

PERCY HAUGHTON, COLUMBIA COACH, PASSES SUDDENLY

NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—(AP)—Arrangements for the funeral of Percy D. Haughton, head football coach at Columbia and creator of the Haughton system, still in use at Harvard, who died suddenly yesterday from heart trouble induced by acute indigestion, will be made today.

Officials of Columbia will also decide today whether or not the contest scheduled with Cornell next Saturday, and games with later opponents, including Army, New York University and Syracuse will be played. It is generally assumed that Dr. Paul Wittington, line coach and medical advisor of the squad will take charge if griddo work continues.

Authorities at Cornell, communicated with last night by the athletic committee at Columbia, replied that they would be governed entirely by the wishes of Columbia in regard to Saturday's game. It is thought that if the contest with its chief rival, Cornell, is cancelled, that the Columbia team will be disbanded for the season.

Haughton's death came just after the impressive performance of his team against Williams last Saturday had returned him to the spotlight he occupied from 1908 to 1916, when his Harvard teams were models of gridiron efficiency.

It came when he was apparently in vigorous health. He was stricken in the gymnasium while donning his football suit to direct the practice work of his squad.

The present season was Haughton's second at Columbia, to which he had come in 1923 to attempt the task of providing a winning football team, at which his three immediate predecessors had failed.

In his first season, the improvement was only noticeable, but this year there was a marked advance which culminated Saturday in the defeat by a large score of Williams, conqueror of Cornell. When seemingly about to repeat his triumph at Harvard, Haughton died.

In 1916 he left Harvard to accept the presidency of the Boston National league baseball club. Two years later he entered the service as a major in the chemical corps. Since the war he has been associated with banking interests at his home in Boston, a connection which he still maintained, as he spent only the spring and fall at Columbia.

Haughton was 49 years of age, and is survived by his widow.

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PITTSBURGH AND CHICAGO SURPRISE WITH PLAYER DEAL

PITTSBURGH, Oct. 28.—With startling suddenness, the Pittsburgh and Chicago National league baseball clubs swung the most pretentious player deal engineered in recent years when Walter "Rabbit" Maranville, shortstop and second baseman; Wilbur Cooper, star left hand pitcher, and Charlie Grimm, first baseman, were traded to the Cubs for Victor Aldridge, pitcher, George Grantham, infielder, and Albert Neuhaus, recruit first baseman recently purchased from Chattanooga.

There was no cash consideration. Grimm, Cooper and Maranville compose a trio that is famous in annals of Pittsburgh baseball.

Because of the unsatisfactory showing made by the team last season, Manager McKelchie said he recommended the acquisition of new and younger blood.

McKelchie will revamp his entire lineup next year, Eddie Moore will play second base, the brilliant showing of the youthful star in the latter half of the season stamping him as deserving of a place in the regular lineup. Grantham will be used in the outfield.

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COUNTY ROAD BOND SALES TO BE HELD

Bids on \$200,000 of Lane county road bonds will be asked by the county court within the next few days. This issue is for the purpose of road improvement in districts 10, 11, 22, 23, 15 and 8. The \$200,000 in bonds is a part of the \$2,000,000 issue voted for road work May 21, 1920.

Unsold bonds of the issue include \$151,500 for the Pleasant Hill to Cascade boundary road; \$105,000 for construction up the Willamette and \$36,000 for the Florence road north. An additional amount of \$15,000 will not be sold as this is the unexpended portion of bond project 3 from Elmira to the Harpole school house, according to P. M. Morse, county surveyor.

The bond issue of \$200,000 to be sold will be numbers in series from \$1 to 400 in denominations of \$500 and \$1000. The bonds will mature in from five to 24 years and will draw not to exceed five per cent as provided for in the original issue.
