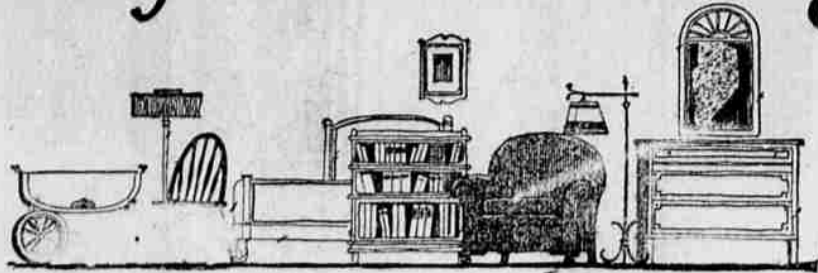

OPTIMISM OVER DEBT SITUATION LESS APPARENT

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—(AP)—Manifestly puzzled by the flood of contradictory reports which have emanated from Paris during the last 24 hours, administration officials concerned in the war debt discussions with France determined today to form no opinion regarding latest developments in the French capital until they had received a full official report from Ambassador Herriek.

From a condensed message sent previously by the ambassador and considered at yesterday's cabinet meeting, officials here understood that Mr. Herriek had received a note from French Finance Minister Clementel outlining a French proposal for a debt settlement. The ambassador's message did not give details of the plan, however, and he was asked for further information.

Springfield's New Officers Sworn in

SPRINGFIELD, Jan. 3.—(Special)—The new officers of Springfield were formally sworn in at a meeting held Wednesday night at the recorder's office, instead of at the New Year watch party held by the chamber of commerce, as was at first planned. G. G. Bushman was sworn in by Mayor Charles E. Eggenmann. Mr. Bushman is president of the Springfield Mill and Grain company. Lynn Landsberry, recorder also took his oath of office, as did Herbert J. Cox and Lawrence L. May, councilmen. William G. Hughes, president of the First National bank of Springfield was sworn in as city treasurer. George Vallier was appointed city street commissioner, Charles Nolf traffic officer and city marshal, and Fred Hinson an night watchman.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 3.—Approximately 18,450,000 feet of timber on government land in western Oregon will be sold at auction at the United States land office in Portland, February 16.

GOVERNOR MAY ANNOUNCE ROSS DECISION SOON

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 3.—Governor Pierce said today that he probably will announce his decision Monday relative to the ouster of Dr. Thomas Ross from the state fish commission. A transcript of the testimony taken at the recent hearing in the case was received by the governor today, and he said he would go over it with Attorney General Van Winkle.

Talk Refused on Spanish Situation

PARIS, Jan. 3.—Alexander P. Moore, American ambassador to Spain is in Paris on his way to the United States for a three months vacation, refused to comment on the Spanish political situation and repudiated interviews attributed to him on the subject, declaring: "King Alfonso needs no defense as far as I am concerned."

Utah Production Of Wool Is High

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Jan. 3.—Over one million fleeces—approximately 10,000,000 pounds of wool—have been contracted for 1925 in Utah at an average price of 45¢ per pound, according to estimates made public by the Utah State Wool Growers' association.

Evangelist Opens Four-Week Service

SPRINGFIELD, Jan. 3.—(Special)—A series of evangelistic services will be opened in Springfield Christian church January 4 by Teddy Leavitt, former pastor of the local church, who has been doing evangelistic work for several years. Mr. and Mrs. Leavitt carry their own tent and a gospel car and will be assisted by Claude Neely, song leader, and Mrs. Neely, pianist. The meetings are scheduled for four weeks.

Net Earnings of Banks Are Given

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—Aggregate net earnings of the 12 federal reserve banks were only \$3,700,000 in the calendar year 1924, a reduction of \$8,000,000 from the net earnings for 1923.

LICENSE DEMAND BETTER

The demand for temporary automobile licenses was increased today and 20 were issued up to late this afternoon at the sheriff's office. Many calls for the application blanks for the state license are also being distributed at the office of Sheriff Taylor.
