holders of the corporations named to contribute to the fund or turn over stock in the corporations. The assertion is made that the defendants have collected a large sum of money and promissory notes, exceeding \$10,000 and that the plaintiffs are informed and believe that it amounts to \$10,000.

"The complaint declares there is no need for the activities of the defendants, because the affairs of the King's Food Products company and the Multnomah Box and Lumber company are now in the hands of stockholders committees and that the three other corporations named have been dissolved."

**Statements False.** "Among the numerous representations which were false and untrue," says the complaint, "and made for the purpose of deceiving the said stockholders, was the statement by the Financial Investigating company and its agents that as a result of the activities of the company, Governor Pierce appointed Oswald West and George N. Black a special committee to investigate the fraudulent sales of stocks and bonds to the state of Oregon."

The plaintiffs are Ella J. Hill, Calvin Roy, Angelo Zarelli, Carl E. Carlson, Emil Tiedje, Martha Lewis, Eugene White, S. A. Cozsa and G. F. Leising, all of Tacoma, and Anna Corbett and Carrie McKenzie of Auburn, Wash., all of whom say they gave either money or notes into the fund.

## EUGENE AVIATION FIELD REPORTED

Data on the Eugene aviation field has been prepared by the chamber of commerce for St. Clair Street, chief of the airways service of the war department, at the request of the army official.

The following report has been submitted:

**Location—**Southwest of city 2 miles from postoffice. Latitude 44° 02' longitude, 123° 05'.

**Dimensions—**Rectangular 1800 by 2700 feet. Long axis north and south. North and south runway and diagonal.

**Surface—**Turf, smooth and rolled at all times.

**Obstructions—**None with exception of small trees at one end of field.

**Signals—**Wind vane and house and hangars.

**Accommodations—**Keeper on duty at all times. Storage facilities for equipment and planes.

**Remarks—**Facilities in Eugene for repair and also new parts for planes.

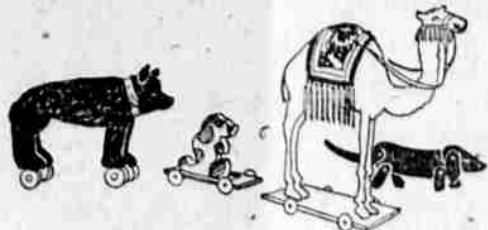
## 69-Year-Old Paper Is Seen in Eugene

George E. Gard, 295 Twentieth avenue west, Eugene, brought a copy of the New York Herald of April 15, 1855 to the Eugene Guard office today. It contained the announcement of the assassination of Abraham Lincoln. Following the custom of newspapers when a president dies, the newspaper had "turned column rules" that is, had substituted broad black stripes between the columns instead of the hairline used today.

Mr. Gard acquired the paper when a youth, and has shown it to hundreds of people. He is leaving Eugene today to visit in Yoncalla.

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## WRECK VICTIM MAY SUE TRAIN COMPANY

V. R. "Buster" Stroud, brakeman who was severely scalded in the railroad accident near Cottage Grove September 4, in which Jim J. Brand, engineer and Elmer Motter, fireman, were killed, made the first move today in what is expected to be a damage suit against the Oregon Pacific and Eastern railway company.

Mr. Stroud, who is 29 years old, was placed under the guardianship of his father, W. D. Stroud, at the request of the young man's attorney, A. F. Knight of Portland. The application was granted by Judge John C. Kendall.

The railroad accident occurred when a log train owned by the O. P. and E. crashed through the Walden bridge over Mosby creek, near Cottage Grove. Mr. Stroud's companions were scalded to death, and he escaped only because a jet of cold water poured on him from the wrecked engine.
