

DAVIS WORKING ON FINAL ADDRESS, TO BE GIVEN SATURDAY

NEW YORK, Oct. 27.—(AP)—Enter- ing the final lap of his presidential race, John W. Davis, democratic nomi- nee, worked today at his home in Lo- cumb Valley preparing his windup ad- dress scheduled for Saturday night at Carnegie hall.

He contemplates making a general restatement of campaign issues at this meeting and is drafting his speech for that occasion with pains- taking care. At no time since he pre- pared the speech of acceptance deliv- ered at Clarksburg, W. Va., has the candidate given himself over so com- pletely to the task of speech writing.

His work today was interrupted only by the engagement which was to take him tonight from his home to Jersey City for an address there.

Mr. Davis has been requested to speak regarding his attitude on labor and to contrast the record of the democratic and republican legislative bodies on labor matters.

A reference to Senator LaFollette's offers for labor also has been sug- gested for inclusion tonight in the Jersey City remarks.

The candidate has addressed him- self to the question since his return from the middle west and made known his dissent regarding the LaFollette court plan.

In his last speech here, Mr. Davis emphasized his objections to the Wis- consin senator's proposal to give con- gress supreme power and make it the final judge of its own authority, tak- ing away from the courts the right to say when that body had exceeded the authority vested in it by the people.

"I am not willing," Mr. Davis said then "that the relation of this govern- ment—between the federal govern- ment and the state of the nation—shall lie with congressional discretion and I am not willing, my laboring friends, that your right to organize, which I believe to be a right pre- ceded upon the life, liberty and hap- piness clauses of the constitution—can be denied to you by any chance majority in congress or in a state legislature."

SHAYER HAS WORD

NEW YORK, Oct. 27.—(AP)—The unequalled declaration that he would be elected on November 4, made by John W. Davis, democratic presi- dential nominee, upon his return here from the middle west tour, was echoed last night in a statement issued by Clem L. Shaver, chairman of the na- tional democratic committee.

Mr. Shaver called attention to polit- ical history, which, he said, showed that the dominant political party al- ways had been defeated in presiden- tial contests whenever a third party of ap- preciable proportions had partici- pated.

"There is now every reason to be- lieve this will be the result in 1924," Mr. Shaver said.

FOUR ARRESTED ON LIQUOR RAIDS HERE

The arrests of Pratt and Hall and Taylor and Hun- icker were made by Lane county deputy sheriffs and special investi- gators of the district attorney's office.

Huge Still Taken In Tollgate Raid In Eastern Oregon

PENDLETON, Ore., Oct. 27.—A huge still and a large quantity of mash were captured late Saturday by two state officers, W. F. Hoskins and Leo Relden near Tollgate, east of Pendleton. Five men were taken in the raid, three of them alleged gun- men. The men arrested in the raid were Frank Smiley of Walla Walla, his son Kenneth Smiley, Henry Young, Frank Etoupe and Dick Law- ler. The last three have been opera-

ing around Pendleton and Walla Wa- la for some time, according to the of- ficers. Young had a loaded gun in his hand when taken.

The still was of 80 gallons capac- ity and 800 gallons of mash were found nearby. The still was carefully concealed and two armed men are said to have been on guard at all times. They were arraigned in Pen- dleton Saturday night and in lieu of \$750 bail each were placed in the county jail.

German Astronomer Discovers An Object Of Tenth Magnitude

LONDON, Oct. 27.—Dr. Baade, German astronomer, has discovered an object of the tenth magnitude, and planetary in aspect, moving so rapidly that he suspects it is a comet, says a message from Copenhagen to the Greenwich Observatory. Should this prove to be true, the discovery would be of the greatest interest because of the proximity of the object's orbit to the earth.

Its position at seven o'clock tonight is given as right ascension 21 hours 25 minutes north declination 12 de- grees 50 minutes. It is not far from the star Epsilon in the constellation Pegasus, which constellation can be seen any evening at 7 o'clock near the zenith.

Death Takes Toll Of Mecca Pilgrims

BATAVIA, Dutch East Indies, Oct. 27.—(AP)—Of 50,000 Dutch Indian Mohammedans who made the pilgrim- age to Mecca this year, about 5000 have died on the way back from dis- ease and exhaustion consequent upon the hardships of travel in visiting the holy places of Islam. Moslems be- lieve that by these visits they will gain sanctity here and paradise here- after.

The death rate of this year's pil- grimage has been higher than usual and is attributed to so many of the pilgrims being aged and infirm.

German Gets Opera All on One Record

BERLIN, Oct. 27.—(AP)—Twelve inch phonograph records that play for 100 minutes and reproduce whole operas by aid of radio-loudspeakers without the noise of needle-scratching, have been produced by Dr. Max Haus- dorff of this city, working along prin- ciples evolved by an English inventor. The production costs of the new re- cord will be much lower than for the five-minute-records, it is alleged.

