## NEW ROADS, TRAILS BUILT IN CASCADE IN 1924 REPORTED

More than 60 miles of new trails and 8 1/2 miles of new road were constructed in the Cascade national forest during 1924 at a total cost of \$19,717 for the trails and \$22,797 for roads, it was shown by the annual statistical report of Nelson F. Macduff, supervisor of the forest.

A bridge across Portland creek on the Fall creek road cost \$846; 11 new telephone lines were strung at a cost of \$724; and a new house was erected at Oakridge costing \$984, the report shows. The Oakridge office cost \$980 and three other structures erected by the forest service, \$1258.

Roads in the Cascade forest to date, total 78.4 miles, valued at \$132,579.21, and trails total 477.80 miles, valued at \$106,188.63. There are now 511 miles of telephone line, representing an investment of \$26,388.41; nine buildings of three rooms or less, \$249.32; four buildings of four rooms or more, \$2592.32; three offices, \$1,794.98; eight other structures, \$2,323.63; and five glass-ribbed lookout boxes, valued at \$3948.34.

The road and trail construction work during last year is divided as follows: Roads: Salmon creek road, 1/2 mile, \$1056.79; Fall creek road, 1 1/2 miles, \$3679.43; Willamette road (one-half mile graded), three-fourths mile, \$5607.51; South Fork McKenzie road, 5 miles graded, \$9253.32; South Fork McKenzie road, 4 miles clearing, \$3993.50; Huckleberry road, 1/2 mile, \$1107.13.

Trails: Elk creek trail, 2 miles, \$1834.08; Hebe creek trail, 5.6 miles, \$2594.18; Limpqua divide trail, 3 miles, \$1354.45; Hira ridge trail, 4 miles, \$1001.53; Foley ridge trail, 2 miles, \$325.02; Scott trail, 7 3/4 miles, \$2915.81; Gold Point trail, 3 1/2 miles, \$2095.46; Salmon creek trail, 13 miles, \$2293.08; Staley ridge trail, 12 miles, \$4464.85; Agnosta creek trail, 4 1/4 miles, \$2291.66; Moss mountain trail, 3/4 mile, \$170.65.
