

FORT WORTH WINS IN ANNUAL CONTEST FOR BEST RAILWAY

FORT WORTH, Texas, Oct. 13.—The Northern Texas Traction Company, of Fort Worth, Texas, today was awarded the Charles A. Coffin prize for accomplishing more outstanding achievements than any other electric railway in the United States during the last year. The prize, consisting of \$10,000 cash and a gold medal, is donated annually by the General Electric company through the American Electric Railway association.

The winner scored heavily in popularizing service, creating good-will and maintaining friendly relations with its employees. It also made notable accomplishments in effecting economies, improving construction, preventing accidents and financing.

"We are always doing something in the public interest," was the succinct statement made by the company summarizing its accomplishments.

Activity in causing the building of several hundred new homes along its lines had much to do with the company's victory. In a desire to increase traffic, particularly on short hauls, the company made a survey of all vacant lots within four blocks of its lines and found there were 24,000 of them. It then encouraged the building of homes on many of these lots.

Use of the colloquial "Howdy" also helped gain good-will. Several cars were painted white and the greeting, "Howdy, glad to see you. Ride and save the difference," was painted on the cars. These cars are supplied with special uniforms similar to those worn by yachting captains.

All cars are repainted every nine months and kept scrupulously clean at all times. Company employees participate in all civic affairs. Sessions of a courtesy school are run regularly. Information cards distributed among passengers brought criticism from only 9 percent. Stringent efforts are made to eliminate accidents.

Convinced that people would rather ride street cars than buses, the company recently supplanted a bus line with traction service and increased the receipts from \$50 to \$110 a day. A public celebration marked the opening of the line.

The United Railways & Electric company, of Baltimore, and the Interstate Public Service company, of Indianapolis, were runners up in the race for the award. Fort Worth winning only by a shade. Other companies given special commendation for showing last year were the Annapolis & Fox River Electric company, Charleston, S. C., Consolidated Railway & Lighting company, Memphis Street Railway company, San Francisco-Sacramento Railroad company, Sheepshead Bay, N. Y., and the Union Street Railway company, New Bedford, Mass.

AMERICA POPULAR WITH PEKIN FOLKS

PEKING, Oct. 13. —(AP)—The American legation has taken cognizance of an apparently authentic report that the ministry of education has issued instructions to authorities in the provinces to cut down the quota of students to be sent to America.

"In recent years there have been too many private students going to America," the ministry in question is alleged to have said in its communication to the provinces. "During the last 18 months the number is equal to 67 per cent of the total number of students going abroad. The reason why most of the students go to America is that they easily obtain admission into American colleges where they become special students. In two or three years they return to China, being considered to have graduated."

"Although there are not a few who go to the United States to obtain a real education, a majority go simply to get a degree. Even if the standard of education in the United States is higher than in other countries, the number of students should be restricted, otherwise it may result in the setting up of a special intellectual influence in the country."

"Now with the enforcement of the new American immigration law there is the more reason to check Chinese students from going there. Beginning this year, any vacancy in the quota of government students going abroad should be filled by those desirous of pursuing their studies in Europe."

Red Lake Indians Catch Many Fish

RED LAKE FALLS, Minn., Oct. 11.—(AP)—Red Lake Indians, the model Chippewa band of Minnesota, gathered this summer 750,000 pounds of fish from Red Lake, it has been announced by H. B. Dooley, superintendent of the Red Lake reservation.

During the last seven years the Indians, under a contract with the state of Minnesota, have received more than \$500,000 for fish taken from the lake.

The fishing season lasts but three months during the summer, but last summer four Indians, with the help of their squaws, earned \$1000 each and one pair of fishermen, buck and squaw, cleared \$1500.

Roman Babies Had No Sanitary Bottles

FOLKESTONE, England, Oct. 13.—(AP)—Proof that babies of the Roman expansion era were accustomed to the luxury of the nursing bottle has been found during excavating on the site of an ancient Roman city near Folkestone. The archaeologists have unearthed the nipple of a baby's bottle made of stone, and of a shape identical with the latest in modern bottles. The nipple also is made of stone through which a small hole is pierced, and the bottle itself is very heavy.

ALTOONA'S HOBBOES HAVE FINE SHELTER

ALTOONA, Pa., Oct. 13.—(AP)—Although it's only an old barn, it has a reputation throughout the United States. It is known as Hagerty's Barn and it is located on the outskirts of Altoona.

Years ago a man named Hagerty, who lived just outside the limits of this city, owned the barn, which became a favorite stopping place for the knights of the road traveling along the route of the present Lincoln Highway. Mr. Hagerty never objected to the hoboes stopping in his barn, even after fire, believed to have been started by them, destroyed the original building.

