

SOUTHERN OREGON FARM LOAN GROUP SESSION IS HELD

MEDFORD, Ore., Jan. 20.—Applying federal loans to irrigated lands was the chief subject under discussion at the Monday afternoon session of the meeting of the southern Oregon district of the Federal Farm Loan Bank association, and in the evening George C. Jewett, secretary of the Spokane Federal Land bank addressed the delegates on "national co-operative marketing and financing."

Mr. Jewett in his address explained the workings of the farm loans and the intermediate credit act, and declared "I should be think what the outcome would be if the farmer had not had the federal farm loan during the period of liquidation following the great war."

Difficulties Related.
Mr. Jewett told of the difficulties that beset the operation of the law in its primary stages, including the interference of the agricultural interests to the bill.

Equalization of freight rates was advanced as one of the procedures necessary for the smoother operation of the Federal Farm Loan act.

George A. Mansfield of this city was the first speaker of the afternoon session. Describing the federal loan bank act as "the most magnificent piece of legislation ever conceived for the benefit of the farmer," he further declared, "in my opinion its greatest enemy is the farmer himself." He urged the farmer to cast aside "carping criticism, jealousy and prejudice," inform himself on the workings of the law, and follow it in an intelligent and determined manner.

County Unit Control.
He also pleaded that the farmer should have control of the directorate of the banks and that there should be county unit control instead of district organizations.

Sam H. Baker of Grants Pass, president of the Josephine County bank, argued for the inclusion of irrigated lands under the federal loans, and told of lands in the Grants Pass irrigation district, liabilities before the water was applied, now regarded as assets. He declared that the farm lands with water, were in a better financial shape than those without.

Other speakers upheld Mr. Baker's contentions.

A. C. Jewett in reply declared that the chief obstacle to the granting of loans on irrigated lands was the priority of the bonded indebtedness for irrigation districts, over the federal loans.

The committee on by-laws was named as follows: J. A. Gamill, E. H. Hurd, and J. W. Turvey, all of Jackson county.

The committee on resolutions was selected as follows: Mrs. L. B. Hague, Klamath county; A. H. Fischer, Jackson county; P. Kjelland, Douglas county; G. A. Hamilton, Josephine; Henry Cronin, Curry county and J. L. Chelan, Coos county.

Church Brotherhood Meets to Consider Proposed Measures

SPRINGFIELD, Jan. 20.—(Special).—Resolutions opposing the bill before the Oregon legislature to abolish the office of state prohibition director were passed at a meeting of the Methodist brotherhood last night. The men expressed themselves as being in favor of the office, itself, regardless of the individual efficiency or lack of efficiency of the man holding it. A draft of the brotherhood's resolution is to be made and sent to the representative from this district. The brotherhood also expressed itself as opposing the advertising of cigarettes on public bill boards.

ARTHUR COVELL TO BE RE-SENTENCED TO DEATH IN COOS

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 20.—The conviction of Arthur Covell, bedfast paralytic astrologer, who was sentenced to be hanged for conspiring with his nephew, Alton Covell, a minor, to kill Mrs. Elba Covell, was affirmed today by the state supreme court. Covell will have to be taken back to Coos county to be re-sentenced to death. Mrs. Elba Covell, the murder victim was the wife of Dr. Fred Covell, a brother of the condemned man. Alton Covell, the boy, was found guilty of doing the actual killing by suffocating the woman with ammonia, and was sentenced to life imprisonment. Mrs. Covell met her death September 30, 1923.

The supreme court also upheld the conviction of John Knight Giles, alias John Cyril Laird, alias Basil Haig, of murder in the second degree for the killing of a traffic officer after Giles had robbed a tender on the Interstate bridge. His conviction was obtained in Portland about six years ago. The case was appealed but Giles' attorney never filed a bill of exceptions and the case has since hung fire until recently set on the docket. At the time of the crime capital punishment was not practiced in Oregon. Like Covell, Giles is a student, though along different lines. He has delved deeply into philosophy and has embraced the doctrine of the superman. He was sentenced to serve a life sentence.

50 MAY JOIN NEW MALE CHORUS HERE

Intentions that the Eugene male chorus would exceed 50 members were announced last night at the meeting of the chorus committee at the chamber of commerce, at which plans were made for the organization meeting Tuesday night, January 27.

Mill at Westfir Starts Operation

Opening of the big mill of the Western Lumber company at Westfir was scheduled for today, and from reports reaching Eugene everything is all set ready for the first work to commence.

Only a small part of the lumber company crew will be employed for the present to care for the logs accumulated in the mill pond. Improvement work on the mill has been speeded up for the last several months, and present reports are that it is almost done. New machinery has been installed and ready for operation.

That the Western Lumber mill is one of the largest electric sawmills on the Pacific coast, is the opinion of local lumber men. Operating at full capacity, it keeps several hundred men busy in the logging camps and plant.
