

FIRPO COMEBACK TREATED ROUGHLY IN WEINERT BOUT

NEWARK, N. J., Nov. 12.—Louis Angel Firpo's attempted ring comeback was rudely halted last night when Charlie Weinert, local heavy-weight, gave the South American a scientific boxing lesson in 12 rounds of a no-decision fight, and, in the opinion of newspaper men, at the expense of a comfortable shade over the Argentine.

The "wild bull" was distanced all the way. His rushes which featured his fight with Dempsey were missing and his terrific right which has reaped its harvest of knockouts was virtually of no use to him against Weinert's clever boxing.

The Newarker poured his left into Firpo's face, and successfully avoided Firpo's right. He cut Firpo's face to shreds. Otherwise Firpo was unhurt. He tried to box Weinert but he did not possess the ability and when he wanted to slug, Weinert was too evasive.

CHARGE TIME CUT
NEWARK, N. J., Nov. 12.—Time-keepers cut off 10 seconds in two of the 12 rounds fought by Louis Firpo and Charlie Weinert here last night. J. Platt Adams, chief boxing inspector of New Jersey, declared today. "I know positively they were 10 seconds short," Adams said, "as I held a stop watch and timed them."

Adams told newspapermen that the rounds were cut to favor Weinert who, in one of the rounds, was in a dangerously open position on the ropes. Newspapermen gave Weinert the decision.

FROSH LEAVE FOR WASHINGTON GAME

The University of Oregon freshmen football team, accompanied by Baz Williams, coach, will leave Eugene tonight for Seattle, where the babes are scheduled to play the University of Washington freshmen Saturday. It will be the last game for the Oregon yearlings.

Virgil Earl, athletic director, will accompany the team as far as Portland. He will remain there until after the Washington State-Oregon game, which is to be played on Multnomah field Saturday afternoon and will assist in student activities. Jack Benefield, graduate manager, will join him tomorrow morning.

egg prices are higher on the local exchange today, due largely to colder weather and rising markets at other coast points. Bids are posted one and two cents higher on cube butter with extras and standards 30c. Prime firsts were posted at 35c and first at 31½c.

In the egg division extras, pullets and firsts gained a point with a new top of 58 cents established. Current receipts remain unchanged at 50c.

Government report of dairy holdings on November first, has just been issued and shows 135,000,000 pounds of butter as compared to 77,000,000 pounds a year ago, or a surplus of 58,000,000 pounds.

A shortage in egg holdings is shown in the government report with 5,295,000 cases as against 6,658,000 cases a year ago.

A strong undertone is indicated in the local onion market. Buyers are unable to get good stocks under \$1.75 to \$1.85 at country points and some of the growers are holding for a \$2 market. Good onions readily sell at \$2.25 today and some of the houses are asking \$2.50.

The potato market shows a better tone. Very few local spuds are offered yet and local dealers have to look to Yakima for their requirements. Prices are up to around \$27 here. No No. 1 stock can be had for less than \$1.75. The market is expected to follow the upward trend during the winter months in view of the government prediction of the largest crop ever produced in the United States.
