### COURTS WILL HEAR FRAUD ORDER CASE

### Fritz Leiber is Real Star; Play Scores Big Hit

Eugene theatergoers seeing Hamlet Saturday night at the Heilig theater have a memory of one of a chain of masterpieces that come in a life time. And in the words of those who time and time again have seen the presentation of the play, Fritz Leiber is standing among the best in the interpretation of Shakespeare. That Shakespeare still lives was demonstrated at the play. And yet one of the delightful things about the presentation is, it seems almost of modern drama, and still brings understanding, appreciation and satisfaction of a Shakespearean production. So extremely natural and realistic are the scenes and acting that no one has to excuse and remember it is not a modern drama. Fritz Leiber is wonderful in the play; a well-trained and flexible voice and acting that is the true art of acting. His interpretation of the soliloquy was the fulfillment of anticipation for those who went in many cases to see that scene alone.
