"Skip" Madigan has just piloted little St. Mary's College of Oakland, through a sensational season. And now Adam Walsh, captain of the notable 1924 Notre Dame eleven, has been signed to coach the University of Santa Clara, down the peninsula from San Francisco. St. Mary's and Santa Clara meet annually in San Francisco, usually Thanksgiving day. Last November Madigan's men administered a thorough drubbing. In retaliation Santa Clara intends to develop a Notre Dame system of its own.

Gordon Cochrane, college catcher purchased by Connie Mack for a reported price of \$50,000 from Portland, of the Pacific Coast league, declares he is a holdout but he expresses a desire to appear and do his best with the Athletics. The Boston University man seeks \$5,000 of the purchase money from President Turner of the Portland team and claims that he already has received a letter informing him that his proposition meets with disfavor.

LOCAL GUNNER HAS FINE YEAR'S MARK

L. E. Simmons of Eugene is the best shot in this section of the state and the local gunner is placed fifteenth in the list of the leading lights in this sport for 1924, according to the annual report of the American Trap Shooting association. Mr. Simmons is listed with a percentage of 94.06 and having fired 1650 shots during the season. The requirements to be listed on the association records are that at least 1000 or more registered targets must have been fired on. Frank M. Troch of Portland, as usual, is leader of the state gunners with a percentage of 97.52.

Low Tendler Loses Match to Veteran

NEW YORK, Jan. 20.—Benny Leonard has retired from the lightweight boxing championship unbeatn. His greatest antagonist of recent years, Low Tendler of Philadelphia, is returning from Pittsburgh, torn and sore, the victim of a knockout for the first time in his life.

Battered twice at the hands of the veteran, Jack Zivic, Tendler must have undergone a terrible experience in the realization that time had conquered a man who a little more than a year ago fought the great Leonard twice and on each occasion stood firmly on his feet at the end of 15 rounds.

Leonard and Tendler clashed twice, once in Jersey and again in New York. And both times the champion successfully defended his title. For the past year and a half Tendler has been doing little fighting. Tendler's defeat at the hands of Zivic undoubtedly precludes any possibility of his entering the tournament for the crown for which, in years past, he strove so valiantly.

'Battling' Nelson Regains Property

CHICAGO, Jan. 20.—"Battling" Nelson, former lightweight champion, who has been denied the fortune he accumulated in the ring through a combination of circumstances resulting from his father's will, has succeeded in regaining control of his property, according to his former manager, Jack Robinson.

Nelson turned his ring earnings over to his father, who left a will providing that none of the estate, consisting of real estate, could be disposed of. Virtually all the income from the property, valued at \$150,000 has been used to pay debts accumulated previous to and since the death of Nelson's father. A court recently broke the will.

California Pool To Be Long Affair

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 20.—(AP)—The new Fleishacker swimming pool, 1,000 feet long, said to be the largest in the world, will be dedicated when the National Amateur Athletic Union swimming championships are held here April 23, 24 and 25.

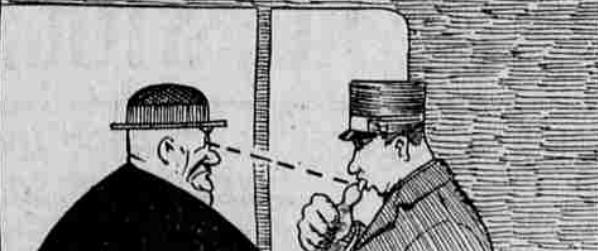
The tank is under construction. It is situated near the ocean beach at Ingleside, the southwestern end of the city. It will have a maximum depth of 12 feet. It is an outdoor pool, but the temperature of the water will be regulated. The property involved is owned by the city, and the pool will be open to the public.

Another dedication, that of the new municipal stadium in Golden Gate park, will mark the track and field events of the National A. A. U., to be held July 3, 4 and 5. The stadium, being built this winter, will seat 22,000. Careful attention is being given the running track, so that it may be one of the fastest.
