

### EUGENE FANCIERS GROOM DOGS FOR SPRING CONTESTS

Dates for the spring field trials in Eugene of the Oregon Field Trials club are being suggested by directors of local clubs throughout the state, according to a letter received by W. H. "Obak" Wallace, president of the state organization, from C. S. Whitmore, editor of Sportsman and Fancier, Portland.

Mr. Whitmore enclosed a copy of a circular letter which he had mailed to club and dog fanciers, asking for suggestions.

"I am collecting suggestions as to what dates for these trials as well as to what stakes should be run," said Mr. Wallace, "and will turn them over to President Wallace. It has been suggested that the spring meet should be held this month, and that there should be a Puppy Stakes All-ages Stake and a Subscription Stake."

"I attended a meeting of the newly organized Southwestern Washington Field Trials club at Centralia recently. They expect to run All-ages and Puppy stakes Sunday and Monday, March 22 and 23."

Late this month is too early for the trials in Eugene, Wallace stated today. Because of the weather here the earliest they should be held would be either the latter part of February or early part of March.

"We want to stage a successful trial, and attract a big crowd," said Mr. Wallace. "If we can do this Eugene will go on the map as the field dog capital of the west."

More than 14 thoroughbred dogs are being handled for Eugene sportsmen in the kennels of Ike Newman on River road. It was learned today Mr. Newman is one of the most successful trainers of shooting dogs in Oregon. Dr. W. H. Dale, Dr. Charles D. Donahue, W. H. Wallace and Clark Day all have thoroughbred pups in the Newman kennels, and they expect to enter these animals in the spring Puppy stakes here.

Besides his own dogs, Mr. Newman is keeping dogs for Clyde Johnston and Dr. L. Bogan. Harold Hill is expecting some pedigreed field dogs from California this week, and several other Eugene men are keeping their own dogs. This, it is pointed out, will give local men a chance at the spring prize money, as well as the purses offered at the fall trials in September.

### CONSIDER CHILD LABOR

STATE HOUSE, SALEM, Ore., Jan. 14.—Members of the house judiciary committee of the legislature, will likely agree on a date, probably January 28, for a joint session and public hearing in connection with the joint resolution calling for adoption of the proposed child labor amendment to the federal constitution. Informal discussion was held among members of the two committees today with the view of agreeing on a date for the hearing.

The bill joint resolution calling for a joint committee to confer with similar committees of the legislatures of Oregon and California with a view to enacting uniform rules relating to speed, lights and other phases of automobile travel received a favorable report of the senate committee on roads and highways today. It provides that the committee, if possible, report at this session, but if not possible, report at this session, shall report at the next session.

On motion of Senator Joseph, the resolution was tabled pending further study.

referred to various committees. The house will reconvene at 2 p. m. Senator Strayer today again introduced a bill that he placed before the legislature in 1923 providing for the use of market road funds on certain roads that have been designated as state highways, but which are in reality market roads.

In 1923 the bill passed the senate unanimously, but was killed in the house because Strayer wouldn't vote for the tourist appropriation bill.

Legislation seeking appropriation of a fund for studying poultry disease prevalent in the state will probably be asked by poultrymen of Oregon today this morning. Sen. W. Lovell, president of the Astoria chamber of commerce has written to various legislators urging favorable action on any such legislation. He points out that many poultry pens in the state are empty because of fowl diseases.

### STATE BUDGET PLACED

STATE HOUSE, SALEM, Ore., Jan. 14.—Appropriation requests submitted to the state budget commission and recommended by the commission to the legislature, together with those that are submitted to the legislature without recommendation amount to \$2,501,912.53 in excess of the estimated revenues accruing to the state during 1925 and 1926 under existing laws, namely the direct property tax and all other sources to which the six per cent constitutional limitation does not apply. The principal state budget was placed on the desks of legislators today.

