

INTER-ALLIED DEBT PARLEY ENCOURAGING

Nothing More Than Preliminary Amenities Accomplished Thus Far

PARIS, Jan. 8.—(AP)—The twenty-ninth inter-allied conference promises better than most of its predecessors, although thus far it has accomplished nothing more than the preliminary amenities.

The outstanding fact of the moment is that talks outside the conference room between the principal characters have succeeded in creating an atmosphere so propitious, that in the words of Winston Churchill, British chancellor of the exchequer, "prospects of an early settlement are considered favorable."

Agreement Feared.

With removal of the Anglo-American controversy over the payment to the United States of war damages and claims from the Dawes plan receipts, the conference's chances of success would be greatly increased. Both countries made concessions through their representatives, Mr. Churchill and James A. Logan Jr., yesterday. Mr. Logan was busy last night and again this morning working out, with Sir Otto Niemeyer, British controller of finance, the details of the plan bill upon his talk with Mr. Churchill.

The vexed question of inter-allied debts, upon which much hinges, is also being tackled in this unofficial way, and talks between Mr. Churchill and M. Clementel, French finance minister, between M. Clementel and Premier Theunis of Belgium, and between Mr. Churchill and M. Loucheur, former finance minister and reputation expert, have all been devoted to seeking a settlement satisfactory to the majority.

Spirit Encouraging.

While nothing definite has yet evolved from them, the spirit prevailing at these conversations is thought to augur well for the future of the conference.

It is not disguised however, that the task before the conference is one of great complexity. There are always "victims" in these sharings and it is to be expected that they will offer resistance as in the past. However, optimism certainly prevails and observers ascribe to a certain extent to the reasonable attitude shown by the British chancellor of the exchequer.

The governmental opposition in France views the proceedings with profound misgivings. Thus L'Esclair, one of the principal supporters of former President Millerand's new party, says:

"The first four parleys of the finance ministers of the allies do not promise anything very good for us. One more the Anglo-Americans are going to share the cake between them. You will see that at this conference. There will remain nothing for the countries really devastated by invasion but an eye to weep with."

The newspaper also refers to what it calls the "American superiority."

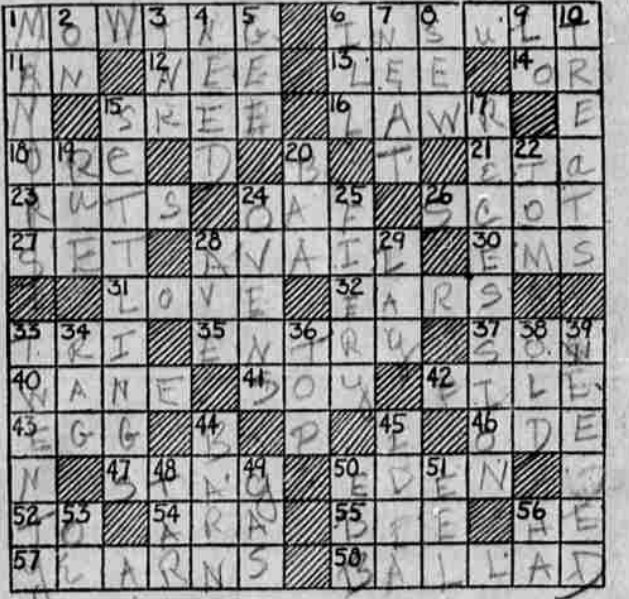

Today's Cross-Word Puzzle

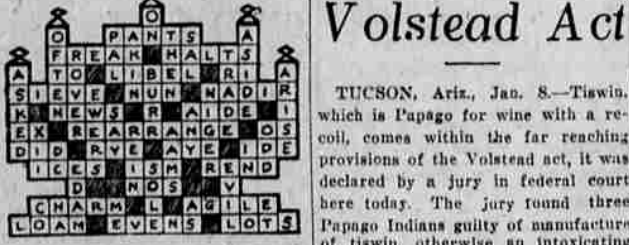
A PUZZLING PARALLELOGRAM—Twister No. 69

DISCUSSION IS HELD ON LAW ENFORCEMENT

President Talks Over Matter At Breakfast Conference With Committee

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—(AP)—Law enforcement was discussed today around the White House breakfast table. The president's guests were Judge Elbert H. Gary, John D. Rockefeller, Jr., and other members of a special committee representing the national citizens committee of one thousand and on law-enforcement, which yesterday in New York closed its annual meeting with the adoption of resolutions for presentation to the president and the governors of the various states.

Urges Co-operation.

The resolution required the president and the governors to urge all officials of "every rank and classification, appointive, or elective, to join them by precept and personal example and, so far as they may, by active participation in all administration efforts, in maintaining among the citizens of our republic the high determination to obey and enforce the law of the land." A second resolution "commends to the people of the United States and particularly to their official representatives the attitude of the president in his obedience to the provisions of the 18th amendment to the constitution in the hope that the example of the first citizen of our country may induce those who are now wilfully violating the prohibitory statute to accept his leadership in conduct and to endorse in practice the integrity of his fidelity here to the supremacy to law." Members of the committee in addition to Judge Gary and Mr. Rockefeller, were Robert Fulton Cutting, S. S. Kresge, V. Everett Macy, George A. Plimpton, William F. Cochrane, Frederick A. Wallis, Clifford Barnes, Patrick Henry Callahan and Fred B. Smith, chairman of the national committee.

Judge Gary Speaks.

The resolutions were presented by Judge Gary, who declared enforcement of the prohibitory laws had become a problem largely of arousing public opinion to the obligation of obeying the laws. To meet this need the national citizens committee was organized.

gained he said, adding that the committee was not sending out detectives to ferret out illicit liquor and drugs and was not seeking to nail offenders into court. Mr. Rockefeller elaborated somewhat on Judge Gary's statement and short addresses also were made by Mr. Wallis and Mr. Barnes. The president welcomed receipt of the resolutions and declared his sympathy with the purposes of the national citizens committee.

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Papago Wine Comes Under Volstead Act

TUCSON, Ariz., Jan. 8.—Tiswin, which is Papago for wine with a recoil, comes within the far reaching provisions of the Volstead act, it was declared by a jury in federal court here today. The jury found three Papago Indians guilty of manufacture of tiswin, otherwise an intoxicating beverage. The Papagos and officials followed the proceedings closely because of the threatened uprising of the Indians last summer when their right to mix and drink tiswin was questioned. The decisions upset one of the oldest traditions of the Papagos for it was always with tiswin they treated their rain god at tribal rites when moisture was needed for crops.
