

## TRAFFIC PROBLEMS AND BUS LINES TO BE INVESTIGATED

Dissatisfaction arising out of the angle parking ordinance of the city and the bus line proposal will result in the appointment of a new traffic committee at the next meeting of the city council, which will re-open the entire traffic situation in Eugene for consideration, announces Mayor R. B. Parks.

Upon recommendation of Mr. W. R. Wallace of the police committee, the council Monday night will pass on the proposal to form a new committee, composed of business men, auto dealers and councilmen, to consider changes in the city traffic laws.

"The ordinance to regulate bus lines will probably come within the province of this committee," says Mayor Parks. "We want to go into the whole matter thoroughly, give everybody a fair deal and a chance to voice his opinion in the matter, and then provide ordinances that can be enforced, and that will reduce accidents."

Many people misunderstand the present traffic rules. They were merely intended to be experimental and not permanent, and were recommended by a committee which plan to appoint a new one. Mr. Wallace has been accused of recommending the rules, simply because he is chairman of the police committee, when as a matter of fact the entire committee recommended them. Some of these rules aren't working out the way they should.

Twenty-minute parking, for instance. There isn't a business man on Willamette street who drives an auto, who doesn't come to town. It either should be changed or abolished, as no effort at all is being made to enforce the law.

"We hear a lot of argument against angle parking. Whether it is right or wrong it is a law, and until it is changed we must abide by it."

"As to the bus situation, we are going to move slowly and cautiously. There is no desire to do Mr. Gorst or his firm an injustice, and at the same time it is foolish to rush into the matter without viewing it from all angles. We want to get the ordinance of several cities similar in size to Eugene, and with similar traffic conditions. Then we want to work out an ordinance that will meet the situation fully. This cannot be done except with thorough study, and that is one of the proposed functions of the new traffic committee. They will meet with Charles M. Stevens, city attorney, and frame a new ordinance to replace the one repealed by the council."

Each Sunday evening at 8:30, where seven classes under able leadership, are studying Chinese. Tomorrow evening, Frank Jue, the famous Chinese tenor, will sing some solos.

Closing of the new grade on the Crow-Vaughn road to all traffic was ordered this morning by the Lane county court. Two miles of this new road will be closed during the winter and all traffic will be diverted to the old road which is still in use.

With the coming of the winter rains other roads of the county will also be closed to heavy traffic in order to protect the new grades, reports Clinton Hurd, county commissioner. By the first of next week it is expected that several court orders will be issued on county roads. Some to be closed to all traffic and others will be regulated as to the amount of loads, the commissioner states.

Roads as listed by the commissioner also will probably be affected are the Gimple Hill road which will be closed to heavy traffic on the new grade and the Wolf creek grade and the London Springs road, both of which will have traffic regulations.

Need of new span urged for county. Urging that a new bridge be provided on the river east of Creswell to connect with a road to Cloverdale and cutting the distance about two miles, a delegation of property owners of the Creswell district were here today to confer with the county court. The new bridge plan at Creswell has been talked over at various times for the past several years but no definite action has been taken. It is estimated by the county surveyor that a span of about 300 feet would be required and that at least 1000 feet of filling would be necessary at the approach of the bridge. The present bridge, one mile south of the site for the proposed span is considered unsafe being over 40 years old, according to County Surveyor Morse.

Wet Streets Adding To Auto Accidents. Wet streets and fallen leaves increase the chance for accidents, it was announced today in Eugene police headquarters. Several accidents have been reported as a result of skidding in leaves.

Violations of the regulation for parallel parking are also being frequently reported. This regulation is that all automobiles must be parked within six inches from the curb line, and not closer than three feet from any vehicle in front.

With the obliteration of the lines painted on the curbing to indicate the limit of 10 feet from the property line at street intersections, cars are also violating this rule, it is said. The traffic officer and the police department are serving notice of their intention of arresting violators of this rule.

## SKYLIGHT ROBBERS OPERATING AGAIN

Unless the night police force is increased Eugene may again be visited by the "skylight robbers" is the opinion in police headquarters. If the city must wait until an item is provided in the budget for such officers it may be too late to avoid burglaries, it is pointed out.

Announcement was received by W. G. Jenkins, chief of police, that the Miller Mercantile company of Corvallis had been robbed of more than \$4000 in merchandise Wednesday night. The thieves entered the building in the same manner they entered numerous other stores in the valley, making away with 18 men's suits, a quantity of ladies' dresses, blouses, coats, sweaters, skirts, silk hose and underwear.

"The loss of one such robbery as this would more than pay the salaries of the two night men needed," says Mr. Jenkins. "It is thoroughly impossible to keep watch over a city as big as Eugene with only two men. No other city of this size on the coast is attempting it."

McMorran and Washburne have employed a night watchman for their store, who sleeps in the place at night. This policy is being followed by several of the larger stores, but such protection does not extend to the smaller firms. If the smaller stores would keep an electric light burning all night in a prominent place in the store it would cut down the chance of robbery, the police declare.

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## CENSUS OF OREGON FARMS IS PLANNED BY FEDERAL BOARD

December first has been set as the date for starting the first quinquennial farm census of the United States. This report will be used for the next five years as a basis for all estimates on crops and livestock products.

Lane county will not show up as well this year on account of the dry spell as it would have most any other time," states C. E. Stewart, who lives at Cottage Grove. If our report had been for last year, or even next year, the public would then have seen us to better advantage, or at least a lot better than for this dry year."

Oregon has been divided into four districts. F. L. Kent, agricultural statistician, was appointed supervisor of Oregon district No. 1, comprising 12 counties in the northwestern part of the state.

Fred D. Estermiller of Baker was named supervisor for the fourth district, and supervisors for the other Oregon districts will be appointed within the next few days.

The 97 employed enumerators will fill out a record showing how many acres in the farm, if rented, what rent is paid, amount of land in crops harvested this year, amount of land on which the crops failed, amount of pasture land and woodland, value of land and improvements, debt on farm, expense of operating farm, distance to market and kind of road, population on farm, acreage in various crops and amount of yield, and information in regards to livestock, poultry and dairy products.
