CHAMBER TO FORM GROUP FOR CHORUS

Definite steps toward the organization of a chorus among the members of the Eugene chamber of commerce will be taken at a meeting to be called early next week, according to announcement today. Hugh Winter, who formerly was connected with the Spokane chamber and was instrumental in organizing a chorus of 60 voices there, has taken up the plan here at the request of the Eugene chamber. It is expected that about 25 members will be enrolled at the start here judging by present indications. "The chorus will be quite a feature for entertainments of the Eugene chamber for visiting delegations," said E. Eugene Chadwick, secretary.

OFFER PLANNED TO BE SUBMITTED FOR INCINERATOR HERE

Arrangements for the making of a proposition to the city of Eugene for the erection of an incinerator are being made and this offer will perhaps be ready to submit at the next meeting of the council, according to Orin C. Davis of this city who is representing parties who have an available site and ample capital to handle the project. "A site for the proposed plant that will cause no annoyance to any residents is available and if the plan is accepted by the city there will be but little time before the incinerator is under way. It is expected that between \$25,000 and \$30,000 will be required to completely equip such a plant," Mr. Davis said. Lane county men are backing the proposition and all that is necessary is to have a suitable arrangement with the municipality in order to take active steps toward starting the plant, is the announcement.

O. A. C. PRESIDENT IS SERIOUSLY ILL

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, CORVALLIS, Jan. 7.—Dr. W. J. Kerr, president of the college, is seriously ill at his home here from nervous exhaustion. He returned to Corvallis yesterday from a visit to Long Beach, Cal., where he went for his health. President Kerr has never fully recovered from the injury and shock received in an automobile accident near Astoria June 28 last year, when his automobile collided with a truck driven by a Japanese.

Following his return from a trip to the east, the president was so reduced in health that a complete change and rest were advised, and he and Mrs. Kerr went to Long Beach. Instead of improving, the patient rapidly declined, and until the day before Christmas he has been confined to bed. President Kerr is now under care of a trained nurse at his home.

Plans Talked for Road Improvement

After a thorough inspection of the route of the Wildcat creek-Lorane road that follows the Siuslaw river in road district 68, O. E. Crowe, county commissioner, P. M. Morse, county deputy surveyor, returned here today. The road and river cross six times and it has not yet been decided whether to bridge at several points or to build around the bends of the stream, is the report of the county officials. It is expected that some improvement work will be started at once in certain rocky sections where winter work can be carried on, is the report. At one place the road has a grade of over 20 per cent, one of the steepest grades in the county, according to the county engineers.

ALLEGED JUMPER OF DEBT PASSES OUT \$1000 BILL

One of the most opulent characters to make an appearance on a Lane county crime docket in many years is "John Doe" Jackson, a man picked up here this week and held for the police of Grants Pass on charges of beating a hotel bill of \$150 and stealing a blanket.

Jackson was asked for bail of \$500 when he wanted to return by train to Grants Pass to settle the matter. He produced a roll such as is seen only in the movies and carelessly tossed off a \$1,000 bill. When Sheriff Taylor and his staff had recovered their equilibrium they put the piece of currency through every test known to the department before allowing Jackson to leave. The wealthy one returned yesterday recovered his bill and drove on in his Ford coupe to Portland after saying that he had fixed up the matter at Grants Pass.

A thorough investigation of Jackson as far as was available was made by the Lane authorities and telephone calls to the department of justice at Portland failed to bring to light any evidence that Jackson was wanted on any other charge. "It's a mystery to us, as he seemed to have at least \$2000 in the roll. Why he tried to defraud the hotel and steal the blanket is unknown and he declined to give any particulars. He may be picked up along the road somewhere else but we, on our present information, could do nothing but let him go," is the statement of Van Svarverud, chief deputy sheriff.

GAME PROGRAM IS PLANNED BY LIONS

Further plans developing the idea of bringing to the people of Eugene and Lane county moving pictures of game and wild life were made at the luncheon meeting of the Lions club today. The Rotary club will be visited by Harry Ruth, who will invite them to appoint a committee to act jointly with the Lions club committee in arranging a date and program for the meeting.

It planned to have a banquet in the Christian church at 8 o'clock, and showing of pictures at 8 o'clock. The committee appointed by the Lions club includes Dr. E. V. Stivers, W. R. Wallace and William Robertson. February 10 or February 17 have been suggested as possible dates for the program, the evening being Tuesday, halfway between the Lions and Rotary meeting days.

New officers of the Lions club took their posts today. They were Harry Ruth, president and J. H. McKinley, secretary.

The proposed plan of still further widening city streets, particularly Willamette street, has the approval of the Lions club, it was stated.

Old Institute Law Sought For Oregon

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 7.—County school superintendents of Oregon, at the concluding meeting here yesterday, adopted a resolution urging the legislature to restore the county institute law as it was prior to an amendment by the session of 1923.

Prior to 1923 the county superintendent was required to call a three-day institute each year, and teachers were required to attend. If they did not their certificates could be revoked.

Car is Returned To Mrs. Melson

Orders to return to Ina Melson a Dodge roadster held by the state for more than a year when it was confiscated following the arrest of Harry Melson on a liquor charge were handed down today by Judge G. F. Sibley. Clyde N. Johnston, former district attorney, stated that there was insufficient evidence to hold the car. Mrs. Melson claimed the car as her own and stated that she had no knowledge that it was used unlawfully. Harry Melson left here about a year ago while serving time as a trustee in the Lane county jail.
