

CLARK GRIFFITH TO USE VETERANS FOR HIS 1925 CAMPAIGN

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—(AP)—With the cry in other cities for young blood, Clark Griffith, proud president of a world's championship baseball club, anxious to hold his team at the top has thrown all precedent to the winds and injected into his lineup a sprinkling of tried veterans for the 1925 campaign.

Manager Stanley Harris will take to Tampa for spring training, a pitching staff whose members have been for years familiar figures on major league fields. In addition to Walter Johnson, the mound crew will include George Mogridge and Tom Zachary, last year's soupy bulwark; Ducey Hoeter, obtained from Brooklyn; Stanley Coveleski, bought from Cleveland; Vean Gregg, the veteran from Seattle; Fred Marberry, brilliant relief hurler last year; Curley Ruetter, obtained from Brooklyn; Benson Bralheart, H. Russell, another relief pitcher, Kelly, a recruit, James McNamara, obtained from Wichita, Kan., at a fancy price and several other youngsters.

The club, according to Griffith and Harris has been greatly bolstered in reserve strength. Weakness in this respect almost lost the world's series for the team and immediately after the championship they began efforts to build up a machine which would run more smoothly in the face of injuries.

Mike McNally, former Yankee, substitute infielder, was obtained in a deal with the Boston Red Sox in which Third Baseman Profiro was sent to Boston. Spencer Adams, a Pacific coast league shortstop, also was bought. These two, with Judge Harris, Peckinpaugh, Buege and Stanley will make up the infield eligibles.

In the outfield Rice, Goslin, McNeely, Matthews, Cargyle, leading southern association hitters last season; Leibold and Hainhart, a South Atlantic league recruit, are available. Rice and Goslin will have no trouble holding their jobs. McNeely is expected to have a hot start, despite his great work of last season and his \$50,000 hit that won the last game of the world's series.

JOHNNY DUNDEE TO FACE FRENCH SUIT

PARIS, Jan. 19.—(AP)—Formal complaint against Johnny Dundee and his manager, Jimmy Johnston, for failure to carry out the Dundee-Bretton fight which was to have been held here January 27, has been lodged with the French Boxing Federation by Promoter Hoyer and in addition a suit for 75,000 francs damages was filed today in the French civil courts against both the fighter and his manager.

The "affaire Dundee" as it is known here, is attracting much interest in sporting circles. The promoters decided to file the suit and complaint against Dundee and his manager only after they had received a wireless from the captain of the liner Paris, 20 hours out of Plymouth, bound for New York, saying that Dundee was aboard. There was also a message from Johnny himself saying he was sorry that illness in his family made it imperative for him to return to the United States, but that he would come back to fight Bretton or anybody else.

The French promoters are especially bitter because on Friday, they claim, Johnny was going through the motions of training for his Bretton fight and protesting that he intended to go on with the contest as scheduled, while at the same time he had in his pockets the attorney tickets for New York, which, according to the records of a steamship agency, had been purchased Thursday.

"Johnny will pay through the nose for this disappearing stunt" said Promoter Boyer. "I knew he was reputed for fast footwork, but this jumping clear out of France is too much even from Jumping Johnny."

Boyer displayed a contract which was signed December 24 by "James Johnston for Johnny Dundee," and which also bore Johnny's own signature. Boyer also showed his own receipt for 20,000 francs deposited with the French Boxing Federation January 7, as a forfeit. The contract calls for Dundee to receive \$30,250, or 30 per cent of the gate.
