PENDLETON TO GET STATE GAME FARM

George M. Simpson, of Corvallis, superintendent of the state game farms, Lawrence Demogloski, until recently foreman of the Eugene farm, is in Pendleton supervising the construction of the third game farm in the state of Oregon.

Mr. Demogloski will be the foreman of the Umatilla farm, to be situated on a 40-acre tract recently purchased by the state game commission.

A modern five-room cottage will be built on the property, and buildings to house the Chinese pheasants and Hungarian partridges to be propagated.

Five acres will be covered by the pens, according to Mr. Simpson, the entire five acres will be surrounded by a solid board wall, set on a concrete foundation.

WASHINGTON HALF LEADS IN SCORING

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 21.—Hatschler, University of Washington halfback, playing his first year of college football, leads all players with 12 points in both the Pacific northwest intercollegiate and Pacific coast intercollegiate football conferences in scoring, according to figures compiled here.

Hatschler has converted more try-kicks than any other player, having 12. The other points were made by kicking two field goals and making seven touchdowns.
