Planes Cover Retreat of Spanish



SPANISH RETREAT

Airplanes helped cover the retreat of Spanish troops from untenable positions in Morocco, but the guerrilla bands harassed the retreating forces from the rear, despite a withering machine gun fire from aloft. The retreat was but another chapter in a series of reverses suffered by the Spanish armies of occupation during a century of warfare with tribesmen.

Salvaging Fleet Scuttled By Germans At Scapa Flow To Get Machinery, Brass And Copper Tubing



By means of barges and cables the sunken war vessels are being moved gradually into shallow water where it is possible for the workers to go into the hulks and close the valves that were opened by the German crews. The water is then pumped out, the ships become buoyant and are towed off to the ship-breakers. The value of the salvaged fleet lies chiefly in the enormous mass of machinery and brass and copper tubing it contains. The thin rusted steel shells are practically valueless.
