

DAVIS TAKES RAP AT SECRET ORDER IN OHIO ADDRESS

DAVIS TRAIN ENROUTE TO NEW YORK, Oct. 24.—John W. Davis, democratic candidate for president, was returning to New York today from his final tour of the middle west, prepared to begin tomorrow the closing program of his personal campaign with an intensive drive in greater New York and vicinity.

The candidate ended his middle western trip last night in Cleveland with what was described as the most extended pronouncement regarding the Ku Klux Klan and other secret organizations made in recent years by a presidential candidate during a campaign. It was a spontaneous declaration, given in answer to a heckler and would not have been included in the Cleveland address, he said, had he been permitted to follow the outline of the speech prepared in advance.

Happy to Reply.

Mr. Davis told members of his party today, however, he was glad the questioner had interrupted the subject of secret organizations.

"I cannot believe," Mr. Davis answered the heckler, "that there is any man or woman in the United States interested in the outcome of this election who does not know my position. I stand for the fundamental guarantees in favor of religious faith and practices in the United States and against any threat to diminish the right of any man because of his choice to adopt the religion he learned at his mother's knee."

If ever the time came when he would not be willing to speak in defense of these principles, Mr. Davis said, "I hope my arm will fall palsied to my side and my tongue will cleave the roots of my mouth."

Member of Two.

The candidate said he was a member of two secret organizations, the Elks and Masons and asserted "if the day should ever come that they should seek to enter the political field, I would feel it my duty as a man and a citizen to sever 'my connection with them instantly.'"

Returning to his discussion of political matters, Mr. Davis said:

"In 1918, the republicans took to themselves a majority of one in the senate and that majority of one as someone remarked at the time out on bail. But nevertheless, the control of both branches of the national legislature rested with the republican party."

"And there was lead before it a program of reconstruction following the war of reduced taxation and of progressive politics which was absolutely ignored."

"And then in 1920 there swept over this country a great political landslide. All the discontents and disappointments of the war were marshaled to

DROP IN LIGHTING RATES OF VALLEY CITIES IS ASKED

SPRINGFIELD, Oct. 24.—(Special)—Announcement was made by C. M. Brewer, vice-president of the Mountain States Power company that a proposed new tariff covering electric service in all towns of the Willamette valley divisions of the company has been filed with the state public service commission.

The new tariff, according to Mr. Brewer, if accepted by the commission would mean an average decrease in the present lighting and cooking rates of about six and one-half percent and would affect the towns of Albany, Junction City, Harrisburg, Halsey, Brownsville, Tangent, Sheed, Coburg, Dallas, Independence, Monmouth, Philomath, Cottage Grove, Jefferson, Springfield, Corvallis, Stayton, Lebanon, Hickman and Marion as well as all rural territory adjacent thereto.

Further statement was made by Mr. Brewer that the new tariff had been filed in accordance with the power company's policy of giving good public utility service at the lowest possible cost to the consumer and explained that the proposed change in rates was due to economies in operation put into effect in the past year and to increased production and output of their various plants in the valley.

HASTE WILL SPEAK IN EUGENE OCT. 24

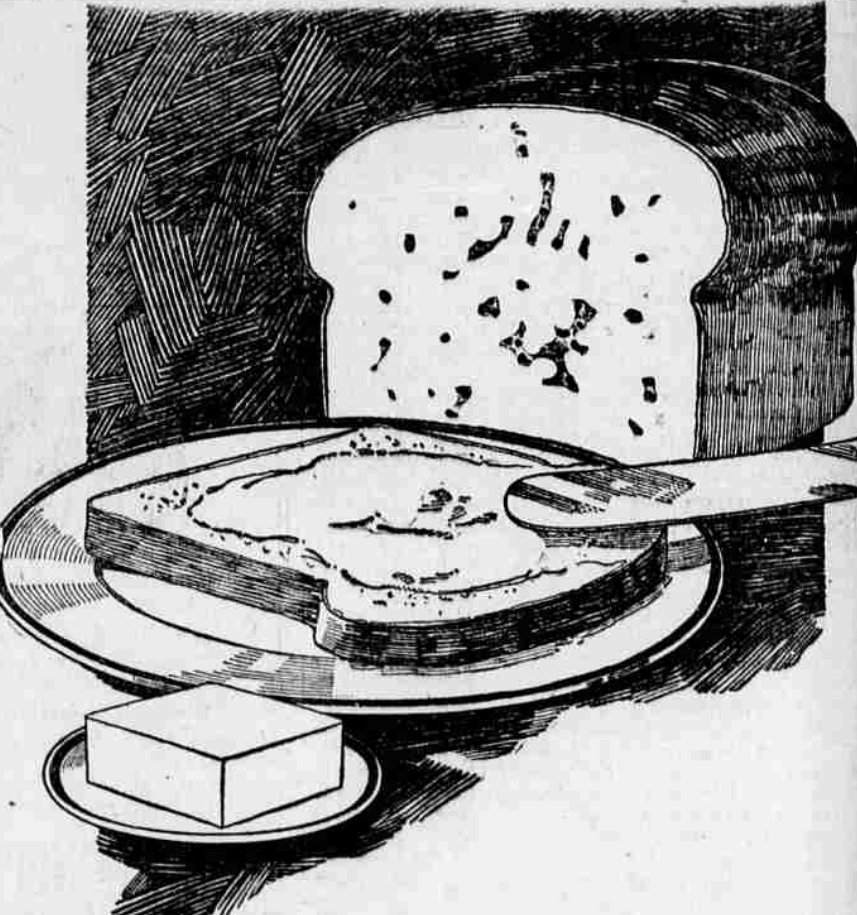
