LOCAL BANKER HAS INVESTMENT PLAN FOR COMMUNITIES

Advocating the organization of a "community investment club," which is along the lines suggested for the mutual savings banks presented at a proposed law at the present legislature, C. D. Rorer, president of the Bank of Commerce of this city, was the principal speaker at the thrice weekly meeting and dinner held last evening at Wendling.

In outlining his plan of community investment the banker pointed out the advantages of organization and weekly or monthly contributions to the fund which would be used to purchase bonds or other securities that would draw a steady interest return and be as safe as any other form of investment.

Mr. Reid, who was 67 years of age, was one of the organizers of the American Tin Plate company. He was director of numerous business organizations. He rose from messenger boy in a Richmond, Ind., bank to a position of influence in the financial world.

When Mr. Reid entered business in Wall street at the age of 41, he was already considered a national figure and was then credited with a fortune of \$500,000.

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GAME COMMISSION TO MAKE FIGHT TO REGULATE SEASONS

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 17.—The state game commission will make a fight at this session of the legislature for an act to authorize the commission to use its judgment and discretion in opening and closing game seasons and districts, also for a uniform season throughout the state on all game birds, game animals and game fish, also for a shorter season for hunting deer with the opening date not earlier than September 10.

The commission's efforts to assume this authority by an interpreting existing legislation, have caused some bitter controversy in the state in the last two years, and even got into court where the commission lost out.

The commission's wishes as to legislation were revealed in the biennial report, a handsomely illustrated volume of 45 pages, which was received here today.
