

INSPECTORS AID IN INVESTIGATION OF BLAST IN MICHIGAN

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., Nov. 13.—(AP)—Postal inspectors from Chicago arrived today to aid in investigating the explosion which wrecked the loading dock and receiving room of the main postoffice here late yesterday, killing three men and injuring twelve others. Herman Petersch, a clerk, succumbed after having both legs blown off and Ernest A. Roth, a truck driver, died three hours after the blast. Dale Newhouse, 19, died in the hospital today.

The theory that the blast was caused by the premature explosion of a bomb which had been sent through the mails was advanced by postal authorities, police and firemen who scoured the wreckage all night for clues.

No fragment of a bomb or other explosive was found, however.

The explosion shattered windows for several blocks, hurled fragments of the loading platform 100 feet into the air, threw a loading truck onto the federal building roof and buried five automobiles in debris.

Lorraine Yarrington, who was in an automobile across the street, escaped with minor bruises, but a dog in his automobile was killed.

The two men who were killed were on the loading platform at the time of the explosion. Newhouse was leaving the postoffice after purchasing some stamps.

COLLEGES HELP IN ILLITERACY BATTLE IN KENTUCKY HILLS

FRANKFORT, Ky., Nov. 13.—(AP) In the mountainous district of Kentucky are two schools, Berea college, the largest and most widely known mountain school of the south, and Witherspoon college, another large institution but the least known among 200 mountain schools.

The students at Berea work their way, training to teach, in the professions of law, farming and business. Their expenses are negligible but their means are limited, President William J. Hutchins points out. The enrollment runs as high as 2738 students, who come from the neighboring mountains.

The system is one of self-support. The faculty has arranged that the students may work half a day and study half a day. While President Hutchins' son's education costs more than \$1000 a year at a prominent university, the students here average \$146 annual expenditure. Most of them do not have that much money so they receive faculty loans of \$50 each, then work out the remainder of their expenses.

The dedication of the new home economics building brought out the largest body of mountain men and women ever assembled. It was considered a demonstrative response to the campaign against illiteracy, one of the features of which was the inauguration of "moonlight schools" for illiterate adults.

Governor Fields recently dedicated the latest addition to Witherspoon college, a gymnasium of rough hewn timber, to reach which, he and his party made much of the journey on mules. The school is located in a pocket between high mountains. The gymnasium was built entirely by the community, situated on Squabble creek, a half mile from its confluence with the Kentucky river.

A non-sectarian institution, an orphanage and two branch schools, it is supported chiefly by the Lafayette Avenue Presbyterian church, Brooklyn. Although one of the largest schools in the mountains it is little known within the state.

Twenty-one years ago Harvey S. Murdoch, president, came from Brooklyn to found academies in the mountains. Next year, with completion of the building of high and grade schools, his original purpose will have been achieved.

Mexican Deputies Are Wounded in Shooting Affray

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 13.—Two members of the Mexican chamber of deputies were seriously wounded in a shooting affray last night.

Deputy Luis Morones, the most prominent labor leader in Mexico was shot through the stomach, while Leopoldo Guerrero, aged deputy, from Zacatecas, was wounded twice in the chest.

General Jose Maria Sanchez, former governor of Puebla, had demanded from the speaker's stand that Morones retract charges which he made against Sanchez in a speech last Sunday. He gave Morones the alternative of a meeting of honor, but the deputy declared the matter could be settled immediately.

Friends of deputies went into the corridor and shots were heard. The chamber was immediately adjourned, the deputies flocked into the corridor and out into the street and the shooting became general. It is estimated that more than 200 shots were fired before order was restored.

CRESWELL COWS SET NEW RECORD

CRSWELL, Nov. 13.—(Special).—The largest year record to be completed in Oregon during the month of September was made by a Holstein heifer, according to the report of H. G. Coleman, superintendent of official testing for the state. The leader is Esther Henrievied Antonia, a senior, four year old with 722,983 pounds fat from 20,818 pounds butter. She is owned by A. Benter and sons of Creswell, Oregon, and is Jersey in second place, a mature cow with 754,76 pounds fat, or over 18 pounds fat under the Holstein four-year-old. The Jersey however, hold majority of the leading places on the honor roll for the month.

A. Benter and sons won prizes at the Pacific International Livestock show at Portland. They won third prize in aged cow class; fifth on 4-year-old yearling on 3-year-old; eighth on senior bull calf and tenth on junior bull calf. 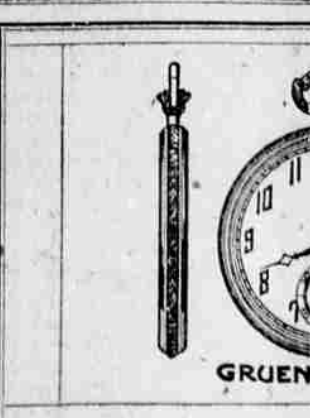

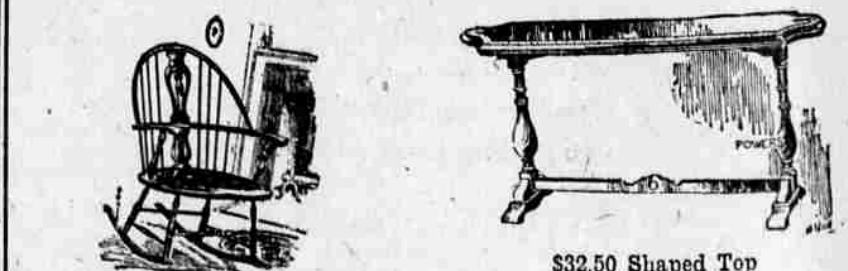
