

STATE BANK AT AURORA ROBBED BY FOUR MEN

Touring Car License Taken By Witnesses; Officers Scouring Country

PORTLAND, Oct. 29.—The State Bank at Aurora, Ore., was held up today at about 1 p. m. by four men who carried off \$5,000 and fled in an auto toward Portland, according to reports to the police here.

The robbers fled toward Portland in a large touring car, bearing Oregon license 189-697.

Police records show that this license was issued to W. H. Hayden, R. F. D. Box 590, Milwaukie, for use on a small car.

Authorities believe that the robbers stole either the Hayden machine or the license plates and put them on the big car which they say probably was stolen.

Portland authorities were asked to watch for the bandits and deputy sheriffs began a patrol of the east and west side highways leading to Portland.

Aurora is on the east highway to Salem, about ten miles south of Oregon City.

Half a dozen city detectives were dispatched to cover city arteries from the main Salem roads.

The robbers are described:

No. 1—Heavy overcoat of a light color, light cap, gray eyes, sharp nose.

No. 2—Dark suit and soft cap.

No. 3—Tan colored raincoat.

No. 4—No description. He was the driver of the car and did not enter the bank with the other three.

All of the three who went into the building were said to be young men.

Funeral services will be held from the Walker chapel in Springfield Thursday at 2 o'clock. Rev. W. A. Elkins of Eugene delivering the sermon. Burial will be at the Laurel Hill cemetery.

Argentine Corn Is Cheaper Than Iowa

TACOMA, Wash., Oct. 29.—(AP)—A shipment of 3,000 tons of corn from Argentina, received here recently, revealed that corn from the South American republic could be laid down here cheaper than corn from Iowa.

The British tramp freighter Ashworth brought the corn around the Horn, and the rate charged was \$6.75 a ton for the 8,000-mile sea voyage.

The duty paid was \$5.40 a ton, making the total cost, in addition to the price paid in Argentina, \$12.15 a ton. The rate on corn from Iowa is 71 cents a hundred pounds, or \$14.20 a ton.

The South American corn was delivered to two milling companies here. The price paid in Argentina for the consignment was not disclosed.

BYRON K. WHEELER SEEKS \$50,000 AS ALLEGED DAMAGES

Suit for \$50,000 was filed today against Frank E. Taylor, sheriff of Lane county, by Byron K. Wheeler of this city. The National Surety company and the American Surety company are also named as defendants as they are on the bonds of Sheriff Taylor.

The suit is brought as a result of the arrest of Wheeler here Saturday, October 18, and his incarceration in the Lane county jail until Saturday, October 25, when he was released.

Wheeler was picked up here on suspicion of having been implicated in a bank robbery at Roseville, Cal. This charge was dropped within a few days and officials at Woodland, Cal., sent word that they believed that Wheeler was a man wanted there for bank robbery. The California bank officials were here last Saturday but they declared that Wheeler was not the man wanted. He was then released.

Wheeler in his complaint asks for damages of \$20,000 for false imprisonment; \$20,000 for loss of his good name and reputation; and \$10,000 for being deprived of association with his family for the period he was in jail. The complaint also states that Wheeler suffered in mind and body by the alleged false arrest. Paul C. Dormitzer is attorney for the plaintiff.

Building Here For Month Runs Heavy

October building permits for Eugene leaped over the \$100,000 mark today, announces W. H. Alexander, inspector of buildings.

Previous records for the month have already been smashed, according to Mr. Alexander, after granting permits to George W. Thompson to build a new \$300,000 residence at 811 Jefferson street.

The total of new residences in the city for 1936 is already near 300, it was announced.

Permission was granted to Roy R. Boyd for remodeling a dwelling at 1922 Jefferson street, at an estimated cost of \$500. This puts the building figure at \$100,450.

October's permits exceeded those granted in the same month of 1935 by almost \$90,000, says Mr. Alexander, and the 1932 figure by almost \$25,000—or an increase of over 31 per cent.

"How long will this keep up, I can't say," said the building inspector, "but I already know of some important projects to start the month of November, so it shouldn't be a poor month, either. This is Eugene's big year, and the fame of the city because of its building program is spreading nationwide, through the reports of S. W. Straus and company."

