

Varsity Team Has Stiff Practice To Take On Stanford

Oregon this afternoon went through new scrimmage formations in preparation for its game with Stanford Saturday, Palo Alto, greatly encouraged by its 20 to 0 victory over Pacific Saturday on Hayward field.

The Forest Grove eleven displayed a startling forward pass attack and in the first quarter the ball was at all times in Oregon territory. Over anxiety cost Pacific a score in that period, when Jesse threw a beautiful pass to Weber, who fumbled on Oregon's 10-yard line, with no Oregon man in sight.

In the second period the visitors took advantage of the rather poor punting by Oregon and aided by a couple of sensational passes brought the ball twice to within the shadow of the Oregon goal line; but each time Pacific was repulsed.

Near the end of the half with the ball on Oregon's 10-yard line in Pacific's possession, Jesse passed over the goal line which Cash of Oregon intercepted and ran five yards before he was downed at the Oregon 1-yard line. The whistle saved the visitors from kicking behind their own goal line.

Oregon started a smashing offensive drive in the second half and made yardage almost at will with Jones making most gains. Oregon's first touchdown came after an 80-yard march from its own 20-yard line, aided by a 5-yard penalty to Pacific for off-side gave Oregon the ball on Pacific's 2-yard line and Jones bucked it over for score. Reed kicked goal.

Oregon's second score was from a blocked punt on Pacific's own 10-yard line, Shields falling on the ball over the line. Reed failed to kick goal. The Wolfpack made their last score three minutes before the game ended, on a pass, Anderson to Vitus, after the home boys had brought the ball from their own 30-yard line to Pacific's 20-yard line. Reed converted try for goal.

Oregon made most of its yardage on off-tackle bucks, getting 19 first downs in all, to eight for Pacific, which made seven from passes. Line up:

Game Hunting in All Forms to Be Opened Next Week

The hunting season is on in full swing in Lane county.

At this time of year open season is on for nearly every type of game animal and game bird. It is the moon of the stopwatch, the elysium of the nimrod.

One week more is left of deer hunting, and those who have not killed the big limit are planning to make one more trip. The season closes October 20.

From now until the first of the year you can shoot ducks, geese, rails, coots, Wilson snipe of Jack-snipe, and greater and lesser yellow-legs. The bag limit is 25 of such birds in a day and 30 in 7 consecutive days, except on geese, where the limit is eight in a day and not more than 30 in seven consecutive days.

Wednesday the Chinese pheasant season opens. Fields are thick with pheasants this year, and many hunters are planning to go out the first day. Sooty or blue grouse, ruffed grouse, bob white quail may also be shot during the season, which lasts until October 31.

Only two days remain in which the little silver gray squirrel may be killed. The season closes on this animal October 15, and he is under protection of Oregon law the rest of the year.

"Be careful where you shoot pheasants," is the warning from a large group of farmers near Eugene, who have announced their intention of prosecuting trespassers on their property to the full extent of the law. The notice is signed by the following:
