

UNITED STATES NOT INVOLVED BY AGREEMENT

Secretary Hughes Issues Formal Statement Regarding Pact

Neither Legal Nor Moral Obligation Imposed On Americans

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—(AP)—Secretary Hughes today issued a formal statement asserting that the agreement reached in Paris at the conference of the allied finance ministers imposed no obligations, "legally or morally," on the United States and that this country remains as free from commitments in European matters as it ever was.

The statement said the full text of the agreement signed by Ambassador Kellogg and the other American representatives would be made public as soon as it was received here.

Mr. Hughes' statement was said by White House officials to have the full approval of President Coolidge, who, it was said, had been fully advised of all angles of the controversy.

The resolution asking for a copy of the agreement, proposed by Senator Johnson, republican of California, is pending in the senate with the approval of others of the irreconcilable veterans of the Versailles treaty fight. From these and other quarters the state department has heard charges that the Paris agreement, signed by Ambassador Kellogg, the secretary of state-designate, had drawn the United States officially into an involvement against which it had been guarding itself ever since the close of the war.

Statement Given.

The Hughes statement said: "The portion of the agreement reached at the recent conference in Paris which relates to the participation of the United States in the Dawes committee has already been published in the newspapers. The full text of the agreement is on its way to this country and will be published as soon as received. In the meantime it may be said:

1.—The conference of finance ministers held at Paris for the purpose of reaching an agreement as to the allocation of the payments expected through the operation of the Dawes plan. In view of the inclusive character of these payments it was necessary for the United States to take part in the conference in order to protect its interests.

2.—The conference at Paris was not a body, agreement or commission provided for either by our treaty with Germany or by the treaty of Versailles. In taking part in this conference there was no violation of the reservation attached by the senate to the treaty of Berlin.

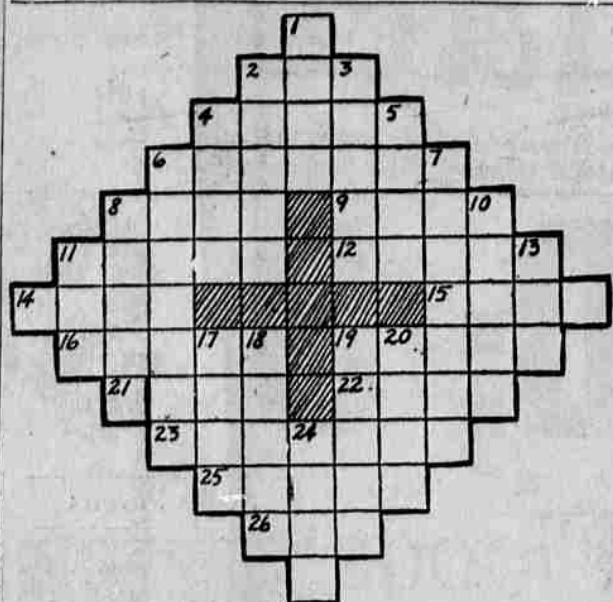
3.—The agreement reached at Paris was simply for the allocation of the payments made under the Dawes plan. It does not provide for sanctions or deal with any questions that might arise if the contemplated payments should not be safe. With respect to any such contingency the agreement in Paris puts the United States under no obligation legally or morally and the United States will be as free as it ever was to take any course or action it may think advisable.

4.—The agreement at Paris neither surrenders nor modifies any treaty right of the United States.

Suggestions that the Paris agreement requires submission to congress are not regarded by administration leaders as valid. They take the view that it has been an important policy of the Washington government that the executive deal with all matters relating to the collection of claims against other nations. The state department today reiterated its denial of a story that Ambassador Kellogg had sought to qualify American signature of the agreement with a resolution absolving the United States specifically from any obligation.

Telegraph Wires To Shanghai Are Cut; Ships Sail

BANDITS EXECUTE DARING HOLD-UPS AND MAKE ESCAPE

SEATTLE, Wash., Jan. 19.—Armed and masked bandits operating in Seattle and Everett last night executed three daring robberies which netted more than \$1700 in cash, a woman's wrist watch and an automobile. In each case the robbers' victim was a woman.

At Everett, 30 miles north of here, Miss Eleanor Rutherford, cashier of the Everett theater, was robbed of \$1200, the day's receipts as she was being driven in an auto from the theater to the Orpheum theater. As Miss Rutherford's car drew to the curb in front of the Orpheum, another came alongside. An armed man leaped from the car and forced the girl to surrender the money sack. The robber then returned to his automobile and was driven away by a confederate.

CHICAGO, Jan. 19.—(AP)—The United States railroad labor board in a decision today granted an increase in wages of approximately \$3,740,000 to clerical service employees on 43 railways in all sections of the country. The employees affected do not include those clerical service employees taken care of in a decision of the board a year ago.

The increase ranged from one to two cents an hour for the classes included, and grew out of a failure of the Brotherhood of Railway and Steamship Clerks, Freight Handlers and Station Employees to agree with the roads.

Brochure Ordered Seized by Italians