LITERARY DIGEST STRAW VOTE WILL BE INVESTIGATED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—While its process servers sought witnesses wanted in connection with efforts to corroborate somewhat sensational but as yet secret stories, regarding the alleged misuse of funds in the repub- lican campaign, the senate campaign fund investigating committee stood Saturday in recess.

Resuming the inquiry today, the senators began to explore new fields, among them the "straw vote" taken by the Literary Digest in the presi- dential campaign. Committee members in making known that subpoenas had been issued for officials of the pub- lishing company, said they wanted to know the source of the funds used to defray the cost of the nation-wide poll and the manner in which it is being conducted.

Another as yet unexplored field which probably will be entered upon next week is the amount and source of the funds collected in the Pitts- burgh district for the republican na- tional committee. W. L. Mellon, nephew of Andrew W. Mellon, secretary of the treasury, who the committee has been informed, is chairman of the collection committee in that district, will be the principal witness in this phase of the inquiry.

Chairman Borah announced all testi- mony during the inquiry would be taken in public.

Irish Commemorate Death Anniversary

CORK, Ireland, Oct. 26.—The an- niversary of the death of Lord Mayor MacSwiney was simultaneously com- memorated at his Fin Bar cemetery today by national troops and a repub- lican procession headed by Lord Mayor French.

On reaching the grave the repub- licans found the troops in possession. The lord mayor requested them to withdraw, but they refused to do so until they had fired volleys over the grave. They retired somewhat, but re- mained in the cemetery.

Then the lord mayor addressing the people, asked them to leave with- out demonstration and as they moved away a national army officer stepped forward bearing a glass enclosed wreath. He was confronted by Annie MacSwiney, a sister of the late lord

The dam was torn down, and in a single night the beavers built a new one. This tilt went on for a week. Finally wire was used to keep the beavers from the outlet.

Accountants' Tests Held in 33 States

NEW YORK, Oct. 27.—(AP)—Ex- aminations for certified public ac- countants will be held in 33 states on November 12-14. They will be given by the Boards of Examiners of the states in question cooperat- ing with the American Institute of Accountants. The tests are pre- pared by the Institute and, whenever desired, candidates may try for ad- mission to the Institute as well as for state degrees through the one examination. It is estimated that 1,000 candidates take the examina- tions this fall.

NATION OBSERVES NAVY DAY TODAY

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—The navy kept "open ship" today, navy day and the birthday of Theodore Roosevelt.

In every harbor and at every naval establishment, the public was invited to inspect the workings of the arm of sea defense. In addition, at various stations, patriotic ceremonies were held, high naval officers delivered addresses, naval airplanes flew over much of the country and every ef- fort was put forth to give the peo- ple a more intimate knowledge of the spirit and purpose of this branch of the service.

The death of Secretary Wallace caused a curtailment of plans for celebration of the day in Washington, and elaborate ceremonies gave way to simple commemorative exercises at monuments on naval heroes. Wreaths were placed at the statue of Paul Jones and others of the early Amer- ican admirals.

Every war veteran's organization joined in a service in memory of Theodore Roosevelt. Tonight Sec- retary Wilbur will deliver an address on the navy by radio.

Filipino Laborers Leave For Hawaii

MANILA, Oct. 27.—(AP)—Five hun- dred Filipino laborers have left here on the steamer President Grant for Ha- waii. The Grant will carry the labor- ers to Hong Kong, where they will be

transferred to the steamer Toko Maru which lists Honolulu as a port of call on her trip to Pacific coast ports.

The movement of 500 Filipinos to the Hawaiian islands is the first large shipment since the riots on the island of Kauai on September 9 in which 16 Filipinos and four policemen were killed in a clash resulting from strike conditions. The Filipino sugar plantation workers are brought to the Hawaiian islands, under a contract with planters to labor for \$20 per month. For some time after distur- bance an agitation was carried on to stop the practice of importing labor from the Philippine islands under con- tract, but the arrangement was never formally discontinued.

Rum Rows Scatter Before Dry Agents

BOSTON, Oct. 27.—The rum rows off Cape Cod and Cape Ann were scattered today as a result of their first major engagement with the prohibition enforcement of the navy and eight prizes were tied up at docks here and at Gloucester and New Lon- don, Conn., with more than a score of prisoners. The coast guard cutter Tampa yesterday brought into Bos- ton harbor, the New Foundland, two

moored schooner Marjorie E. Bach- man, rum laden and five American motorboats.

Another motorboat was taken into Gloucester and one into New Lon- don. The eight prizes with their crews and contraband liquor valued at \$100,000 represented a week's op- erations of the Tampa, assisted by a squadron of fast rum chasers off Block Island, Cape Cod and Cape Ann.

Fines For Naughty Words Build House

DURHAM, England, Oct. 27.—(AP)—Fines collected from blasphemers have paid for a handsome club house opening recently at Newbrancepeth, a Durham Colliery village.

The club was first suggested at a dance where some men's "language" caused offence to a group of miners who agreed, there and then, to stop swearing and to fine themselves if they broke their promise.
