ERECTION OF NEW BUILDING PLANNED FOR SPRINGFIELD

SPRINGFIELD, Aug. 15.—A new building may go up on Main street east of the Commercial State bank of Springfield, if plans being made by J. A. Seavey, valley hop grower, materialize. Mr. Seavey has asked local contractors to make estimates on a one-story concrete structure 40 by 80. Mr. Seavey is at present at his hop yard in Corvallis, and it has not been definitely decided on the construction of the building.

Several other property holders in Springfield are contemplating building in the near future. The First National bank of Springfield has plans for the construction of a building on Main and Fifth streets.

It is expected that many of the prospective builders, who are holding off until the Nation cutoff is sufficiently progressed, will start their construction.

OCEAN VOYAGE IN LIGHT BOAT FAILS

MANILA, P. I., Aug. 15.—(AP)—It is believed that Ira Sparks of Peru, Ind., who sailed from Honolulu in January for the Holy Land in a 23-foot dory, perished off the coast of Zamboanga. A dory boat named "Darius," Honolulu, has been found stranded on Gatusan Island on the eastern coast of Zamboanga, according to a telegram received by consular headquarters. There was no trace of Sparks.

Sparks arrived in Honolulu from San Francisco in a packing box aboard one of the trans-Pacific steamers last year. On his departure in the dory he announced that he was bound for the Holy Land to seek the true word of God. He arrived at Tandang, Surigao Province, Philippine Islands, March 22, and soon afterwards announced his intention of continuing his journey to Singapore and thence to the Holy Land.

AMERICAN MINISTER DOES INDIAN DANCE FOR SCOUT VISITORS

COPENHAGEN, Aug. 15.—A large attendance at an entertainment given by the American Boy Scouts, attending the International Boy Scout jamboree here, in honor of American Minister Prince and Mrs. Prince, was delighted when the American diplomat representative took the center of the stage and performed an Indian dance while he sang the famous Wind song of the Pueblo Indians.

The entertainment began after a campfire dinner when the Scouts, clad in the costumes of the American Indians sang Indian songs in honor of their chieftain guest.

It is understood the dancing contest judges intend to award first place to the Scottish dancers and second to the American Scouts on the theory that the Scottish dances are true folk performances while the American exhibition cannot be truly of folk origin because the performers are not American Indians.

Sheriff Is Sought For Alleged False Imprisonment of 4

TACOMA, Wash., Aug. 15.—Matt Starwich, King county sheriff, was being sought today by Deputy Sheriff Paul Jeffrey of Pierce county, who is armed with a warrant charging the King county official with a gross misdemeanor for the alleged false imprisonment and mistreatment of the four Tacoma men charged with the robbery of the Anacortes State Bank last April.

A criminal complaint charging Sheriff Starwich with violating the law was sworn out before Justice Blanche Funk Miller, by John Sorley.

NATIONS IN FAVOR OF DAWES REPORT, DECLARES HUGHES

NEW YORK, Aug. 15.—Secretary of State Hughes, returning here on the President Harding, after a month's visit in Europe, expressed the belief that the Dawes reparations report would be accepted by all the powers concerned, and would "be put into effect very soon."

Mr. Hughes said that in his opinion the acceptance of the Dawes plan did not hinge upon the date of the evacuation of the Ruhr, which was reported today as having caused a split between the German and the French representatives at the London conference.

"Acceptance of the report," he said, "will not hinge upon any such hypothesis. Unquestionably the report will be accepted."

Referring to dispatches stating that newspapers of Soviet Russia had charged that his visit to Europe was solely for the purpose of preventing European countries from entering into relations with the Russian government, Mr. Hughes said: "I did not discuss Russian affairs over there."

SAVED BY WIRES, MAN CUTS THROAT

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 14.—After escaping from a local sanitarium Wednesday, and leaping from the window of a hotel room on the third floor, becoming entangled in telephone wires, one flight below and being hauled to safety, Herbert Lock, 52, was found in his room today with his throat slashed and a knife in his hand, according to the police. Lock is in a serious condition, attendants at the hospital where he was taken, said.

SPRINGFIELD C. C. SECRETARY QUILTS

SPRINGFIELD, Aug. 15.—Rev. H. C. Ethell, for a long time secretary of the Springfield Chamber of Commerce, this week resigned from his duties. He presented his resignation at a meeting of the group Thursday night. He expects to leave soon for California.

Later Mr. Ethell may make his permanent home in California. He expects to take up his duties soon in the ministry of the Nazarene faith.

Compulsory School Laws Are Attacked

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—Two cases involving the right of states to require children between the ages of 8 and 16 to attend public schools were docketed in the supreme court. The appeals were brought by Governor Pierce and Attorney-General Van Winkle of Oregon and District Attorney Myers of Multnomah county of that state.

Proceedings instituted by the society of the Holy Names of Jesus and Mary and the Hill Military Academy in the federal district of Oregon, contesting the constitutionality of the law on the grounds that it would prohibit children from attending parochial and private schools resulted in a temporary injunction restraining the enforcement of the act.

Better Farm Trend Reported By Meyer

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—Agriculture has definitely turned the corner and is on the road to permanent recovery. Eugene Meyer, Jr., managing director of the War Finance Corporation, has reported to President Coolidge after a trip of inspection through the west.

"Conditions everywhere in the west," Mr. Meyer said, "are improving rapidly. It is the most radical improvement in agriculture in years. The most hopeful sign is the trend toward purchasing of farm lands. The farmers are finally getting out of the hole."

20-Piece Band to Postpone Program

SPRINGFIELD, Aug. 15.—The Springfield band of 20 pieces which has been giving a series of public concerts, one each Saturday night, has postponed its program for this week-end until next Wednesday night. Hereafter the concerts will be given on Wednesday nights. After the coming concert the entertainments will have to be financed by public subscription. It was announced this week by Bandmaster John C. Parker.
