SCHOOL CHILDREN TO TAKE PART IN HISTORIC PAGEANT

Tentative details of a big historical pageant to be held by the children of the schools of Lane county were told the members of the chamber of commerce today by E. J. Moore, county superintendent of schools. This pageant which was a popular event about 10 years ago has not been held since 1918 but it is believed that this year it should again be planned for about the middle of May toward the end of the school year.

In explaining the value and interest formerly manifested in the school pageant Mr. Moore asked for the cooperation of various civic bodies in the offering of prizes for a series of historical essays on the early history of Lane county.

Pupils of each school district of the county will have an opportunity to write of the history of their own community. It is probable that the armory here may be obtained for a display of historical relics to be exhibited by the school children. A parade with a display of symbolic floats of a historical nature and a large majority of the more than 10,000 school children of the county taking part will be features of the pageant, according to present plans.

"About \$200 still remains of the fund left over after the pageant of 1918 and this will be a nucleus for the fund this year. We believe that the children will show a greater interest in their community and the inspiring historical background of pioneer history if the various phases of this de-

will be carried on by the young people's clubs. These would include erection and striking of a tent; building a campfire and extinguishing it; proper camp sanitation; use of a compass; packing animals.

Service Groups Help

Service clubs will be invited to take part in the educational program, by devoting luncheon meetings to a discussion of fire prevention, and aiding the young people in carrying on the campaign.

"This fits in with the service clubs' idea of service to the youth of the country," says Mr. Macduff. "If we succeed in instilling in our young people the regard for the rights of others in forest camps we will have implanted the fundamental traits of good citizenship in their character."

"We want the children to see these offenses and help combat them—to condemn the careless sawmill man or logger just as much as the careless camper; to condemn the tourist who carelessly tosses away a cigarette, leaves his campfire burning, litters up nature's beauty with tin cans, pie plates and garbage, pollutes streams from which we drink, destroys public or private signs, strips all the beautiful flowers or shrubs from along the roadway, or who hunts or fishes in excess of his needs."

Move is Political

"The removal of Commandant Hendricks is entirely political, and not for the good of the service."

"I wish to call attention to the fact that when I became governor in January, 1923, I could have removed Commandant Hendricks at any time from his position had I acted as the majority of the board is acting today. However, I allowed him to be retained until August 1924, and he would have been there yet had not a sufficient cause arisen for his removal. By the removal of Commandant Hendricks a faithful, economical administrator of public affairs is retained to private life for purely political reasons."

The change at the home will be effective January 20.

control of the district in which it is established. If the average daily attendance at the college were less than 50 the college would be suspended at the end of the current school year until the electors again voted to establish it.

Any high school building in the district could be used for the college and the expense of maintaining the college would be borne by the school funds of the district and such special funds as may be provided by law.

The school board would have authority, with the assistance of the state school superintendent to prescribe the course of study, not exceeding two years of work. School boards would have authority to admit to the college the graduates of any high school in the state and such graduates of other high schools and any other candidates over 18 years old as may be approved by the directors. Students from outside the district would be required to pay a tuition.

The bill is based on a California law. The junior college would be largely for the benefit of pupils unable to go away to college. The two-year courses would be designed either to prepare for institutions of higher learning or

within themselves to give the students a practical education.

STATE HOUSE, SALEM, Ore., Jan. 15.—Children attending public schools, on application of parents or guardians could be excused from public schools for periods not exceeding 120 minutes a week to attend weekday schools giving religious instruction, under a bill introduced today by Senator Eddy.

Morgan Guilty on Rum Sale Charges

F. E. Morgan, charged with the sale of intoxicating liquor, was found guilty by a jury in justice court today and fined \$500 and sentenced to six months in the county jail. Morgan appeared as his own attorney but evidently failed to make an im-

pression on the jurors. Following the announcement of the verdict Morgan announced that he would appeal the case to the circuit court.
