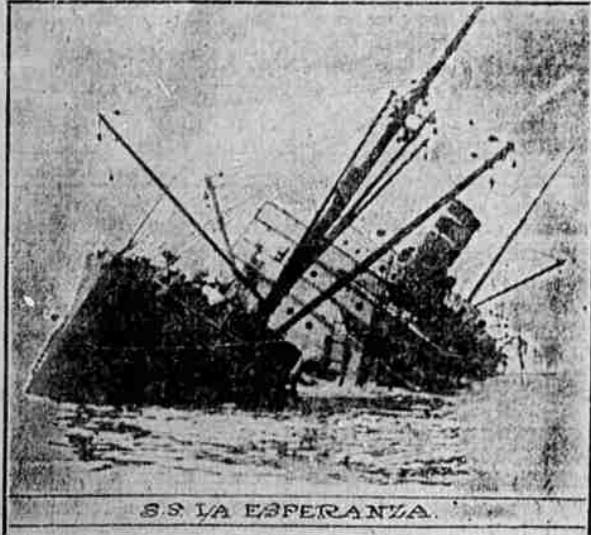
Tommy Milton Smashes All World's Records

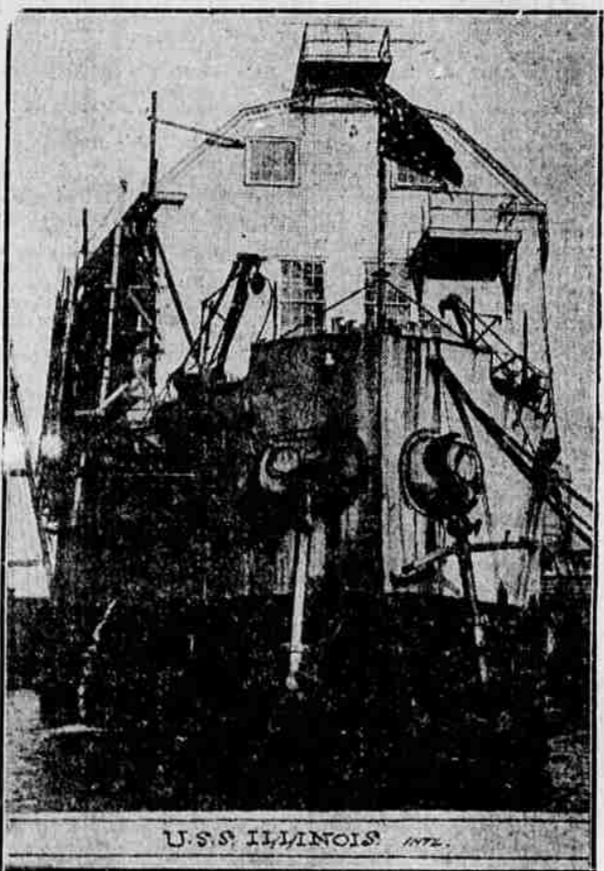
Report "Fatty" Arbuckle Will Wed

Former Battleship Floating Armory

In about two months, the American battleship Illinois, ordered destroyed under the naval disarmament pact, will be turned into one of the finest armories afloat. The work is being done at the Brooklyn, N. Y., Navy Yard, and when completed, the ship will be the home of the New York Naval Militia, whose former home, the revolutionary frigate Granite State, was destroyed by fire. The battleship has been stripped of her entire deck rigging, including guns, masts, fire controls and bridge. The Government has spent \$700,000 on the work.

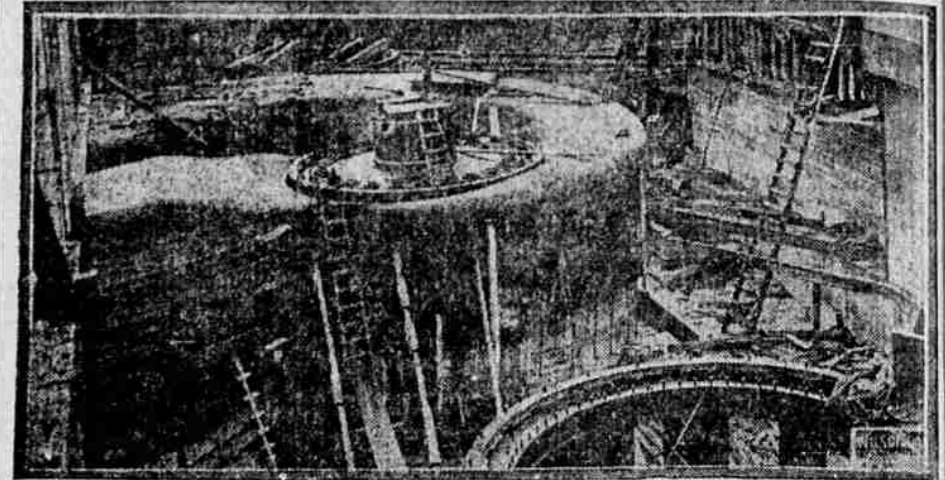
Magnificent Home For The Aged

It is built in the shape of an eight-pointed star, so that every room would be an outside one and would have a large window, affording plenty of sunlight and fresh air for the aged inmates.

Freak Construction at Wilson Dam To Regulate Flow of Water to Battery of Giant Turbines.



Above is shown the wooden form for a "scroll case," or water distributor for a hydraulic turbine in the power house at Wilson Dam in Tennessee. Construction of this form calls for the most exact carpentry. The scroll case distributes the water at an even pressure at every point around the runner, or water wheel. Steel gates are installed around the runner and these gates are controlled by a sensitive governor, the speed mechanism thus regulating automatically the quantity of water passing through the turbine runner and therefore the power developed by each hydraulic turbine.

Stenographer Builds Up Forbes Alibi

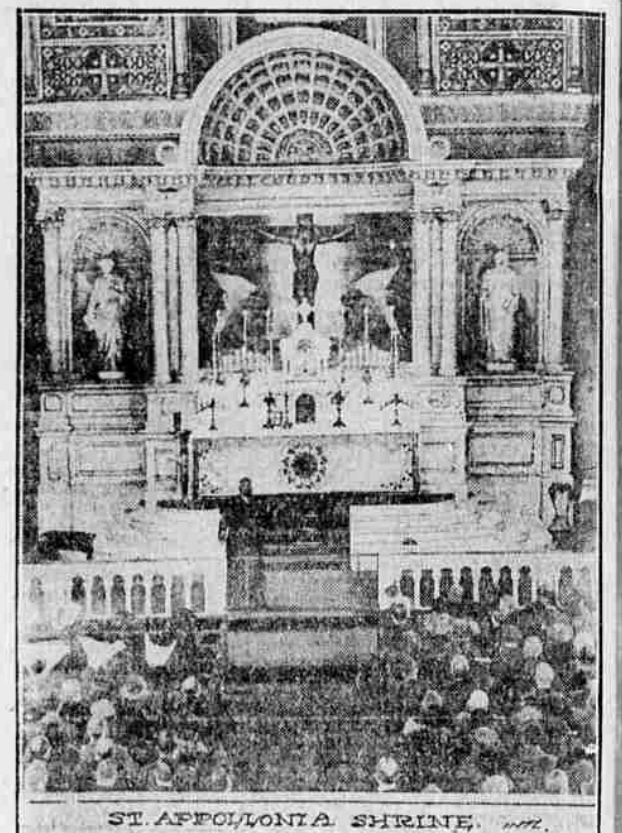
Woman Arrested In Ticket Fraud
