

EUGENE MAY GET MORE GUARDSMEN

With proposed legislation coming before the state session soon it is expected that additional funds will be provided for the national guard and if this is done there will undoubtedly be another infantry company organized in Eugene.

Major W. G. White, commander of the first battalion of the 132d infantry, states that the recruiting of a new company would be easy here as there is a strong interest in the national guard and all of the three present units are up to the maximum as allowed under present regulations.

About \$100,000 would be available for the next two years for purposes of the national guard in the state and this would be in addition to all government appropriations for this purpose.

1925 Will be Good Fruit Year, Think—Local Nurseryman

"This will undoubtedly be one of the best years in some time for the planting of fruit trees in Lane county judging by the present demands," is the opinion expressed today by Roy Woodruff, Eugene nurseryman. Big plantings of walnut, cherry and prunes are contemplated by many orchard owners in the near future, Mr. Woodruff said.

"If there is a dry spell following the freeze this year the same as there was in 1910 there will be considerable early planting of trees" the nurseryman states. January, February and March are the tree planting months and if weather is good this month there will be a good start made on the setting out of new stock, is the report.

Logs Are Cleared By Boom Company

Most of the logs that have been in the upper Siuslaw river have been floated down to the boom at Cushman and it is not expected that there will be any large number handled now until March when high water is usually expected, according to T. C. Sterret, president of the Siuslaw Boom company. About 100,000 feet a day are being taken care of at the boom for shipment to Coos bay mills. A few logs along Lake creek are still to be brought out but at present only the new cutting is being floated, according to Mr. Sterret. A big year is looked for starting next fall as the logging during the coming summer along the Siuslaw is expected to be heavy. These logs will be floated to the boom with the first high water of the fall, is the report.