The total visible revenues of the state general fund for the ensuing biennium aggregate \$18,906,227.18. The total estimated requirements for the period are:

Millage tax levies \$13,426,006.39; continuing appropriations \$539,651; appropriations recommended by the budget committee \$5,627,956; authorized deficiencies \$28,643.35; deficiencies not authorized but incurred in pursuance of law \$13,500; requests referred to the legislature without recommendation \$1,711,143; total \$21,497,124.73. In addition there are filed miscellaneous claims totaling \$63,236.92 upon which the legislature will pass judgment.

### INVESTIGATION PLANNED

STATE HOUSE, SALEM, Ore., Jan. 14.—Plans were quite definitely laid here today for an investigation of the state prohibition department as it has been administered by George L. Cleaver. This afternoon Senator Garland, chairman of the committee on alcoholic traffic, called his committee together and it was declared probable that the investigation plans would crystallize. The members of the committee are Garland, Eddy, Butler, Hare and Johnson, and there is no doubt that the resolution will have the signatures of all of them.

### PROTEST HEARD

STATE HOUSE, SALEM, Ore., Jan. 14.—Protest against Governor Pierce's recommendation for an additional half cent a pound tax on all salmon caught within the waters of Oregon was lodged with the chief executive by the Wholesale Fish Dealers association of Oregon today. Clyde Chase, of Reedsport, secretary of the association, presented the protesting resolution adopted by the fishmen. A delegation of 15 men accompanied Chase.

The resolution points out that the tax would not be paid by the consumer but by the wholesaler, but would be passed on to the fishermen.

### KABE KAUFMANN DEMANDS BELT

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Jan. 14.—Kabe Kaufmann, manager of Wayne "Big" Munn, recently crowned heavyweight wrestling champion, in a letter to Billy Sandow, manager of Ed (Strangler) Lewis, former champion, demands that the \$10,000 diamond-studded belt, which was awarded Lewis when he became champion, be turned over to Munn. The letter gives Sandow ten days in which to deliver the belt. If this is not done, the letter warns Sandow, "to be prepared for action which will be both annoying and expensive to you."

The belt, emblematic of the world's championship, was awarded Lewis by the Central Athletic club of Kansas City when he won the title three years ago.

### CALIFORNIANS ARE IN FAVOR OF CHILD LABOR AMENDMENT

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 14.—(AP)—One far western state, California, has voted in favor of the child labor amendment to the federal constitution and ten others are considering it. Each of the ten states is expected to act on the proposal in the near future. The amendment was transmitted to the Washington senate Monday with recommendation by Governor Hart and it was placed on file for assignment to committee.

The measure is before the Oregon legislature and a poll of the lower branch of the Oregon legislature showed 28 against ratification, 14 for, and three doubtful.

Early action is anticipated in both Utah and Idaho but whether favorable or otherwise cannot be learned. The Nevada legislature will meet Monday and it will have on file petitions from labor and club women organizations favoring ratification and opposing petitions from farm bureaus.

The status of the child labor amendment in other western states follows:

Colorado—A senate bill urges ratification.

Wyoming—Indications are toward defeat.

New Mexico—The governor urges ratification.

Arizona—Passed both houses in the first reading.

Montana—In hands of the labor committee with ratification believed to be favorable.

### MR. HARTLEY OPPOSES

OLYMPIA, Wash., Jan. 14.—Departing from his prepared inaugural address, Governor Roland H. Hartley dwelt upon his reasons for his opposition to the ratification of the child labor amendment.

"Imagine a boy 18 years old and not working," Governor Hartley declared. "Why, that fellow (Hartley said 'son of a gun') wouldn't be fit to live."

Breaking into his set speech again Governor Hartley, referring to the proposed amendment, said, "Can you fathers and mothers imagine that? I'll tell you that they would have a deuce of a time with me if I were young enough to raise any more children."

### DRAINAGE DISTRICT PLANS ON PROJECT

Assessments on the stock of the J. D. Cox drainage district west of Junction City will be arranged for further work on the project during the present year, according to action taken at a meeting of the stockholders yesterday. This is the only organized drainage district in Lane county at the present time and comprises 3600 acres. The major project of the organization is the cutting of a ditch across a part of the Long Tom slough area in order to straighten the waterway. This will eliminate between three to four miles and will open a considerable acreage to cultivation when drained, it is stated.
