"We consider the coroner's statement a complete exoneration of Mr. Shepherd," the law partner, Ralph Stoll said when informed of the coroner's announcement.

Mr. Shepherd had declared he would take prompt legal action against the persons he considers responsible for the investigation and which he declared had been directed against him.

C. B. Moulmier, Milwaukee, president, Catholic Hospital association.

Large Tax Amount Soon Will Be Paid

Lane county's largest item in the way of delinquent taxes is soon to be paid, according to indications. This amount totaling \$8704.22 was unpaid owing to the changes involved in the mortgage and transfer of the Stier and Hovey timber interests in western Lane County. The matter has now been settled and it is expected that tax will soon be taken off the delinquent list. About eight per cent of the county tax for the year is carried as "delinquent" at the start of the new year, is the report today of Lloyd Howe, deputy sheriff in charge of collections.

Charged with the possession of deer out of season Neal McCoy and Frank Peoples were arrested six miles west of Cottage Grove yesterday by Rodney Hoach, deputy state game warden, and Deputy Game Warden Cruden. Two fawns, recently killed, were found in the car driven by the men, the warden states. The men were ordered to appear in justice court here today for their hearing. The deer meat was confiscated by the state deputies.

Drowning Victim's Body Is Shipped

The body of Charles Adler, drowned in the draw on the Coburg road near the Ferry street bridge Tuesday night was sent to Portland this afternoon. Sheriff Taylor and Van Swaen, chief deputy, today made an inspection of the draw and found the hat, coat and overcoat of Mr. Adler caught in the brush of the draw. The hat was a few feet up stream from where the body was found, the coat about 75 feet and the overcoat 100 feet.

Local Teachers at Portland Meeting

Joseph T. Glenn, city school superintendent, has returned from the Oregon State Teachers' association meeting at Portland. Eugene people played an important part in the convention, Mr. Glenn reports, the most important post-poned by a local teacher being that of chairman of the manual arts committee, delegated to L. A. Wright, of motor route A.

P. Christiansho was chairman of the resolutions committee. Miss Leona Marsters was chairman of the musical supervisors section, and David J. Jones spoke on "Credit for Music" in this section. Fred Chess and Odine Mickelson were in the manual arts program.

LANE COUNTY LEVY WAITS ON BUDGETS READY TO BE FIXED

Expectations are that the city budget figures will be adjusted to the six per cent tax limitation at a meeting between Ben F. Keeney, county assessor and S. M. Calkins, representing the city. With this budget figure set and with the filing of the report of the county court expected in the near future, everything will be ready to set the tax levy for the year, the county assessor announces.

"Although the levy will not be definitely known until both these budgets are reported officially, present indications are that a levy of 28.5 mills will be set for the year," Mr. Keeney said today.

Last year the levy for the county was 23.1. Additions this year include 2 mills for the Harrisburg bridge and 2 mills for bridge construction and repair work, this last being voted at the last general election, the assessor states.

Figures compiled today show that the Eugene budget is \$1195 over the six per cent limit as set by the state constitution and this amount will probably be trimmed off the estimates and then official action by the council will be necessary before the final levy is set by the assessor.

The Eugene city levy under the first budget figures was 16 mills but with the cuts that are contemplated it will be slightly below this figure, according to the estimate of Mr. Keeney.

NOTRE DAME AND CALIFORNIA MAY MEET JANUARY 10

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Jan. 2.—Alumni of University of California and Notre Dame today set on foot a movement to have the Golden Bears meet Knute Rockne's football players in Los Angeles coliseum here, January 10. Rockne says the only argument it has against the proposal is the condition of his team, which was "badly battered" in the New Year's day clash with Stanford, at Pasadena.
