Retiring Sheriff At Pendleton is Facing Charges

PENDELTON, Ore., Jan. 8.—Zorah Houser, retiring sheriff of Umatilla county, whose office was taken over by Rev. R. T. Cookingham on Jan. 5, is accused of irregularities in regard to prisoners and fine money during the year 1923 in the audit report of the Income Tax and Audit company of Pendleton, available late yesterday. The report indicates that several prisoners were released by Houser before their prescribed terms were up and in all such instances \$2 per day has been charged against the sheriff.

The report states that the sheriff was exceedingly lax in turning over fine money to the county treasurer and cites instances of where fine money was held for periods of from two to ten months before being so turned over. Other county offices, including the tax collection department of the sheriff's office, were given a clean bill of health by the audit and commended for the systematic methods employed.

County Court to Attend Meeting

Judge C. P. Barnard and County Commissioners Clinton Hurd and O. E. Crowe plan to attend the annual meeting of the county courts of Oregon called for Portland January 15 and 16. The monthly meeting of the state highway commission will be held at Portland January 14 and the Lane county officials will attend that session also. No report has as yet been received as to whether the state program on roads for the coming year will be taken up at that time, Judge Barnard stated today.

School Tests For County are Ready

Three pupils of the Springfield schools are taking the eighth grade examinations at the office of E. J. Moore, county superintendent of schools. These are the only pupils from that district to take the test for the mid-year and so the examinations were held by the county clerk today by C. V. Larimer.

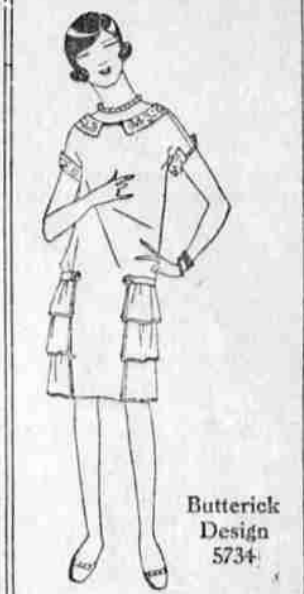

Library books totaling 50,562 were circulated through the Eugene public library, it is announced by Mrs. Adelaide Lilley, librarian. This is an average monthly circulation of 4213, although the circulation in December was 4940, and in November 5220, the highest monthly figure during the year.

"The library has been used more the past year than ever before," says Mrs. Lilley, "and look for a bigger year in 1925, although we are trying to get along on the same budget as last year."

Circulation of children's books during 1924 was 10,734. Mrs. Lilley's report shows November was the high peak month in circulation, with 1211 loans reported. There were 1060 in December.

Average daily circulation in December was 190, the highest of any month in the year. Patrons numbering 448 made use of the reading room on Sunday afternoons during the month.

Several new books have been received in the last few days for circulation, announces Mrs. Lilley. These include, "The Little French Girl," by Anne Sedgewick; "The White Monkey," by John Galsworthy; "Chinook, Ty-the-Son," Lewis R. Williams; "Windy Lead," Francis Gill; Showerman's "Eternal Rome," the scholarly description of the city and people from earliest times down to the present day; and "Window and Store Display," by A. T. Fischer.
