

EXTENSION OF THIRTEENTH IS VOTED BY CITY

Avenue To Be Opened From Willamette West To Charnelton

Ordinance Is Passed Providing For Paving Of Extended Street

Thirteenth avenue will be opened from Willamette street west to Charnelton, the city council decided in its meeting last night, when an ordinance was passed providing for the paving of the street. The project is to be paid for by the city, according to an agreement with former owners of the property deeded to the city. Plans and specifications for the paving also were approved.

At Charnelton, this paving project will connect with another project, extending the pavement a block further west to Lincoln, and will connect Thirteenth with Eleventh on Charnelton with pavement.

Sewer System Asked.

A new sewer system for the College hill district was proposed last night, although action on the move was held over until a later meeting. Main lines in the plan run as follows:

Between Oak and Pearl, from Seventeenth avenue south to the city limits; between Willamette and Olive streets, from Twenty-first avenue south to the city limits; between Olive and Charnelton streets from Twenty-second avenue south to the city limits.

A petition for the paving of Charnelton street from Seventeenth avenue to the city limits was approved. A request for the improvement of University street, from Twenty-second avenue to the city limits was also granted. The street is to be paved from Twenty-second to Twenty-third, and graded and graveled for the rest of the distance.

Paving Bids Asked.

With eight ordinances the council prepared four other paving projects for advertisement for bids. They are:

Nineteenth avenue from Willamette to Lincoln street.
Eighteenth avenue from University to Agate street.
Third avenue west from Monroe street to Blaine boulevard.
Seventeenth avenue from Willamette to Jefferson street.

LANE LEADS STATE ON BEAVER KILLING

Lane county led in the number of beavers killed during the past year with a total of 1014, according to reports of the state game commission submitted by Ben F. Dorris. The next highest number was 929 reported taken in Malheur county. The total of the state for 1924 was 12,010, according to Mr. Dorris. These figures do not include the number of beaver trapped by 112 licensed trappers who did not submit reports on the number of pelts taken.

The game commission at the present meeting of the state legislature is making efforts to have legislation passed that will again place the beaver in the protected class of animals as the reports for the past year indicate that there will be a heavy depletion of these animals if some step is not taken, the game commissioner states.

The data on beavers in 1924 show that Coos county was the low county in number killed, only four being reported from there. Grant and Columbia counties were among the high ones, the former having 862 and the latter 809.

Oregon Magazines Are Printed Here

Copies of the "Oregon Sportsman" and the "Oregon Motorist," the former official publication of the state game commission and the latter the publication of the Oregon State Motor association, are being sent out this week. Both state publications are made up and printed in Eugene at the plant of the Shelton-Turnbull-Fuller Printing company. Ben F. Dorris of this city, member of the state game commission, has an article in the Sportsman this month explaining a reorganization plan for the state board.
