Harbor eliminate loss of \$200,000 annually now caused by vessels being barbound. In the time that it takes to get out the 45 billion feet of timber tributary to Grays Harbor the saving in having adequate harbor facilities would amount to \$22,000,000 a sum sufficient to improve all the smaller harbors of the coast, he said.

George H. Rhodes, representing the Governor of California, pledged his personal cooperation in the movement and predicted that the legislature of California would memorialize congress in line with the recommendation of the conference.

He pointed out that Del Norte county, Cal., is 78 per cent national forests, that pay no taxes, and the full burden of taxation falls upon the remaining 22 per cent.

State Senator John Magdaly amplified the conservation idea that others had touched upon.

"The way to realize our forests and actually conserve them," he declared, "is to refit them now as fast as you can and reforest."

"The deterioration of our forests in the past 20 years is inconceivable. Notwithstanding the propaganda of the pseudo-conservationist, we will lose the bulk of our timber resources through their rotting in the forests. If we do not cut them at once and use it, this is the case in the Cascades even more than on the coast."

"There is not a cruise that was made in our old forests 20 years ago, that will stand up today, so great has been their deterioration."

Mexicans Release
Dr. W. F. Lorenz at Progreso, Yucatan

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.—Dr. W. F. Lorenz, chairman of the Wisconsin state board of control, the captain and members of the crew of the wrecked schooner Ruth of Pensacola, Fla., have been released from jail by Mexican authorities at Progreso, Yucatan.

Word of the release which was reported to have taken place yesterday was received at the state department from the American vice-consul at Progreso.

Previous advice received by the department said the men were arrested on order of the port captain at Progreso, charged with filibustering. Investigation showed the charges unfounded.

Dry Commissioner Gives His Annual Report on Liquor

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.—Federal prohibition enforcement began five years ago today and Commissioner Hayes, in an anniversary pronouncement, said he believed accomplishment during the period "warrant a fair degree of satisfaction" when "taking all things into consideration."

Recounting that the principal flow of liquor after January 16, 1920, had been due to diversion from bonded warehouses withdrawals, the commissioner said, this had been reduced to a minimum by use of the permit system. The coast guard, in combating liquor smuggling, he said, "is fast getting it under control."

Less than 10 per cent of the entire production of denatured alcohol is now being used illicitly, he estimated.

Pheasants Lead to Discovery of Still

BEND, Ore., Jan. 16.—Pheasants in an automobile driven by a youth of about 18 years, were the beginning of a long trail which led Sheriff S. E. Roberts to the location of a still on the Pleasant Ridge road late yesterday.

The youth, Vernon Jones, was stopped by Clarence A. Adams, deputy sheriff who is also deputy game warden. Adams was interested in the pheasants, but inquired what boy in a suit case in the car. The boy said the suit case was empty but Adams opened it and found it filled with bottles of liquor.

The boy finally gave the information which led sheriff's officers to search the ranch which is located 11 miles from Bend.