Fire Department Is Soaked Hunting Fire

Whoever turned a fire alarm into the Eugene fire department this morning for an alleged alarm at Thirteenth avenue and Jefferson street may have enjoyed their little joke by sending the firemen out in a heavy rainstorm, but was he unto the impractical joker if he shows up around

fire headquarters. After making the run out to Thirteenth and Jefferson, the firemen found no fire, and later someone called W. E. Nussbaum and said the fire was at Fourteenth and Jefferson. Another run was made, and no blaze found.

A fire fire at Twenty-third and Alder also took the department on a trip this morning.

Amateur Actors to Try Real Theatres

LONDON, Oct. 29.—(AP)—London's 20,000 amateur actors will try this winter to get into the professional class. The 200 societies to which the amateurs belong have banded together and rented a West End theatre where they will stage the best they can produce.

They will open the "season" about the first week in November with a gala performance organized by many different societies. Afterwards the societies will each take over the theatre for a week and, should any of the productions prove popular, arrangements will be made to produce them at another theatre.

Eugene Put on New A. A. A. Map, Report

Placing of Eugene on the official map of the American Automobile association is reported by George Brandenburg, manager, and Joe Dunne, president of the Oregon State Motor association, who came to the city to meet J. S. Maglindry, director of this territory.

A new code of traffic laws is being prepared for presentation to the coming session of the state legislature. It is said, Ernest N. Smith, of Washington, D. C., general manager of the A. A. A., will make an address in Eugene in November or December, on traffic and automobile questions.

Court Will Close Over Election Day

Adjournment of the circuit court Saturday noon till Wednesday morning was announced today by Judge G. F. Shipworth. Election day being a legal holiday it was decided to not reconvene the court for Monday after the week-end closing, the judge stated.

About two more weeks will see the clearing of the present calendar and then there will be no other session until February, Judge Shipworth states.

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COMMISSION CUTS LOAD LIMIT FOR MANY LANE ROADS

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 29.—Macadamizing of The Dalles-California highway between The Dalles and Bend will be practically completed as the result of a contract let by the state highway commission today, under which Joslyn and McAlister, of Spokane will surface 39.7 miles of the White River-Cow Canyon section for \$138,400.

The commission also let contract for 1300 feet of approaches to the Lewis and Clark river bridge to John Slottis of Astoria for \$3,915. The work is to be finished by the middle of December.

Contract for construction of an equipment warehouse at Rufus, Ore., was let to Peter Peterson of Hood River for \$1,085.

Effective November 1 and to continue in force until April 1, the highway commission ruled a reduction of the maximum load limit on the following state highways to 16,500 pounds, which is three-fourths the regular legal limit:

Medford-Crater Lake highway; Astoria-Klamath Falls highway; Coos Bay, Roseburg, Corvallis, Newport, Astoria, McMinnville-Tillamook, Mount Hood loop, Willamette valley-Florence, Klamath-Crater Lake, The Dalles-California highway in Klamath county; Klamath Falls-Lakeview and Prineville-Lakeview highway.

Douglas county notified the commission that it is ready to begin work on the overhead crossing ordered at Shady by the public service commission and the commission replied instructing it to proceed and inquiring if it is ready to work on the overhead-crossing ordered at Oakland. These two crossings have been the

most dangerous grade crossings on the Pacific highway.

Roof Leaking; City Hall Needs Repairs

Today would be a good time to show Eugene citizens the city hall, as an argument for passing the proposed \$30,000 bond measure for repairs and improvements, said W. H. Alexander, inspector of buildings.

"It would be a measure of economy to pass the measure," said Mr. Alexander, "as one of the big items of expense—repairing the roof, must be done at once. Anyone who can go upstairs and see how badly it is leaking will have to admit that it is an economic waste to allow the roof to go unrepaired."

"The heating system is all shot to pieces. That will have to be bought also, whether the people vote it or not, if the city officers are to have offices. Storage room must also be made for wood, as only a few cords at a time may be stored on the present place."

Armenia Adopting American Methods

ERIVAN, Armenia, Oct. 29.—(AP)—American methods of cotton-growing are being introduced into Armenia. A new cotton factory equipped with modern American machinery has just been completed in Erivan. At the present time more than 40,000 acres of cotton are under cultivation. This is 40 times greater than the acreage under cultivation in 1921. The Armenian government expects this year to produce 30,000,000 pounds of raw cotton. One factory in Erivan has an output of nearly 2,000,000 pounds a month.

In order to encourage farmers to

cultivate their own cotton fields, the government is allotting them large quantities of free seed. The government pays \$2.75 for 40 pounds of the raw material. The present average yield is about 1,000 pounds an acre.