Every night from two or three to a dozen hoboes stop there. Meals are cooked nearby. Frequently the visitors do their laundry and string the clothes on ropes near the barn. A resident of this city, traveling in the west this summer, was asked by a man from California if he knew where Hagerty's barn was located. The Altoonian replied in the affirmative, and the western man said he and many "traveling friends" had stopped at the place.

The funds will be used in the construction of an additional building for the children at the W. C. T. U. farm home in the college city.

Germans Call For Light on Who It Was Started War

MUNSTER, Westphalia, Germany, Oct. 13.—(AP)—That the allied governments deliberately keep their people ignorant of the Russian, Austrian and German publications of official documents pertaining to the circumstances leading to the outbreak of the war, is charged by the sixteenth congress of German State Archivists, held here recently. Furthermore, it is alleged that the allied governments refuse stubbornly to open their state archives for scientific research work as to the diplomatic string-pulling behind the scenes, previous to the war.

In the manifesto, unanimously adopted by the assembly, the French colleagues of the archivists have been called upon to come out of the dark and contribute their share to the enlightenment of the world at large as to the real causes of the war, for the sake "of justice and the establishment of unbiased truth."

Parole Board Has Cullen Case Held

Recommendations for the parole of E. M. Cullen of this city who is now serving a two-year term in the state penitentiary on a charge of passing a check without sufficient funds in the bank to cover it were today made by Judge G. F. Skipworth. Cullen, a former member of the Eugene police force, was arrested and tried last December on a charge of passing the check for \$400 as payment on an automobile. He later left the city with the car, it is alleged. On his conviction of the charge he was sentenced to the two-year term by Judge Skipworth.

GERMAN PRINCES ARE MADE HAPPY BY HONEST TOIL

BERLIN, Oct. 13.—(AP)—The last ten years in Germany has deprived many a prince of his income, and sent him out to make a living along with the rest of the world. Not a few of the nobility, particularly among the younger generation, have said they were happier and more contented with their honest toil since they went to work than they were when they had nothing to do but count their income and look for thrills in sports, society or military maneuvers.

What the republic is to do with the property that once belonged to former Emperor William is still an open question. He possessed large estates in Brandenburg, Pomerania, Posen, Silesia and West Prussia, and other assets, which have been appraised at \$40,000,000, all of which he lost when he fled to Holland in 1918. His income today is relatively very modest indeed.

Other rich noblemen who today are living on greatly reduced incomes are the grand duke of Saxony-Weimar, the king of Wurtemberg, the grand duke of Oldenburg, and the prince of Schaumburg-Lippe.

It has been estimated that the former King of Saxony, Friedrich August, was loser to the extent of \$6,000,000. The Saxony diet now gives him \$80,000 a year.

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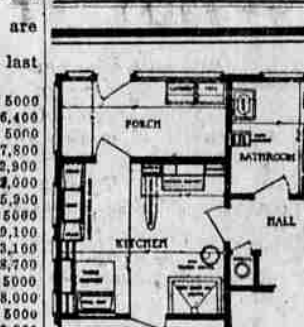
SHRINE TO HONOR CAPT. JAMES COOK

HONOLULU, Oct. 13.—(AP)—Crea-

tion of a British national shrine on the shores of Kealahou bay, island of Hawaii, where stands the monument to Captain James Cook, discoverer of the Hawaiian Islands who was killed by the inhabitants in a fight here on his second visit, was proposed here in an address of Sir Joseph Carruthers, prominent Australian statesman who represented Australia at the recent pan-Pacific food conservation conference.

Sir Joseph said that an effort would be made on behalf of the Australian commonwealth to obtain the ownership of a right of way from the Kona road to the monument where Captain Cook was slain, which is accessible now only by water. He added that a shrine of the spot would serve as a close link of friendship between the United States and Great Britain and between the territory and Australia.

CHINESE PHEASANT LAW IS CLEARED UP

Confusion among Eugene hunters regarding the difference between the date of opening the Chinese pheasant season as given in the state book of game laws, and the published announcement, was cleared up today by an announcement from Attorney-General L. H. Van Winkle.

The date for opening the Chinese pheasant season is October 15.

"The general laws of Oregon for 1924, setting the open season as from October 15 to October 21, in district 1, of which Lane county is a part, is the supreme authority, according to Mr. Van Winkle.

A copy of this decision has been received by local sportsmen, and is based on an opinion of the supreme court of July 23. The decision invalidates the rulings of the game commission of April 9.
