

VOICES OF FARMERS UNDER REPUBLICAN POWER IS SUBJECT

Scoring the republican administration during the war and immediately after, R. A. Haase, private secretary to Senator Wheeler, in a speech in the circuit court of Lane county today, said that the republicans were the cause of the war and the cause of the present economic conditions.

He pointed out that the farmer is today because of lack of competition, under the law of the jungle, the law of the fittest. Mr. Haase scored the present administration at Washington, which has failed to clean up the corrupt conditions, he stated, which arose after the war in a natural way.

When the republicans came into power, he said, "they knew about the corruption and started investigating. They found too many party leaders involved, and stopped the probe."

He claimed that LaFollette had uncovered the Teapot Dome oil scandal when he made a speech in the senate disclosing some of the details between Fall and the oil powers. He said that LaFollette had done nothing to clean up these conditions, and let the Harding personnel remain.

Corruption held issue. "Yes, the big issue of this campaign is corruption," declared the speaker. "Not neither Coolidge nor Davis like to talk about Daugherty, but they time."

Davis got off easier, however, the speaker telling how he thought the democratic candidate was nominated before the convention started, and that the "some forces that named Coolidge, nominated Davis, although the delegates did not know it."

Regarding the two disputed points of LaFollette's program, Mr. Haase said briefly that the supreme court has usurped its power and LaFollette merely wished to put a check on it.

He closed his talk with the statement that he believed LaFollette would carry Oregon, along with nearly every state west of Michigan, and numerous others.

The Columbia-Deschutes Power company is claiming riparian rights to the waters of the Deschutes river near the head. Nearly all of the irrigation companies of the district and many private owners have united in contesting the claims.

Testimony was taken yesterday in behalf of the Suttle Lake Irrigation company and the Fall River Irrigation company, and M. S. Mayfield and Francis Stevens, private owners. The hearings are being continued today.

Golden Rule in Foreign Policy Aim of America

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25.—International co-operation, applied according to the golden rule, was summed up as the foreign policy of this government by President Coolidge in an address last night at the Near East Relief association's golden rule dinner.

Today's program gave the president an opportunity to read somewhat from the strenuous activities of the last few days, during which he has delivered three speeches, including one of the most extensive he has made. Tomorrow night, however, he will address by radio a meeting in New York of the Federated Societies of Jewish Charities.

"The hope and aim of America is to help Europe help itself," Mr. Coolidge declared last night. "America wants peace, as the normal, the right, the assured estate in a world from which a wiser generation shall have forever outlawed aggressive war."

The president detailed the instances of America's aid to stricken countries of Europe, Russia and Japan, in charities, donations, co-operation and loans, and asserts that the policy adopted by this government is the one "most likely to promote peace and good will toward us among other nations."
