

ZR-3 PASSES BY AZORES ISLANDS; HEADS WESTWARD

HORTA, Azores, Oct. 13.—(AP)—The giant dirigible ZR-3 passed Fayal at 2:35 o'clock this afternoon (local time) on her way to Lakehurst, N. J. She was flying in a westerly direction, traveling at a good speed.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13.—(AP)—A moderate disturbance in the mid-Atlantic was reported today practically in the path of the ZR-3 by the naval ships on observation duty in connection with the trans-oceanic flight. The latest forecast was relayed by the cruiser Milwaukee.

On the basis of forecasts, officials here predicted the cruiser would be assisted rather than hindered by weather disturbances. They pointed out that from the Azores the ZR-3 might expect to have favoring westward winds if conditions now prevailing continue and by maintaining her present indicated speed, would arrive at her destination about 9 o'clock Wednesday morning.

LAKEHURST, N. J., Oct. 13.—(AP)—Officials at the naval air station here expressed belief today that the ZR-3 would arrive here about noon Wednesday. Officials figured on the basis of a 4300-mile trip.

SHENANDOAH WILL LEAVE ON TUESDAY

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Oct. 13.—While the navy dirigible Shenandoah swung at her mooring mast on North Island, near here, today awaiting the hour of her departure fixed at 7:30 o'clock tomorrow morning, two naval fliers were preparing to hop off for the north to superintend preparations for the craft's landing near Tacoma. The two officers who will leave by airplane bound up the coast today are Lieutenant B. H. Wyatt of the North Island naval air station and Lieutenant Charles E. Rosenthal of the Shenandoah. Captain Moriarty of the marine observation with Machineists Mate C. Kilditt, plan to accompany Wyatt and Rosenthal in another plane. Lieutenants Wyatt and Rosenthal expect to reach the dirigible's mooring mast in Washington state tomorrow. Immediately on their arrival they will give the "ground crew" there a course of intensive training in mooring dirigibles in preparation for the arrival of the Shenandoah.

Secret Agreement May Be Introduced

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 13.—State attorneys in the prosecution of Former County Commissioner Charles S. Budeen made a move today to introduce the secret agreement entered into March 6, 1923, by Engineers Ira G. Hedrick and Robert E. Kremers covering their division of fees from the trans-Willamette bridge work. Deputy District Attorney George Mowry told the court that, if the pact were admitted as evidence he state would argue that Kremers took out the first \$30,000 from the joint fee to help pay for the engineering job. Budeen is accused in the indictment of accepting or agreeing to accept money from Kremers for his vote. Defense attorneys immediately objected and another technical argument, similar to those which have interrupted the trial since its opening three weeks ago, was on.

University Student Arrested, Fined \$5

Failure to give the right-of-way to a passing automobile resulted in a \$5 fine to Ralph O. Clave, 2335 Alder street, and a student at the University of Oregon, who appeared before Judge Gilmore in municipal court this morning to answer complaint filed by A. J. Shortes, city traffic officer. Mrs. Joseph Campbell was driving the auto which was struck by Mr. Clave's machine. Her machine was badly damaged on one side. The accident occurred at Eleventh avenue west and Lawrence street. The student declared he would have to quit school on account of the fine. "If you can afford to drive an automobile, you can afford to pay a fine for your carelessness," admonished Judge Gilmore.

Henry Ford Case Refused By Court

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13.—The supreme court today refused to consider whether Henry Ford owes Edward S. Huff \$11,000,000 as royalty upon magnets used upon 4,500,000 autos. Huff claimed he was paid \$10,000 by Ford for the invention but that he was also to receive \$250 for each magnet used. The lower federal courts held that Huff had neglected to press his claim within the time allowed by law.

DEMAND FOR MILL HANDS CONTINUES

Less demand for laborers for construction work on highways is reported by Frank Armistage, director of the United States employment service in Eugene. There is a fair demand for saw mill and logging camp hands, both skilled and unskilled, he says. Fall seeding is bringing some demand for farm help, and there have been a few requests for dairy workers. Due to an active building program in Portland, demand for building workers continues, says a report reaching Mr. Armistage today. There is a demand also for seasonal workers in apple harvest, such as apple pickers and packers. Salem reports the supply and demand for labor not heavy during the past week. Rainy weather interfered with farming and agricultural work. There is no surplus of farm help in the Salem section, and logging camps and sawmills are taking on more men. At Marshfield common labor is plentiful. No new mill operations have started, and lumber manufacturing plants are working on shifts of 8 hours.

AVIATOR TO FORM CLASS IN EUGENE

A class in aviation may be formed in Eugene and on the University of Oregon campus by Lieutenant Archie R. Loomis, Marine Corps, who has bought an airplane and has stationed it on the municipal aviation field. Although only 22 years old, Lieutenant Loomis is an experienced flier. He attended the university, taking a pre-engineering course, until the spring of 1925, when he left to enlist in aviation work. He spent nine months at Brooks field, near San Antonio, Texas, completing the primary school of flying instruction, and later took the advanced army courses at Kelly field, where he received a commission as second lieutenant in the aviation reserve. He has flown every type of airplane manufactured. Lieutenant Loomis' plane is an army Jenny model. He proposes to organize a class of young men desiring to learn aviation, and may work in co-operation with the R. O. T. C. at the university. He expects to complete his course in engineering at the university, being a junior this year.

