

REFORESTATION IS TO BE TAKEN UP BY WEYERHAEUSER

TACOMA, Wash., Nov. 13.—The first attempt on a large scale to solve the reforestation problem of the Pacific Northwest perhaps the most vital question with regard to the future prosperity of the state of Washington, is to be made by the Weyerhaeuser company, according to an announcement made by George S. Long, general manager of the Weyerhaeuser company.

The plan includes the organization of a \$1,000,000 corporation to be known as the Weyerhaeuser Logging and Land Company, which will take over all of the cut-over timber lands held by the Weyerhaeuser interests in the state of Washington. A scientific survey of these lands, which include more than 150,000 acres is to be made. The lands are to be classified according to their value for agricultural or grazing purposes and for the growing of a second crop of timber.

The articles of incorporation of the new company give it the right to acquire logged off lands, engage in reforestation, clear land, maintain and manage farms, engage in all forms of agriculture and reforestation. According to Mr. Long all these activities will be taken up.

The largest proportion of the logged off lands included in the transaction

is located in southwest Washington. Grays Harbor county has the largest percentage with Pacific county second. Large blocks of land also located in Thurston, Lewis, Cowlitz, Pierce and Snohomish counties.

In his announcement of the company's plans, Mr. Long laid stress on the importance of the reforestation question to the future prosperity of the state of Washington. He said the new company will cooperate with the federal forestry department in attempting to solve the logged off land problem.

POLICE MYSTIFIED BY MURDER CASE IN LOS ANGELES

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 13.—Police today admitted themselves mystified by the murder of Harry I. Katz, musician, real estate operator and diamond broker, who was shot and killed on the doorstep of his apartment here last Monday night, the latest suspect taken into custody having established an apparently airtight alibi.

Charles E. Carroll, barber husband of a woman friend of the slain man, was taken into custody shortly after midnight last night, the second man to be detained for questioning within 24 hours, but after grilling him at some length detectives announced they were satisfied he was in his barber shop when Katz was killed and accordingly released him early today.

He was taken into custody on the

strength of threats he is alleged to have made against Katz in connection with the latter's association with Mrs. Carroll. A suit for divorce filed by Mrs. Carroll recently alleging excessive jealousy led officers to attach considerable significance to the purported threats.

The other suspect grilled and later released was Hal Hail, Santa Monica real estate broker, who spent several hours in the city jail yesterday as the result of an apparent discrepancy in his story of a meeting with Katz less than ten minutes before the shooting. The seeming discrepancy vanished after extensive interrogation, however, and late last night, he was released with instructions to report at center police station again today in case further questioning should seem advisable. Carroll was also ordered to appear for further questioning today.

The trail of diamonds which investigators believe may yet solve the slaying of Katz, who seemed to have carried on all his affairs in terms of precious stones, grew more difficult yesterday with the discovery of four valuable diamonds pledged by Katz in a Los Angeles pawn shop, but two safe deposit boxes which had been expected to yield a hoard of missing gems failed to reveal aught but unimportant papers.
