

7,000 VANQUISHED TROOPS OF CHANG GIVE UP CONTROL

SHANGHAI, Jan. 12.—(P)—Consuls of Shanghai, the gateway port of China, over which the Peking government of Wu Peifu, since deposed, has passed back to the advent of General Wu today when 7,000 vanquished troops of General Yung-Min, rival leader, were disbanded and admitted to internment in the French and international zone.

General Chang represented the new government named under the leadership of Chang Tso-Lin, the Manchurian army leader who swept down on Wu's armies from Mukden and threw the government of which General Wu was the military head.

The new successful offensive against Shanghai was led by General Chieh-Yuan, tuchum of Kiangsu province.

The 7,000 defeated troops interned by present authorities were taken to the foreign authorities whose elements are crowded. The foreign authorities propose to arrange with responsible Chinese officials here to transport the interned soldiers to Shanghai.

The telegraph office on the Foo-yoo road in the international settlement is now partly held by both sides.

Consular authorities have adopted a rigid hands-off policy and announced today they will accept only what is necessary to maintain order within settlement boundaries.

The casualties incurred by both sides in the fighting which resulted in the victory of General Chi and the death of General Ming, were estimated at 100 today. Of this number, 70 were killed.

EUGENE CARES FOR DISABLED VETERANS

Eugene and Lane county, through the Red Cross chapter, are keeping busy in touch with their disabled veterans, according to the report of Miss Grace Norton, secretary, at the board's meeting last night.

The chapter proved the banner month of 1924 as far as chapter activities are concerned, the report showed.

Due to the closing on January 1 of applications for hospital and compensation under the Reed-Johnson bill, disability claims were filed by Miss Norton during the month. Sixteen and one woman were admitted to hospital through the agencies of the chapter.

Ernest Wroth of Coburg and Kenneth K. John of Eugene left today for Portland to enter a government hospital to receive treatment for diabetes received in the service. Mr. John is suffering from arthritis and John from shell shock.

The needy families were assisted by the Red Cross. Miss Norton announced. She read letters from disabled men for the Christmas boxes, and mentioned the need of more bed jackets and "beanie" caps. Eugene churchmen preparing a large supply of pneumonia jackets for shipment to the county disabled men, it was shown.

Demand For Loggers Again Being Felt

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 12.—(Special)—There has been a steady demand for loggers in employment centers west of the Cascades, in Oregon and Washington, during the past week and approximately 75 per cent of the camps are now running, according to reports from 4-L employment service offices in various northwest cities received at 4-L headquarters here today. Eighty-five per cent of the major firms are cutting single shift capacity, and three per cent are on a 16-hour, two-shift basis.

The majority of unemployed men in the west coast cities is made up chiefly of itinerant laborers from California and states east of the Cascade mountains, the reports show, while the remainder comprises transient fishermen, construction and agricultural workers.

Logging in the pine country of western Oregon and Washington and northern Idaho is at about 90 per cent capacity and less than 25 per cent of the pine sawmills are cutting, although planing and shipping departments are busy, many running two shifts.

Clackamas Railway Line is Furthered

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—As a step in constructing nine miles of new railroad in Clackamas county, Oregon, the Portland Southern Railway asked permission today from the Interstate Commerce commission for authority to execute and deliver mortgage bonds to a total of \$200,000 to be secured by the corporation's present property. Some of the funds derived from the securities will pay existing indebtedness, but its main object will be to provide for the extension.

Forest Fire Protection Tax Is Assessed Against Private Timber Holdings

State taxes on private timber holdings for forest fire protection as provided by the state are to be placed opposite the names of owners of the tracts on the tax rolls for Lane, and this is now being done at the office of the county assessor. The state charge this year is 1.75 cents per acre.

More than 1000 individual owners of timber in the county will pay the acreage charge to the state this year, according to the list of ownership sent by the state fire marshal's office. This state tax is charged against all owners of timber that is not protected through private patrol or other means.

"Relatives of those men are asked to give this information either to Karl Outhank, executive secretary, or to Colin V. Dymont, dean of the college of literature, science and the arts."

Third Fatality in Blast is Recorded

LONG BEACH, Cal., Jan. 12.—With the death of George Warden, 32 early this morning from a fractured skull, the third fatality in yesterday's explosion at the Southern California Edison company's plant in the harbor district was recorded. At least one more death is expected by hospital authorities while the condition of four other men is critical.

Details of the explosion are expected to be revealed at an inquest to be held this afternoon.

Japanese-American War is Scorned by Charles B. Warren

DETROIT, Jan. 12.—The "far eastern question" does not revolve about Japanese immigration, nor does it gain its place of prominence in American foreign relations through any bellicose intentions on the part of the Japanese. Instead, it centers in China, and in that country's inability to maintain a high place in the affairs of the Pacific, according to Charles Leecher Warren, former ambassador to Japan and Mexico. The bugaboo of a Japanese-American war because of the United States' immigration attitude toward Japanese is without the slightest foundation, he said. Japan, he said, is perfectly aware that the immigration act was purely an economic measure to protect American labor from the cheaper labor of Japan and no misconception as to the true purpose of the law.

Japan, he asserted, cannot understand why there should exist any racial

prejudice in the United States against Japanese nationals. The weak point of the Chinese, of whom he spoke highly as a people he said, was a lack of realization that a public office is a public trust.