Bend Contractor Surrenders Son To Federal Court

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 13.—Freeman B. Jackson, 65, a contractor of Bend, Ore., today surrendered his son Theodore Jackson, 22, to the federal court here on a bond which the father had given when the son was convicted on a white slavery charge. The youth is under sentence of 15 months in McNeil's Island penitentiary which Judge Wolverton said he will now have to serve. The elder Jackson came from Bend last Saturday after hearing, he said, that his son intended to go to Mexico. He induced the young man to go to the federal court, saying he wished to consult with an attorney regarding the case. "I gave the boy a chance to make good," the father told Judge Wolverton. "He hasn't done it, and I can't take chances any longer. I haven't got much, judge, and if I lose what I have on this bond, I'll be without anything."

Brothers Guilty Of Selling Liquor

MEDFORD, Ore., Oct. 13.—Thomas and Foster Barkley, brothers, indicted in the federal court on charges of violating the prohibition law, in the possession and selling of liquor on the Klamath reservation, entered pleas of guilty before Federal Judge R. S. Bean this morning, and were given fines of \$250 and \$200 respectively, the court granting 90 days to pay the fines. No jail sentence was inflicted.

Rudolph Otto Is Found To Be Guilty

KELSO, Wash., Oct. 13.—Rudolph Otto was found guilty of first degree murder in a verdict returned early yesterday morning. The jury recommended life imprisonment for Otto, a veteran of the World war, who was charged with killing his wife in a dynamite explosion.

STATE SPORTSMEN ARE OPPOSED BY GAME COMMISSION

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 13.—The state game commission, in monthly session today, agreed after several hours' discussion to prepare a resolution association in requesting the removal of Richard W. Price from the game board.

The executive committee of the sportsmen's association at a recent meeting at Eugene called attention to a resolution to Governor Pierce to the purported non-attendance of Commissioner Price at commission meetings, and to his alleged discordance with the commission.

The resolution charged that Price, manager of the hotel at Crater lake, was working toward the inclusion of Diamond lake in Crater Lake National park. According to Price, the government has announced that Diamond lake will not at any time be annexed to Crater Lake National park. Commissioners Ben F. Dorris of Eugene, J. W. Maloney of Pendleton and H. H. Clifford of Prairie City were instructed by Chairman I. N. Fleischer to prepare a resolution denying certain allegations made in the resolution under discussion, to be forwarded to Governor Pierce.

TO CURB SPEEDING NEAR CITY SCHOOLS

Warning to University of Oregon students and others who fail to observe the "slow" signs near city schools was made today by Judge George Gilmore of the municipal court. "Complaints are coming in from school patrons and others that the reckless driving is going on unchecked," said Judge Gilmore. "This is to serve warning that any offender coming into this court on such a charge will get the limit. Lives of little children must be protected." Traffic Officer A. H. Shortes announced that he is going to keep a close watch on the highways in the vicinity of Thirtieth and Alder, Geary and Patterson and Seventh and High. If necessary demands that several motorists must be made examples, the city is prepared to prosecute them to the limit, says Mayor E. B. Parks.

BOYS BACK FROM ATTEMPTED TRIP

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 13.—Their attempted to "see the world" blasted by police officials of Boone, Iowa, where they were apprehended, R. L. Sherman, escaped convict and Elton Quinlan, 14-year-old son of John Quinlan, chief engineer at the state penitentiary, are back in Salem today. They were returned from Iowa yesterday by the father of the boy, sent to get them by Warden Dalrymple, and this morning Sherman related to him and the boy craved capture for nearly a month, but refused to admit that he enticed the boy into running away by telling him glowing stories of adventure and places to be seen, as charged by the prison officials. Sherman said that he met Quinlan near a swimming hole in West Salem about six o'clock in the evening of the day following his break from the prison grounds. From there, he said, they walked to Rickreall where a truck picked them up and carried them to McMinnville. They walked and bummed rides into Tillamook and from there worked their way on to Astoria. At Astoria, according to Sherman, they shipped aboard a small schooner for San Francisco, and from there beat their way east by railroad, bound for Elgin, Ill., where Sherman's father lives. They spent two days in Green River, where Warden Dalrymple had been advised they had been seen, but evaded capture there, as they did in Denver, where they stayed one day.

Boys to Banquet Tuesday Evening At Local Church

THREE CANDIDATES WILL HAVE NAMES IN SINGLE GROUP

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 13.—(AP)—The three candidates for positions on the Oregon supreme court bench to be voted on at the election November 4, must have their names on the ballot in a single group, with no information that they are to be elected to fill vacancies. The elections are to be for full six year terms. The supreme court so held today in an opinion by Justice Bean, in the original proceeding in mandamus of the state on relation to C. J. Smith, plaintiff, against Sam A. Koser, secretary of state, defendant.

The opinion is a victory for the plaintiff and knocks out Koser's certification of the ballot, whereby C. P. Coshaw, democratic-progressive candidate, and H. H. Burt, republican appear as aspirants to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Justice Lawrence T. Harris, and separate from these, Percy R. Kelly appears as an independent candidate to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Justice John M. McCourt. Under this arrangement they were to be elected to fill the unexpired terms.

The opinion holds that the manner in which Secretary Koser arranged the names on the ballots is unconstitutional. With the three names appearing in a single group, and with the voters instructed on the ballot to "vote for two" it is generally believed Judge O. P. Coshaw, incumbent by appointment of the governor after Harris' resignation, will have an advantage that he did not have with the names arranged as certified by the secretary of state.
