

2 MORE NATIONS TURN DOWN PACT FOR DISARMAMENT

GENEVA, Aug. 21.—(AP)—Jugoslavia and Australia have joined the United States, Great Britain, Germany, Russia and other states in rejecting the pact for mutual assistance provisionally framed as a means of securing a reduction of armaments. Portugal has notified the League it accepted the treaty in principle, but considers the guarantee afforded in case of aggression insufficiently clear. Jugoslavia is of the opinion that a general reduction of armaments is a general problem, "until some practical solution is found of the problem of assurance."
