530 known former service men of the World war in the city.
