Goetschius, weather observer. Previous to that time in the 24 hours the precipitation was .62, making an inch and a half in the 48 hours. The heaviest downpour came today at 11 o'clock, when the rain approached the proportions of a flood.

The river has risen a foot and a half, and is rising rapidly, according to Mr. Goetschius. Word from Oakridge this morning was to the effect that rain was unusually heavy in the mountains. By tomorrow morning the river will begin to feel the effects of this heavy rain.

It's an ill rain in Eugene that blows nobody good, however, and raincoats, umbrellas, rubbers and galoshes sold like hotcakes all morning, and business this afternoon was rushing.

MEDFORD HAS RAIN

MEDFORD, Ore., Oct. 28.—The heaviest rain in Medford for nine months is falling today with a total of one inch in the last 24 hours. Continued rain is predicted.

ROSEBURG HIT HARD

ROSEBURG, Ore., Oct. 28.—Roseburg today experienced the worst storm to be felt for several fall seasons. One inch of rain fell between 9 o'clock last night and 1 p. m. today, with a drop in temperature. Just before noon five hundredths of an inch of rain fell in a space of two minutes, accompanied by a southwesterly wind which reached a velocity of 28 miles, the hardest wind to be recorded this year.

LARGE HOMECOMING CROWD IS EXPECTED

Eugene is getting ready to help the university "hit the Huskies" Saturday.

Homecoming this year will be marked by the largest crowd of returning graduates in history, according to university officials, and every effort is being made to provide adequate housing facilities for the visitors.

Whether stores will close half the day Saturday as in the past is problematical, according to Dave Graham of the Lane County Credit association, who states that some opposition has developed to closing this year. However, what the majority decide will govern the case, he says, and closing may yet be approved.

The first affair Saturday is the big luncheon from 11:30 until 1:30. Just before the game the "Order of the O" men will parade in their varsity sweaters. The closing events of the year will be the three big Homecoming dances at the armory, the Woman's building and the Campa Shoppe.
