

# STRANGLER LEWIS LOSES HIS TITLE TO WAYNE MUNN

KANSAS CITY, Jan. 9.—(AP)—Wayne "Big" Munn, erstwhile University of Nebraska football player, who tried boxing, but couldn't stand up against the punches and whose knowledge of the technique of grappling is that of a novice, is the new wearer of the world's heavyweight wrestling crown today. Munn, by his propitious luck and strength, last night threw out the fearful headlocks of the veteran "Strangler" Lewis and crushed him into submission.

Lewis is in a hospital, suffering from injuries to his back, a new experience for the "strangler," who, in his long mat career, has seriously hurt many opponents with his famous headlock.

A giant in stature and strength, Munn, despite his meager wrestling strategy, clearly demonstrated his power over the title holder, in the opinion of mat authorities, although a foul which resulted in a protest by Lewis' manager, marred the victory.

The climax came after two minutes of wrestling for the second fall when Munn, twisting free from a headlock, lifted Lewis high in the air with a body and crotch hold, apparently the only weapon at his command, and walking to the ropes, hurled the "strangler" onto the uncovered floor of the platform.

Lewis' pounds hit the boards with a thud and the titleholder rolled down to the floor.

Chaos ensued. "Billy" Sandrow, manager of Lewis, lost his coolness and sprang into the ring, crying "foul!"

The crowd stormed at the platform, but police held back the frenzied fans.

Munn started through the ropes after his opponent and Sandrow, dancing about wildly, threatened Munn and referee Walter Bates.

Then Referee Bates announced the fall was awarded to Lewis on a foul. Bates gave Lewis 15 minutes in which to return to the ring and announced the match would be awarded to the challenger if Lewis did not appear.

Sandrow announced Lewis would continue only under protest.

In a limp condition, Lewis was borne to his dressing room with a squad of policemen accompanying, while the crowd boomed the decision and called for the referee to award the championship to Munn.

The allotted 15 minutes passed while physicians worked on Lewis and some semblance of order was restored. In another five minutes Lewis came to the ring, handaged.

Lewis was lifted high over the head of the young giant three times during the match and dashed to the floor.

Munn gained the first fall in that manner in 21 minutes with the body and crotch hold. Lewis lay stunned and it was five minutes before he could be assisted to his feet.

The "Strangler's" famed headlock, which has crushed many opponents into submission and sometimes unconsciousness, went for naught against the tremendous strength of the youth. By planting his feet firmly and heaving his powerful trunk about, the giant threw off his tormentor.

The new champion, a towering figure of six feet, six inches, who weighs 260 pounds, played in the line of the University of Nebraska football team in 1917 and after leaving school essayed a boxing career. He met several fighters of not great ability and after being stretched out for the count put away the gloves.

Munn took up professional wrestling only last spring and immediately showed his prowess.

One of the physicians attending Lewis early today said that it was impossible at that time to determine exactly what injuries the former champion might have suffered.

Lewis ruled over the heavyweight wrestling three years. He won the belt from Stanislaus Zyzsko.

## OREGON BATTLES BEARCATS HERE SATURDAY NIGHT

In the first intercollegiate game of the Northwest conference for both teams, the University of Oregon basketball quintet will face the Willamette university five on the armory court Saturday evening. The game, though doped for Oregon, is expected to be hard-fought from the word go.

Willamette is placed in a class with Whitman, according to the dope taken from pre-season games, especially the clashes with the Multnomah Athletic Club of Portland. Both teams came out with practically the same results, and from every indication were of practically the same caliber.

Whitman then met Idaho on her home floor, and took a decisive beating. The next night she played W. S. C. at Pullman, and was defeated by an even worse score. From that it would seem certain that Whitman's team is weak. If the comparison holds true, Willamette will not make so strong a showing in the conference race, either.

Oregon players, however, are dubious about the dope. They think Willamette is stronger than the advance information shows, and they rate themselves as weak.

Willamette is out to clean up, if possible, to start her northwest season right. The Bearcats are fast, and are hard players, no matter how they may compare with some of the larger conference teams.

The game should throw a good deal of light on the outlook for the remainder of the season for Oregon.

## Mr. Dial Takes Back His Charges Against Congress Democrats

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9.—After a tongue-lashing by leaders of his party in the senate, Senator Dial, democrat, South Carolina, withdrew from the senate record the address he made last Saturday blaming democratic members of congress for the party's defeat last November.

Senator Robinson of Arkansas, the democratic floor leader declared Senator Dial's speech seemed "a deliberate affront to his colleagues, a dishonoring of the constituency which honored him with election and a befitting of his own nest."

The debate, the fourth intra-party squabble in the senate in as many days, started when Senator Dial asked permission to correct the record of his speech in certain details. Senator Robinson and Senator Smith, the other members from South Carolina suggested that Mr. Dial might do well to withdraw the entire speech.

A son of hers, Lynn Moore, rowed in the University of Washington shell and is assistant crew coach at Yale university.

## Nomination Action Meets Postponement

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9.—Action on the nomination of Attorney General Stone to succeed Associate Justice McKenna on the supreme court bench was deferred today by a senate judiciary sub-committee after a secret hearing.

Statements were heard from several persons whose identity was not disclosed. Chairman Sterling refused to discuss the matter.

## Ochoco Irrigation District Declared Short on Interest

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 9.—The Ochoco irrigation district of Crook county has on hand only money enough to pay about half of its \$45,000 interest on irrigation district bonds which fell due January 1, says a letter from Willard H. Wirtz, district attorney, to Attorney General VanWinkle. He wants to know whether the county treasurer, ex-officio treasurer of the district should apply the money on hand to payment of the interest, or whether he should refuse to take up any of the coupons presented, since he can't pay on all of them. The attorney general advises that the coupons should be taken up in the order of their presentation.

It is understood that several other irrigation districts have defaulted in interest since January 1, but no definite information on the subject has yet been received by state officials.
