

BOOTH-KELLY WILL HAVE NEW CARS ON COUNTY RAIL LINES

Purchase of 30 new 50-foot connected logging trucks for the Booth-Kelly lines has been announced by the lumber firm and the first shipment of the cars arrived here from the Portland Car and Foundry company today. The remainder of the first purchase of new trucks will be here in the near future, according to A. C. Dixon, general manager of the company.

The new trucks are replacing smaller ones now in use by the company on the lines used for transportation by the company, Mr. Dixon said. The new rolling stock of the company is of a modern type and sufficiently long to be used for any size log, is the announcement.

H. A. Dunbar, secretary and treasurer of the Booth-Kelly company, has returned from Wendling after several days during which he closed the books for the past year. TWO MORE POSTAL CARRIERS FOR CITY SOON TO BE NAMED

Appointment of two more regular postal carriers for the Eugene office making a total of 15 on the force here is expected this week, according to Darwin E. Yoran, postmaster. A request for the additional appointments was made the postoffice department about a week ago and a reply is expected soon, Mr. Yoran said.

At present there are 13 regular carriers and one substitute who is practically on a full-time basis. The substitute will be appointed as a regular carrier and another regular carrier appointed from the eligible list, according to present plans.

With the added members to the carrier staff delivery service will be provided for several districts of the city. Small areas out near the city limits at several places are not served by the daily carrier but these will now be included, is the announcement.

Report on County Farm is Complete

Reports for January from the Lane county farm as received today by Judge C. P. Barnard show that there are 20 inmates at present, 18 men and 2 women, there being no change in number since the November report. In the list of provisions for the month is reported on hand a total of 1050 pounds of pickled and smoked meat. Other items on the food list used include 175 loaves of bread, 31 pounds of butter, 65 gallons of milk, four sacks of potatoes and one sack of sugar. Practically all the food consumed at the farm is produced there.
