

# EUGENE AGAIN TO HAVE AIR PATROL, SAYS SUPERVISOR

Eugene will again have an airplane patrol the coming summer, it is believed by Nelson F. Macduff, supervisor of the Cascade national forest. The forest service is going after the forest fire menace in a vigorous campaign, and Mr. Macduff is planning an elaborate program for Eugene and Lane county for fire prevention work. An patrol plays an important part in the protection program.

At the conference of the Western Forestry and Conservation association in Vancouver, Wash., recently it was stated that one and a quarter billion feet of timber was fire killed last year. Delegates voted in favor of forest patrol and prosecution of violations of fire laws as the most necessary activity of the coming year.

"It was found that airplanes are indispensable in observing the run of large fires," says Mr. Macduff. "The belief is that the best results are obtained from having the planes subject to call, rather than out on regular observation flights. In case a serious fire breaks out, its extent, direction and general character can be quickly and accurately determined by planes. In California an experienced fire fighter was sent up with the pilot to make observations."

"A strong appeal was made by the association to the United States air service to maintain and establish a permanent system of air patrol for Oregon, Washington, California, Montana and Idaho. While no definite word has been received by this office that Eugene will again be the base of an air patrol it is confidently believed that the government believes too strongly in protection of its national forests to dispense with such a valuable agent as the forest air patrol."

## Co-operation is Big State Asset, Says Mr. Vining

Speaking on the topic, "The American Business Man; His Future Opportunity in Oregon," before the Vining, president of the Oregon state chamber of commerce, stressed the need for closer cooperation between cities and industries, and unselfish interest in each other's problems, at a Rotarian banquet Tuesday night in the main dining room of the Osburn hotel.

More than 1500 persons were present at the banquet, at which A. C. Dixon was toastmaster. Musical numbers consisted of selections by the University of Oregon orchestra, a vocal solo by Alberta Potter, and a violin solo by Hugh Winder.

Mr. Vining urged more of the friendly, neighborly spirit among business men, and based the present highway system of concrete and steel as illustration of a similar "highway of intellect" that should knit cities and business more closely together. Eugene, he pointed out, could be further from Portland than Portland is from New York, through lack of cooperation. But it is, not the larger towns of the state are already closely connected, but an even more close cooperation is possible.

In Pittsburg last autumn, Mr. Vining gave a talk on the west and its opportunities, and the next day received 24 invitations from other Pennsylvania organizations to speak on the same subject. He accepted them all.

# STATE SPORTSMEN TO NAME OFFICERS IN PORTLAND MEET

Annual election of officers of Oregon Sportsmen's association will be held at Portland January 18, according to the announcement today of E. C. Simmons of this city, president of the state association. Mr. Simmons states that one of the major topics to be discussed at the meeting of the state sportsmen will be pending legislation that has been backed by the organization.

The legislative committee of the state association is composed of W. R. Wallace of Eugene, Dr. C. A. Moore of Portland and J. A. McNeely of Klamath Falls. Mr. Wallace will represent the Lane County Sportsmen's association at the meeting at Portland.

"A program of new game laws that has the endorsement of practically every sportsman's organization of the state has been formulated and this will be offered to the legislature and the state association has hopes that it will become law," Mr. Simmons states.

## TRUCK CARAVAN TO BE HERE FRIDAY

The largest display of Ford automobile truck units ever seen in Oregon outside of an automobile show will be in Eugene Friday, January 9, says E. C. Simmons, of the local Ford agency. There will be 20 units with body equipment suited to every conceivable need, and the caravan will proceed through the city's streets with much noise to the main entrance of the local Ford garage.

"This collection of Ford vehicles will be of types not ordinarily seen on the streets of Eugene," says Mr. Simmons. There will be dump trucks of both automatic and hand hoist design, garbage dump, rubbish dump, standard contractor's dump, special dairy truck, special wide top express, a new combination state and stock body, fancy panel and open delivery units, some with doors sliding or swinging, some with fancy nickel trimmings, some with elaborate painted designs for advertising purposes. There will be a fire wagon, school bus, truck with extension Fanco frame and Buckstell axle, roadster with a panel slip-on body, and samples of the famous Hercules vocational panel deliveries.

## Dr. Heisley Again Victorious in His Tile Drain Hearing

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 8.—For the second time Dr. and Mrs. O. F. Heisley, osteopaths of Silverton, are victorious in litigation with L. C. Eastman relative to the maintenance of a tile drain from their hospital across property owned by Eastman. Eastman was applicant in the suit decided Tuesday and the opinion, written by Justice Brown, affirms Judge George G. Bingham of the lower court for Marion county. Eastman sued to enjoin the physicians from maintaining a tile drain across the east half of lot 12, Brown's addition to Silverton, and for \$500 damage arising from its maintenance. The lower court dismissed the suit and awarded costs to the defendants, from which decree Eastman appealed.

Eastman acquired the property after the drain had been constructed. In the former suit the Heisleys sued to enjoin Eastman from interfering with their maintenance of the drain and for a small amount in damages.
