

### CLEAR LAKE PLAN HELD FAVORABLE AT JOINT MEETING

The Clear lake water project received a substantial boost last night in the joint meeting of Albany and Eugene citizens at the chamber of commerce, when resolutions favoring the plan were passed. The chief points involved in the resolutions were:

1. State appropriation of \$25,000 to survey the Clear lake territory and water plan.
2. Consolidation of Eugene, Albany, Salem, Corvallis and valley towns into a water district to put the plan across.
3. Establishment by congress of a reserve in the watershed in which Clear Lake is situated.
4. Ten Albany men, including the prime movers of the scheme proposed by the Willamette Valley Pure Water Development league, headed by Waldo Anderson, met with the Eugene delegation. Mr. Anderson presided.
5. The resolutions favored cover bills now being prepared by J. M. Devers, former Lane county district attorney, and now assistant attorney general, is preparing for submission to the legislature. Mr. Anderson stressed the point that there was no intention to attach the Santiam Pass highway proposal as a rider to the Clear lake proposal. The Santiam project will stand on its own merits, he declared.
6. E. U. Lee, E. M. Wilkins, C. A. McClain and J. M. McArthur gave short talks on the subject. Mr. McClain declaring that Eugene's plan for next spring, if authorized by voters in a bond measure, would not inhibit entering into the Clear plan, when it is ready. Eugene needs more water this year, Mr. McClain declared, and the city cannot wait for it.

### 4 MORE COTTAGES ON RIVER ROBBED

Four more cottages on the McKenzie, owned by Dr. J. L. Hesse, W. E. Miner, George Keegan and E. H. Peterson, were found ransacked by marauders, bringing the total number to eight. The gang responsible for the burglaries used an auto truck and touring car to take away their loot, it was discovered.

The dwellings of William Kneeland, J. C. Price, John McGuire and J. E. Shelton were the first to be reported entered.

A reward of \$200 for the capture, or information leading to the capture of the persons committing the theft, has been posted by the persons robbed. The sheriff's office is sending a deputy to make an investigation.

E. O. Potter and Marion Vetch went up to see their cabins Wednesday, but found them safe. Cabins entered were found usually to be those some distance from the road.

### Added Hospital Facilities Sought

Endorsing the movement for additional hospital facilities in Oregon for ex-service men, a communication has been received at the Eugene chamber of commerce from Senator Robert N. Stanfield. This is in answer to a copy of a resolution recently passed by the local chamber. Senator McNary and others of the Oregon congressional delegation have also stated that they were supporting the movement for the benefit of the Oregon veterans.

Collection of funds for the building of the Lane county cottage at the children's farm home maintained by the W. C. T. U. at Corvallis are coming in regularly although the goal of \$75,000 has not yet been reached, according to Mrs. Roy Loomis, president of the Lane county union. No meetings of the campaign committee have been held since before the holidays but a meeting will probably be called for next week, is the announcement.
