194 EMPLOYED BY AID OF RED CROSS

One hundred and ninety-four men and women secured work through the local employment bureau this week. Of this number 140 were men, and 54 women.

The positions for men were classified as follows: farm hands, 7; prune pickers, 47; casual, 14; common laborers, 20; cooks, 1; mill and logging camps, 18; machinists, 3; millwrights, 3; teamsters, 10; track workers, 15.

The women workers were distributed as follows: prune pickers, 37; household workers, 5; nurses, 3; fruit sorters, 4; chambermaids, 1; kitchen helpers, 2; waitresses, 2.

To Execute Woman, Now Child Is Born

BRUNN, Czechoslovakia, Aug. 15.—The execution of Frau Maria Hanika for the murder of her husband which was recently delayed until she gave birth to a child, will take place soon, the authorities announced.

The day the child was born 29,000 Czechs crowded around at the prison where Frau Hanika is confined, with instructions that the money should be turned over to the infant, a girl, when she reached the age of 18.

Frau Hanika's husband was an army captain, and according to the court records, she plotted with a man early in the year to rid herself of him because she was tired of him. The wife, on the stand, declared she was not in love with her accomplice and contended that she had always been faithful to her husband but was obsessed with the idea that she must obtain freedom from her marriage vows.

Cruiser Hits Ice; Propeller Damaged

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—The cruiser Raleigh on duty in northern waters, in connection with the army round-the-world flight, advised the navy department by radio Thursday that both starboard propellers had been damaged when she bumped into the ice recently in exploring along the coast of Greenland to find suitable landing places for the fliers.

Apparently the damage will not prevent the Raleigh continuing operations on the world flight patrol line until the summer has succeeded in reaching this side of the Atlantic.

Sign Payroll "Mrs." Says U. S. Official

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—Married women who insist upon retaining their maiden names to assert their individuality or for any other reason get no official sympathy from Comptroller General McCarl.

In a ruling to the department of the interior, Comptroller McCarl holds married women employed by the government must use the surname of their husbands when they sign the payrolls.

NEW POWER PLANT ON KLAMATH RIVER WILL AID FISHING

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 15.—The federal power commission has granted a permit for the construction of a power project on the Klamath river, which is expected to conserve fishing on the river and at the same time allow the development of its power possibilities, according to the San Francisco office of the Eureka chamber of commerce.

The permit was granted to the Electro-Metals company of San Francisco. Under its terms the company will be permitted to maintain existing conditions of fish migration or culture in the river as approved by the secretary of commerce. It was stated, The chamber's announcement said that granting of the permit could be taken as the first step toward an ultimate expenditure of \$100,000,000 for the development of power facilities alone.

1200 PIONEERS AT COAST GATHERING

PORT ORFORD, Ore., Aug. 15.—The "Pioneers" reunion which opened here yesterday was attended by upwards of 1200 persons from various parts of Oregon and particularly from the Coos Bay section. Escorted by the Band, Danion Beachmen and Boy Scouts, the "Pioneers" of 1859 and for 19 years representative from the first district, arrived this afternoon. A large crowd gathered on the beach where he was to speak. He was introduced by Mr. R. Tichenor, grandson of Captain William M. Pitner. It was interesting that today's address, probably his last, was given by Mr. Hermann just 63 years after his first public appearance. Senator Hall of Marshfield responded to Mr. Hermann.

The program this afternoon was preceded by a band concert. All kinds of seafood were served at supper last night and at 9 o'clock the battle of Battle Rock was reproduced. Frank M. Langlois, the first white child born at Port Orford, was among the many notable pioneers present.

Big Army Airship Makes War at Sea On Fancied Enemy

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—On recommendation of the bureau of aeronautics, the navy department today ordered the Airship Shenandoah at Lakehurst to continue her tests at sea within the next few weeks, preventing the carrying out of her proposed flight to Des Moines, Ia.

The trip to Des Moines had been tentatively decided upon before the Shenandoah went north for her test at the floating mooring mast aboard the tender Patoka. That test was a complete success and in consequence it was decided to use the Shenandoah extensively in a series of scouting tests at sea off the Atlantic coast, which are now being planned.

In the course of the exercises she will range far at sea in search of imaginary enemy scouting fleets.

While the plan for a western trip has not been abandoned completely, the exercises will occupy the Shenandoah for a considerable time. She is expected, however, to make her scheduled trans-continental flight in October.

Bloodless Revolt Hope of Laborites, Says Frank Johns

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Aug. 15.—Control of government by representatives of the producers is the aim of the socialist labor party, Frank T. Johns, of Spokane, Wash., its nominee for president, declared.

"In the society of the future every individual will be affiliated with some union," Johns said. "The national governing body, corresponding to the present congress will be composed of representatives chosen by those employed in various industries. All will be represented. There will be no capitalistic class, because collective ownership will obtain."

The socialist labor party, the nominee explained, hopes to gain its ends by consent of the majority vote.

"We hope for a bloodless revolution," he said, "but whether it will be so or not rests with the capitalist class."

23,856 TOURISTS IN EUGENE SINCE 'APRIL IS REPORT

Since April of this year, 23,856 automobiles belonging to tourists have stopped at the Eugene municipal airport. Estimating four persons to the car, although that is a low figure, 23,856 persons from all parts of the United States, Canada, and other nations have registered at the airport since April.

July is the largest month with a total of 2180 cars registered. For the first 14 days of August there have been 1150. April, of course being the first month of the tourist season had the smallest number with 854.
